Rural Life Committee Studies Youth Needs

Communities should examine their less successful youth programs to see if part of the weakness can be traced to a tendency to do things "for" young people rather than "with" them.

This is one of the recommendations made at the spring statewide agricultural planning conference at Oregon State college, reports Mrs. Mabel Mack, assistant extension director at OSC and secretary of the rural life subcommittee of the conference.

The committee also urged adult groups to study the effect on youth of radio, television, movies, and various publications, and then give wholehearted support to good programs and publications, and unite for action to improve undesirable ones.

In surveying the current situation among Oregon youth, the rural life subcommittee found a sharp decline in membership in most youth groups at about the age of 16. Reasons were lack of adult leaders, poorly trained leaders, lack of parental interest, too many activities, dating and part-time jobs.
