Portland—(U.P.) Multnomah county sheriff's deputies Tuesday were dragging the Columbia river near Sundial beach for the body of nine-year-old Yvonne Louise Lauer.

The young girl, daughter of Mrs. Louise L. Lauer, Portland, drowned Monday night when she attempted to swim across the river with seven other girls. She went down about 100 yards offshore after she and four companions joined four older girls in attempting to swim the river.

Yvonne's sister, Barbara Jo, 13, was rescued near the spot where the younger girl disappeared. Barbara Jo was taken to Providence hospital where her condition was described as good.

Harris Edward Quade of Sundial moorage picked up three of the girls in his boat when he saw they were in trouble. Two unidentified men rescued the other exhausted girls.

Blood Transfusion Equipment Arrives

The Jackson County Civil Defense office has received its first stockpile of blood transfusion equipment from the state civil defense agency, according to Col. Charles E. Stafford.

The county's first allotment is 216 cases of bottles (six bottles to a case), and nine cases of donor sets (144 sets to case). The shipment is a part of the CD blood plasma program and will form the nucleus for a permanent stockpile for Medford and vicinity, the director added.

Col. Stafford noted that the life of each donor kit was only 18 months and that a rotation would be made with a constant replenishment of old kits. These kits, he concluded, will make it possible to transfer blood from one patient to another when the need arises.
