Globetrotters Down Cheney Studs 11 to 8

The Harlem Globetrotters, most colorful barnstorming baseball aggregation to appear in Medford this season, built up a good lead early in the game, admittedly eased up and then had to tighten their control in subduing the undermanned Cheney Studs 11 to 8 at the fairgrounds last night.

With their amusing and magician-like shadow-ball game and the antics of cut-up Sam Wheeler, the Globetrotters outdid the House of David and Havana Cubans, who previously visited, in the showmanship department. They gave the biggest crowd of the season at the fairgrounds entertainment to make up for the fact that the home team was outclassed.

Maddox Hit Hard

Medford Chucker Terry Maddox, who shone on the mound here recently against Weed, did not fare so well against the hard slugging Negro nine. The Trotters hit Maddox hard in the early frames and collected 13 hits for the evening off the ex-Medford high tosser.

Maddox was pounded hardest by the travelers in the first inning when they tagged him for five hits, including triples, by Sluggers Slade and Willie Ivory. The Harlemites gathered six runs during the canto. Two errors by teammates did hurt the local pitcher's cause but he also hit a batter, was charged with a balk and was tapped for a sacrifice in the inning.

The Trotters were in command from the start but the Studs made a good bid to catch them in their first frame batting turn. Singles by Moose Blevins and Chuck Jandreau, a rousing triple by Frank Roelandt and a ground-out by Don Fawcett produced three runs and temporarily bolstered the hopes of Stud supporters.

Margin Stretched

In the second chucker, however, the Trotters picked up two more runs on a walk to J. A. Redd, a triple by Wheeler and single by Slade. They made the margin 10 to 3 with a pair of runs in the fourth on a single by Ducky Davenport, a double by Wheeler and Slade's second three-bagger of the evening.

Medford got a run in the fourth on a walk to George Sanders, a passed ball and an error. The Studs made it 10 to 5 in the sixth when Roelandt doubled and Fawcett singled in the run. In the eighth the Globetrotters made it 11 to 5 with a tally on a walk to Wheeler, an error and a double by Slade, who lived up to his Sluggers moniker with four raps in five times up.

Three Medford Runs

It was in the eighth inning that the travelers had to tighten control. Snuffy Smith singled, Fawcett doubled and Sanders walked to load the bases. Terry Maddox popped out but Hoosier Hoffard, who played the whole game in right field, slugged a one base knock. He drove in Smith and Fawcett scored on an error. George Gitzzen walked.

At that point Jones came into relieve Trotter Thrower Steward. Blevins clubbed a grounder forcing Gitzzen at second but Sanders scored the third run of the inning and the count was 11 to 8. Jandreau popped out to retire the side.

The Studs got the bags loaded again in the ninth with one out but Maddox fanned and Hoffard hit into a force play that ended the contest.

Junior Loop Ump Draws Suspension

St. Louis, Mo. —(U.P.)—The American league's Umpire Bill McGowan was on the league suspension list Friday after a hassle with a local sportswriter.

League President Will Harridge announced in Chicago Thursday that McGowan was "suspended indefinitely" after Harridge learned that the writer's paper had demanded an apology from McGowan and threatened to stop its American league coverage until one was forthcoming.

Harridge also sent telegrams carrying his apologies "to all writers who witnessed the affair" between McGowan and Ellis Veech, a sports writer for the East St. Louis, Ill., Journal during the Tigers-Browns baseball game here Wednesday night.

Three Strikes

The trouble started in the seventh inning when the Tigers' Cliff Mages started for first base on what he thought was a walk and it developed into three strikes. McGowan called him back and ruled him out.

A riding chorus against McGowan started up in the Detroit dugout and he walked over and ordered one of the Tigers to the showers. Veech telephoned the field to find out who was ousted.

According to witnesses, McGowan refused to identify the ousted player and an argument started between him and Veech. Finally a bat boy told Veech and the other writers the McGowan ban was against Billy Hoelt.

Valley Loop Tiffs Billed

One Rogue Valley Baseball league joust will be completed at Grants Pass tonight and two full games will be played on Sunday.

The last three innings of a ruckus between Glendale and Cave Junction will be fought out on the Grants Pass field tonight. A riot broke up the game on July 21.

Glendale will have an 8 to 3 lead when the game is resumed. This will present a big task for Cave Junction. The Cubs with 10 wins and one loss need victory to be sure of at least a first place tie. It will be the last regular fray of the season for the Cubs.

Ez Charles Favored Over Rex Layne

Ogden—(U.P.)—Former heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles, trim and confident, was a heavy favorite to beat Utah's roughneck Rex Layne in their 10-round return match here Friday night.

Charles beat Layne in the 11th round of their only previous fight last October and the former champ said he thought he could do it again Friday night "only quicker."

Prejudiced Westerners were quick to point out, however, Layne's advantages in youth, by nine years; in weight an 11-pound budge; plus additional defensive knowledge which he noticeably has lacked in previous fights.

Sales Over \$100,000

The fight, to be staged in Ogden's rodeo arena, was expected to draw nearly 30,000 fans from all parts of the western states. Promoter Ken Mayne wouldn't guess at the final gate but admitted sales had passed the \$100,000 mark.

The fight means a lot to Layne and Charles. The former champ and his manager Jake Mintz think Charles was robbed of the title during the last Walcott fight. Regardless of that opinion, however, Mintz admits Charles' future is dependent on the Layne bout.

Layne, who needs a win badly to bolster his sagging career, was expected to scale 198 pounds to Charles' 187.

Heavyweight Encounter Negotiations Resumed

New York —(U.P.)—Promoter Jim Norris resumed negotiations Friday with the managers of Jersey Joe Walcott and Rocky Marciano regarding their proposed heavyweight title fight next month.

"We've got to come to terms regarding the fighters' percentages before we can select a site," Norris said.

He admitted, however, that the range of sites had been narrowed to three cities: Philadelphia, Jersey City and Boston. He said the fight could not be held in New York because Felix Baccichio, manager of Champion Walcott, had no manager's license in New York state and would not apply for one.

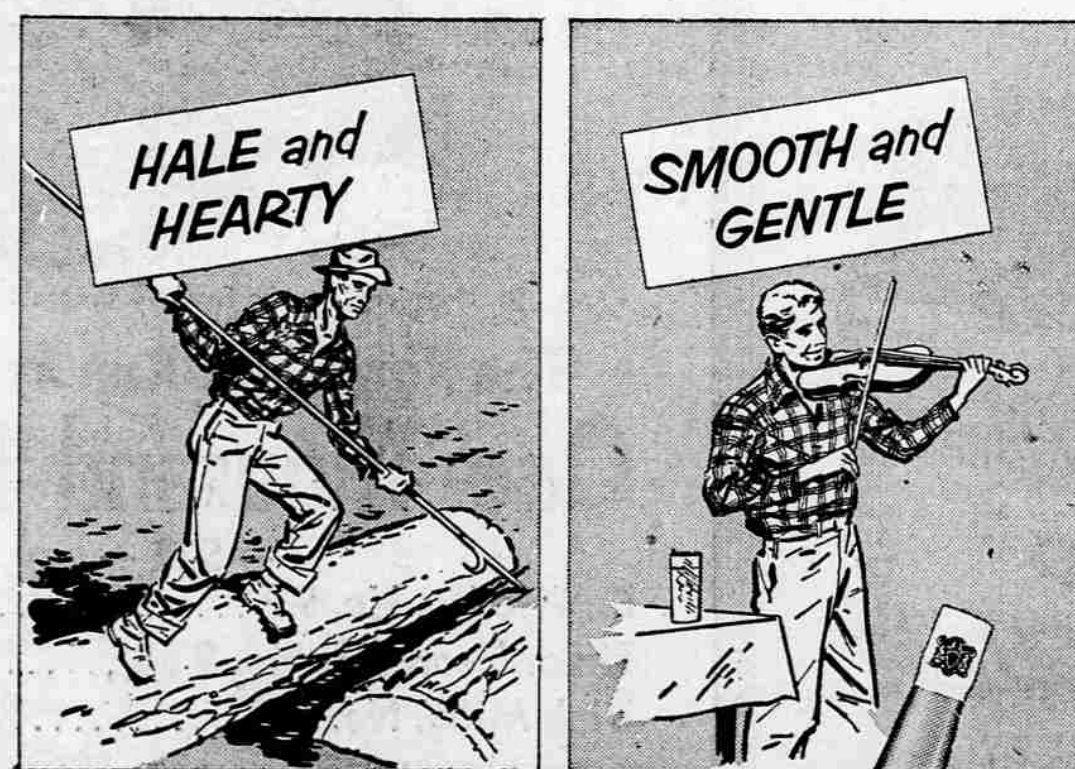
