Young Secretary Turns Hobby Into Unique Business

St. Petersburg, Fla. — (U.P.) — A young woman secretary with an idea and four-leaf clover luck started something 20 years ago that today is a big and unique business of its kind in the United States.

Like most women with a penchant for starting things, this one pursued with feminine intensity what she had begun. It took a little help from her father, however.

It began in Panama in 1932 when a young woman secretary was strolling in her father's "hobby" patch. She spotted and plucked a four leaf clover.

She took the good luck symbol home and pressed the petals with an iron. She pasted the fragile little plant on a birthday card and gave it to her boss, the American consul in Panama. He was the late H. O. Williams.

Williams asked her, since she appeared to be blessed with luck, if she could dig up 300 more four leaf clovers. He, too, wanted to paste them on birthday cards to send to fellow diplomats and friends in the Canal Zone.

As a result the young lady developed what had been a hobby with her father — growing clover — into the business of growing four leaf clovers.

Her father, Charles T. Daniels, was a telephone engineer in the Canal Zone then and he liked to putter around in his clover patch on his off time.

Operated as Farm Today Charles' son, William, operates the family clover 'farm' in St. Petersburg, Fla. The business was moved there from Panama six years ago.

Miss Daniels, now Mrs. E. E. Warwick, also of St. Petersburg, has watched the family business grow with typical "luck."

They now ship between 3,000,000 and 4,000,000 four leaf clovers to novelty and greeting card companies throughout the country.

The luck did not come without patient work. It took Charles Daniels, the head of the family and still living, 18 years of experimentation to develop enough of the "lucky" clovers to make the business really pay.

Criminal Museum Holds All Needs For Identification Berkeley, Calif. — (U.P.) — Dr. Paul Kirk, professor of criminalistics at the University of California, has accumulated an extensive museum that fits into a laboratory locker and contains nearly everything needed for identification of evidence.

The museum is used to give laboratory aid to police departments and to teach criminology students scientific detection.

In the museum there are 200 samples of men's wool suit material. The samples determine the significance of fibers involved in murder and other crime cases.

Many Hair Samples The museum contains hundreds of human hair samples collected from all types and ages of people. It contains samples of ink, metals and alloys, soils, commercial woods, drapery, upholstery and special cloths.

Gun-enthusiastic students collected bullets and cartridge cases from murder cases and from the police practice range. The university's museum of vertebrate zoology provided wild animal hairs of west coast mammals. A student employee of a fur shop furnished commercial furs.

Last year a student attended dog and cat shows at the Sacramento state fair to get hair samples from domestic animals. **Students Worked Hard** A student whose parents owned a drapery business contributed the drapery samples. Automobile paint samples were collected by a student working in a body repair garage. Surface clothing fibers were collected by students who rang doorbells and asked permission to sweep clothes with a special vacuum and filter. A good collection of wild bird feathers went to the moths instead of to the museum. Dr. Kirk's small but effective museum is often used by California law enforcement in solving baffling crimes.
