Old Indian Prophecy Filled in Nebraska

Lincoln, Neb. — (U.P.) — A Ponca Indian prophecy of perhaps 1,000 years ago has been fulfilled.

Ninibauxube, the sacred peace pipe of the Ponca Indians, has left the tribe for its final resting place with the University of Nebraska. The pipe was presented to the University by Peter Le Claire, Wewela, S.D., official interpreter for the Ponca tribe.

Le Claire said it was predicted "perhaps 1,000 years ago," that the peace pipe would leave the tribe.

"That day has come now," he said. "I hope the young Ponca will come to see it here."

Le Claire, in presenting the pipe to the university, carried out the wish of the last Ponca chieftain, Joe Birdhead, who willed the pipe to the "Big School" several years ago.

Birdhead ordered the pipe presented to the school because he feared his fellow tribesmen would not give it the care and dignity it deserved.

According to Ponca tradition the pipe was handed down from father to son, but Birdhead's only child was a girl and by tribal law, she could not take custody of Ninibauxube.
