

Stevenson's Aid Sought for Bill On Discrimination

Washington —(U.P.)— Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey and other "liberal" Northern Democrats are trying to enlist the support of Gov. Adlai Stevenson for their "comprehensive" bill to end racial discrimination in employment, it was learned Friday.

Informed sources disclosed that they have forwarded a copy of the proposed legislation to the Democratic presidential nominee. They are hopeful that he will endorse it, despite his statement that anti-discrimination measures are primarily a state responsibility.

Initials Battle Cry
The bill, approved by the Senate Labor Committee just before Congress adjourned, is aimed at the same goal as President Truman's controversial proposal for a Fair Employment Practices Commission. The sponsors, realizing that the very initials "FEPC" have become a battle cry to Southern Democrats, have worked out a different approach to the problem.

Their measure would set up a seven member board—called equality of Opportunity in Employment Commission—to investigate and eliminate employment discrimination because of race, color, creed and national origin.

After extensive hearings, this board's findings would be enforceable through the courts. But the courts would have the authority to review the case both as to the law and the facts.

Chief distinguishing factor of the Humphrey bill is that it would be inoperative in states or cities which take "effective action" on their own to end discrimination in employment. This provision was designed to answer "states' rights" opposition.

County Projects Included In Call for Highway Bids

The state highway commission has called for bids August 18 and 19 for four construction projects in Jackson county, according to County Engineer Paul Rynning.

The bids are for two state projects, a county project and a federal aid project. The commission announced bids will be opened Monday, August 18, for

a state project calling for construction of automatic traffic control signals at 12th street and Riverside and Central avenues.

Bids will be opened August 19 for constructing two frame dwellings on highway commission property at Lincoln on the Green Springs highway; for building a bridge over Bear creek at McAndrews road, and for grading and paving in 4.47 miles of the Pacific highway between Ashland and the county farm.

Bear Creek Bridge
Bids for the Bear Creek bridge project will be received for the county government and will be referred to the county court, which will handle all matters on the project following the receipt of bids by the highway commission. The bridge will call for approximately 600 cubic yards of excavation, 460 cubic yards of concrete, 104,000 pounds of metal reinforcement and 490 feet of metal railing.

Rynning announced that two crews are working on a new bridge over Antelope creek at Meridian road. They have been working about a week. The bridge will be of creosoted wood.

Paving of another short section Hiatt road, near the Dead Indian road, is scheduled to begin soon. The county's extensive oiling program is progressing rapidly, according to Rynning.

He also announced that a county rock crusher has been set up in the Evans creek district near Wimer.

2 Boys Drown in Valseltz Reservoir

Dallas, Ore. —(U.P.)— Bodies of two Valseltz, Ore., boys were recovered Friday from the town's reservoir where they drowned, one apparently having slipped into the water and the other attempting a rescue Thursday night.

The victims were Larry Weaver, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Weaver, and Gary Haley, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Haley, all of Valseltz.

The boys left their homes for a bicycle ride yesterday afternoon and were not missed until dinner time. At dusk, a dog owned by one of the lads returned alone and the parents became alarmed. Searchers followed their bicycle tire tracks to a point near the reservoir above Valseltz and later noticed skid marks on a plank leading to the water.

Authorities said indications were that one of the boys had slipped in and the other fell in while attempting a rescue. Neither of the boys could swim.

More Double-Barrel Hens Hope of Owner

Wooster, O. —(U.P.)— Poultrymen are waiting eagerly to see if a "double-barrelled" hen here may mother a flock of new twin-egg layers.

The young white rock pullet has laid two eggs a day on several occasions from its unusual side-by-side vents. Poultrymen, dreaming of double production from such a breed, took her to the laboratory of a feed manufacturing plant.

Ban Eased on Quarantine Against Infected Swine

Washington —(U.P.)— The Agriculture Department Friday removed four states and areas in six others from quarantine restrictions imposed last week to halt the spread of the hog disease vesicular exanthema.

States now free from federal quarantine restrictions are Arizona, Georgia, Ohio, and Wyoming.

At the same time the department released these other areas from federal quarantine:

Lake County, Illinois; Atchison, Doniphan, Johnson, Leavenworth, and Sedgwick counties, Kansas; Clay, Howell, and Platte counties, and Jackson county except Caw township, Missouri; Box Butte, Saunders, and Washington counties, and Dodge except Platte township, Nebraska; Marion county, Oregon, and Spokane county, in Washington.

Parts of these states remain under quarantine.

The department extended the quarantine restrictions in two states to areas where the disease has now been identified. The restrictions were extended to all

of Cook County, Ill., where before only Orland Township had been under quarantine. They also were extended to Gilmore and Richland Townships in Sarpy County, Neb. Previously all of Sarpy County had been free of vesicular exanthema.
