Cheney Mill Ordered To Rehire Employee

Washington—A national labor relations board examiner held Cheney Forest Products Inc. of Central Point, Ore., guilty of unfair labor practices, and ordered it to reinstate an employee the examiner said had been discharged for union activity.

Examiner Howard Myers said the company discharged Elvis C. Arnold "because of his union activities and sympathies" and not, as the company contended, for business reasons.

Myers recommended that the board order the company to reinstate Arnold and compensate him for loss of earnings since his discharge last February 14. The company has 20 days in which to appeal the examiner's decision.

Stromboli Erupts; No Property Damage

Ile of Stromboli, Italy — (U.P.) —The active volcano of Stromboli has erupted again, but no property damage or casualties have been observed.

Scientific observers described the eruption, which began Saturday, as a normal occurrence.
