

AFL Will Support Adlai Stevenson Sans Endorsement

Atlantic City, N.J.—(U.P.)—The American Federation of Labor will not publicly endorse Gov. Adlai Stevenson for the presidency although "95 per cent of the AFL Political Education Group is for the Democratic nominee," a top official said today.

"The Political Education Group will not break its 28-year tradition of silence in regard to choice in the presidential campaign," the spokesman said.

Overwhelming Support
However, the sentiments of various groups and committees within the AFL indicated overwhelming support for Stevenson, he added.

The AFL executive council is holding its regular quarterly meeting here.

In the opening session of the five-day meetings Monday, the policy-making group charged "profligate" had put the nation in grave danger of runaway price inflation. The executive council urged that President Truman take prompt action—although it did not specify calling a special session of Congress—to halt the rise in the cost of living.

Trumanite Faces Formidable Foe In Arkansas Vote

Little Rock, Ark.—(U.P.)—Gov. Sid McMath, who has the blessing of President Truman, faced formidable opposition in the person of a self-styled "country judge" Tuesday as he sought re-nomination as governor of Arkansas.

McMath tangles with Chancellor Francis Cherry, Jonesboro, Ark., in a run-off ballot of the Arkansas Democratic primary election, which failed to give either man a clear majority for the nomination.

Mr. Truman faced the possibility of another rebuff by the voters only a week after Missouri rejected a candidate he had endorsed. The president has expressed warm approval of McMath.

Last Tuesday Stuart Symington easily won the Democratic nomination for U.S. senator from Missouri from J. E. Taylor, attorney general who had the President's support.

Driver of the truck was Elmer Melving Reynolds, Independence. He was not cited by police. He told officers he had been driving at a normal speed on busy State street when the girl entered the street at an intersection and struck the back of the truck.

The girl's parents said she had been sent to the grocery store Monday when the accident happened.

Lumber Mill Waste Plant Being Built

Pilot Rock — (U.P.) — Construction was underway Tuesday on a \$5,000,000 plant here which will utilize lumber mill wastes to make soft and hard-board products.

The installation covers 35 acres. It is expected to be in operation by September of next year.

Prophet Sees Tough Time for Communists

London — (U.P.) — Old Moore's trained prophet looked into 1953 Tuesday for the benefit of his many clients and predicted that things will be tough all over the Communist world next year, especially in the Kremlin.

This is Old Moore's 255th year in the prophecy business and it knows how to deal with skeptics. It published today in its almanac and Prophetic Hieroglyphic Engravings a list of predictions that came true — and only a cad would bring up the ones that didn't.

Hitler Act Predicted
Among other things, said Old Moore's, it predicted: Hitler's seizure of Austria, the general strike of 1926 "to the day," the atom bomb on Japan, the abdication of King Edward VIII, the winner of the 1951 Lincolnshire handicap.

Therefore, continued its current seer, it would be well to take note that next year: "In the Soviet Union many disquieting internal incidents will occur leading to a loss of prestige and a change of policy of the present leaders."

Subversive Incidents
In January there will be "subversive incidents" in Bulgaria and Rumania; in March a counter-revolution will break out against Red China; in September the threat of revolution will reach Russia itself and by October the Soviet internal situation will be a matter of acute worldwide interest.

Old Moore's says that in the rest of the world 1953 will be generally a good year although some European countries will suffer from currency troubles.

Plan for 6-State Student Exchange Set by Commission

Portland — (U.P.) — The Western Regional Commission for Higher Education Tuesday established machinery Tuesday to enable six states to exchange students beginning in the fall of 1953 in the fields of medicine, dentistry and veterinary medicine.

The proposals of the commission, which was originated by the Western States Governor's Conference, will be presented to each state legislature to become effective in 1953.

Cost reports were the chief object of discussions at Timberline Lodge Monday. Further studies will be made and prepared for the respective legislatures.

Medical education is available in Oregon, Colorado and Utah; dentistry in Oregon, and veterinary medicine in Colorado.

Observers were present from California, Washington and Wyoming, state, which are not yet participants in the regional compact but which have indicated a desire to know more about the organization.

Utah Man Chairman
Dr. O. Meredith Wilson, University of Utah, was re-elected chairman of the commission; Tom L. Popejoy, University of New Mexico, vice-chairman.

Salt Lake City was selected permanent headquarters for the commission.

Collective Bargaining Right Denied Firemen

Portland — (U.P.) — A move by Portland firemen to get the right of collective bargaining and arbitration was turned down Monday.

By a four to one margin, the city council refused to put on the November ballot the proposed charter amendment. Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee was the only one voting for the measure.

Commissioners William A. Bowes and N. A. Boody said the measure was discriminatory because it included only one bureau, was not in the public interest and was an abrogation of the powers of the council.

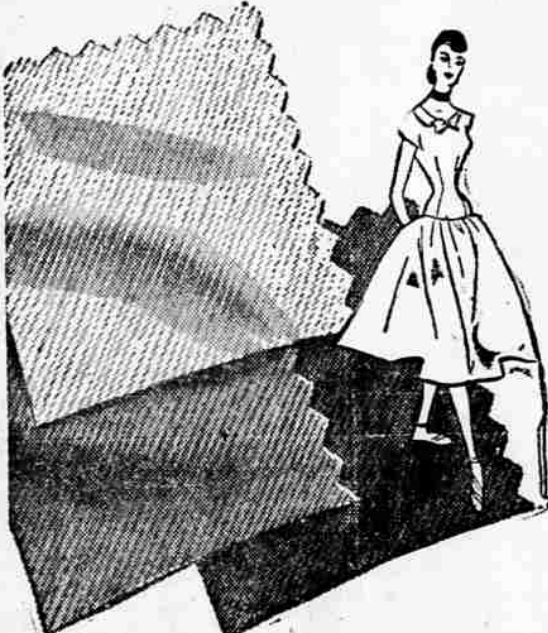

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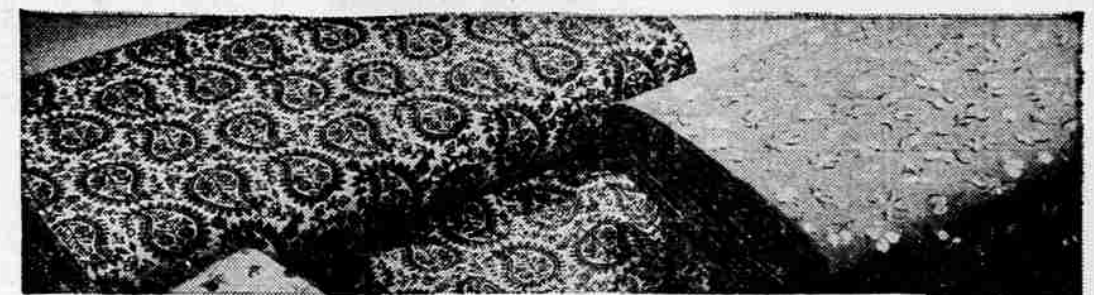

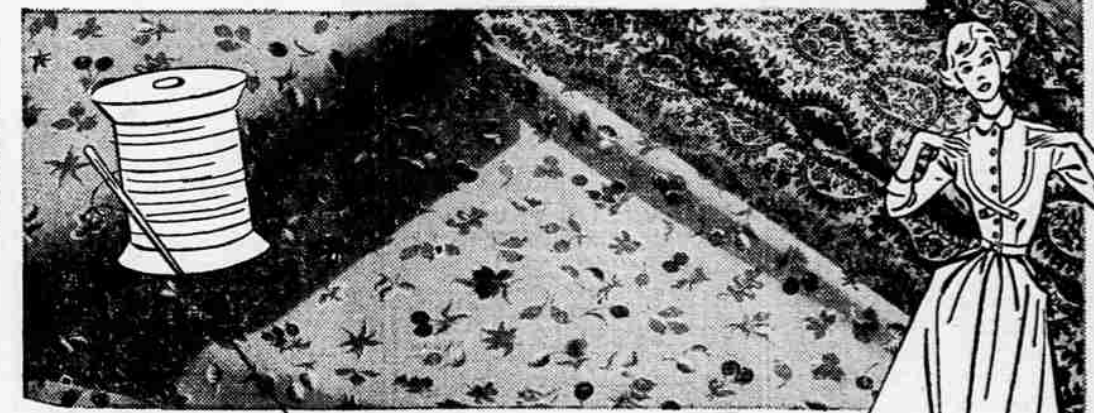

QUILTED FASHIONS HIT A NEW HIGH!

The "Quilted Fashion" is expected to hit a new high, carrying over from spring into summer! This fashion has really "caught on"—Women like it! It was not designed only for cold weather—a survey shows that women prefer it in the south even in warm weather.

Quilted dresses, jackets, and vests are designed for every occasion—sports, afternoon and evening wear. Capes, coats and evening wraps are being added to many of the spring and summer lines.

You can find just about any combination of fabrics in this fashion that you want. It gained popularity in the cotton field, but now you can find crisp silks and rayons too, in every solid shade of the rainbow. Some are printed, the gold printed designs proving very popular. You'll find glistening white quilted skirts studded with brilliants, and some with an added painted or embroidered decorative design.

If you enter into the spirit of the "quilted fashion," we have a recommendation to make and a reason for making it:

In making a quilted fabric, a filling called "batting" is placed between two separate and distinct fabrics. It is held in place by a quilting thread. The quilt stitching may be in a variety of patterns or designs, but it is done for one purpose... to achieve that "puffed" look. To maintain the resilience of the batting... to retain that quilted effect... have your garment cleaned and finished by a professional cleaner. Our modern steam-air finishing equipment is so designed that the fabric can be steamed and finished without the use of pressure. Home pressing will flatten the fabric and destroy the appearance you liked when you bought the garment.

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
