Ethiopian Wild Coffee Will Be Investigated By UN Horticulturist

From Ethiopia comes word that its high plateaus are lush with wild coffee bushes. It's the only country known where wild coffee can still be found.

The announcement has stirred such interest that the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations is sending Dr. Pierre G. Sylvain, horticulturist and coffee expert, to help Ethiopia investigate and possibly develop production of wild coffee.

Last year, Ethiopia exported 100,000 bags of wild coffee, a mild coffee of high aroma. If it is practicable to step up this production, Ethiopia might become an important coffee producer, according to Dr. Sylvain. He states that among these wild coffee, disease-resistant varieties may be found; also that wild coffee might prove higher in its yield than cultivated coffee. If experiments verify this, such findings would affect coffee growers everywhere in the world.

These are some of the long range results that may prove out. The near range results, however, will be the opening of a new industry for Ethiopia with promises of prosperity and better living standards for the people of that country, it is stated.

Baking Institute Reveals Results Of Tests on Bread

Here's some startling news for those of you who keep your bread in a cooler, or even in the refrigerator, in hopes of keeping it fresh longer.

It comes from Agnes Kolshorn, extension nutrition specialist at Oregon State college. Miss Kolshorn says the American Institute of Baking made an extensive study recently to find out just why bread stales, and what to do about it.

And here's what their study reveals. To slow down the staling of bread, keep the temperatures up!

Yes, that disproves the common belief that bread will keep fresher in the refrigerator. Instead, the study shows that refrigeration causes bread to stale faster.

This, however, does not refer to frozen breads. Completely frozen bread keeps satisfactorily fresh for a year or more.

The truth is that as the storage temperature of your bread is lowered, the staling rate increases. Bread becomes stale most quickly at temperatures near its freezing point.

On the other hand, bread which is frozen and stored at well below freezing temperatures will keep fresh for many months.

So there you are. To keep bread fresh longer, either freeze it and store it frozen, or leave it at room temperatures. You'll find plenty of other uses for your refrigerator space.
