Death Rate Almost Halved Since Beginning of Century

Washington (U.P.)—The Brookings Institution has reported that "dramatic progress" in health has cut the U.S. death rate almost in half since the turn of the century.

The private research organization said the death rate has dropped from 17.2 per 1,000 population to 9.6 in 50 years, while control of communicable diseases has advanced so far that emphasis has swung to wiping out chronic, degenerative maladies such as cancer and heart disease.

Drug Use on Wane
The report, entitled Health Resources in the United States, also said there is evidence that drug addiction and venereal diseases are on the wane.

But the most striking victory of all was won over infant death. In 1900, the infant mortality rate was 130 out of 1,000. By 1950 it had dropped to 30.

The report emphasized that the progress was achieved despite some shortages of physicians and facilities. It said the nation now has 127 physicians for every 100,000 persons and one hospital bed for every 100 persons.

Research Summarized
The 300-page book summarized three years of Brookings research in which more than 700 public and private health agencies participated.

Purpose of the study, the Institution said, is to help decide how best to use, order and improve the nation's health resources.

Chicago (U.P.)—Dr. Robert E. Wilson, chairman of the board at Standard Oil of Indiana said Tuesday plants constructed now to make synthetic gasoline would be "obsolete" before they were completed.

He said such construction, as proposed by Secretary of the Interior Oscar Chapman, would be "most premature."

Wilson said the plants, which would extract gasoline and other fuels from shale, "would cost many times as much as an intelligently planned research program."
