kind of show or entertainment after 9, he or she is robbed of the sleep which is so essential for health, nutrition, growth and alertness.

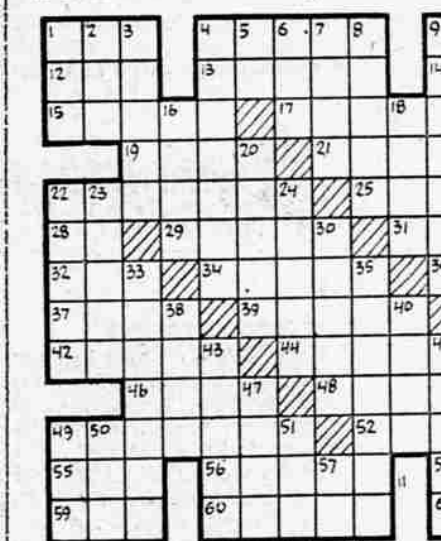

Stump History...

Here and there stumps of Western red cedar still stand above Pacific Northwest waterways, keeping marks made by the primitive axes of Indian canoe makers and house builders. Yet younger surviving stumps bear the signs of the white man's broadsword, which held its own in the 1850s, when shore timber was being felled around Puget Sound and along the Columbia to provide lumber, piling and poles for California's gold-seeking Argonauts.

Many more stumps of both cedar and Douglas fir, standing taller than a man and a half, pitted with board holes, remain as monuments to the dawn of the machine age and mass production in the region's commercial forests. They tell of big Swedes and fighting Irish who stood high on the springboards and struck mighty licks with the double-bitted axes that spelled suicide in the eyes of woodsmen when introduced in the 1880s.

It is important history that all the old stumps tell. Their very durability reflects one reason for the market demand that kept growing steadily around the world from the days of the California gold rush, until the products of Pacific Northwest logs were being sold in 64 countries. "Durable Douglas fir" and "everlasting red cedar" became common terms of the world timber trade, while the Sitka spruce, the western hemlock and the western pines were earning fame for special values in each species.

The "Faller's Trade..."
With acceptance of the double-bitted ax, and improvement of the crosscut saw, the trade of the timber "faller" of the Pacific Northwest grew into a pattern that did not change materially until World War II.

Two men faced off at a tree. They whacked out board holes, then stood on springboards to chop the undercut to drop the tree "down the hill" as a tree would commonly lean.

The notch made, the fallers changed to the sawing side, set-

ting springboards anew, then working with hand-pulled crosscut saw—the "misery whip"—employing wedges as the kerf deepened, squirting kerosene on the saw when it would drag in pitch pockets, until the giant fell. At the day's end the saw was toted to camp for filing, and the axes for grinding.

So the work went on, basically the same in the harvests of wilderness timber by axe and crosscut saw for 70 years and more.

Chainsaw Fallers...
The power saw for tree felling and log bucking first took shape in the Ramsome steam powered tool for 1879. It worked, but none too well. Such was the sad story of many inventions that were offered to the forest industry up to the 1930s, excepting the power-driven type of crosscut saw for log bucking—the "drag saw".

The idea of a powered chainsaw for tree felling held the most practical promise. Excessive weight was the main drawback in development of this tool until 1936 in the rough country of the Pacific Northwest. Then a chainsaw devised by one Andreas Stihl—in Germany—was adopted by a British Columbia timber company.

The Stihl saw weighed only 120 pounds, it could be easily handled by two men, employed a two cycle motor, and its chain of saw teeth speeded around the narrow oval of a 60-inch blade. Andreas Stihl himself came to British Columbia with his best engineers to supervise the development of his powered chainsaw as a revolutionary machine in the harvesting of the giants of Pacific Northwest wilderness forests.

Within 15 years chainsaws from many manufacturers had
