Consumer Advisory Committee Appointed

Appointment of a Consumer Advisory committee serving the trade area of Jackson county has been announced by Carl C. Donagh, district director of the Price Stabilization in Portland.

Donagh said purpose of the committee will be to provide suggestions and counsel as to methods OPS may employ in advising the public as to purposes and requirements of the stabilization program.

A meeting will be called some time in the next few weeks, Donagh said, at which time a chairman will be selected and the Consumer Information program will be discussed.

Those appointed to the committee are Mrs. Moore Hamilton, Mrs. Elwood Hedberg, Mrs. Victor Birdseye, Mrs. Harry Chipman and Mrs. George Bolster, all of Medford.

Brown Rot Control Measures Reported

Peaches should be sprayed or dusted by August 15 for control of brown rot, Agriculture Agent C. B. Cordy said today.

Cordy advised use of 60 pounds per acre of sulfur or Ziram dust, or spray with six pounds of wettable sulfur or 1½ pounds of Ziram per 100 gallons. If spiders are present add one-third pint of 20 per cent TEPP or one-sixth pint of 40 per cent TEPP per 100 gallons.

The second spray for control of root borer and earwigs also should be applied to all stone fruit trees by August 15. Use eight pounds of 50 per cent DDT per 100 gallons. Soak the trunks and crotches so some runs to the ground.

If DDT is mixed with the brown rot spray it will leave a toxic residue on the fruit.

CP Rural Fire District Decides To Operate With Own Equipment

Central Point—The board of directors of the Central Point rural fire district decided last night to operate and maintain its own fire equipment, according to A. C. Thompson, director.

The directors decided against buying protection from the city of Central Point on the grounds

that the rural district's situation was extremely complex, that the district will eventually have to have one more sub-station, besides a main station, and that the district members would receive better protection if the district's equipment is self-operated.

Pacific Security Council Sets Meeting

Honolulu, T. H. — (U.P.) — The first meeting of the Pacific Mutual Defense Treaty's Military Council will be held within 60 days at the Pearl Harbor headquarters of Adm. Arthur W. Radford, commander in chief of the U. S. Pacific fleet, officials said Friday.

Military leaders from Australia and New Zealand will join with U. S. experts at the meeting to draw up specific recommendations for armed resistance to aggression in the Pacific.

The Council, created by foreign ministers of the three "Anzus" nations, will study methods of uniting the tanks, guns, planes and men of each country against armed attack under terms of a security alliance pledging mutual defense.

Former Indian Chief To Cast Vote for Stevenson

Sanish, N.D. — (U.P.) — Adlai Stevenson, Sanish, N.D., said Friday he plans to vote for Adlai Stevenson of Springfield, Ill., in the presidential election.

Stevenson, former Indian chief, said his name originally was "Bear-in-the-Water" but many years ago he changed it to be the same as the vice president of the United States, grandfather and namesake of the Democratic candidate for president.

Department Store Sales Show Drop

Washington — (U.P.) — Department store sales sagged last month as shoppers stayed at home to duck the heat and to watch the political conventions, the Federal Reserve Board reports.

The board said sales last month were 5 per cent below those in June, which had topped May by 3 per cent.

In dollar volume, department store sales last week were 2 per cent below the same week last year. During the past four weeks, sales were 1 per cent below the same period in 1951.

The 12 federal reserve cities reported sales in their area last week and in the last four weeks, compared with last year. The cities included Chicago, down 2 per cent and down 3 per cent; St. Louis, down 2 per cent and down 2 per cent; Minneapolis, up 1 per cent and up 7 per cent; Kansas City, up 3 per cent and up 7 per cent.

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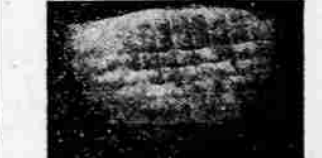
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A Nichols' Worth of— Comment On This and That
