Local Golfer Tops Oregon Shotmakers

Eugene — (U.P.) — A 17-year-old California shotmaker led a field of 139 into Tuesday's final 18-hole qualifying round of the National Junior Chamber of Commerce golf tournament here for players under 18.

Tommy Jacobs, Montebello, Calif., fired a four - under-par 68 Monday to better by three strokes the 71 shot by his nearest competitor Don Bishop of Ogden, Utah. He was the only two players to crack par over the tough Eugene Country club course.

In Medal Play
The low 100 scorers after Tuesday's play go into the 72-hole medal competition starting Wednesday and lasting through Saturday.

To be decided Tuesday was the four-man team title. Florida led after the first 18 holes with 305, followed by California with 307, Minnesota with 310, Alabama with 311 and Texas with 312. Oklahoma's defending champions were far off the pace with 334.

In third place individually was Buddy Manderson, Tuscaloosa, Ala., with 74.

Smith Has 75
Knotted at 75 were Justin Smith, Jr., Medford, Ore.; Jim Lucius, Northfield, Minn.; Herbert Klontz, Ottumwa, Ia.; Jerry Stohland, Maplewood, La.; and Gene Howard, Augusta, Ga.

Smith's 75 topped Oregon's scorers, Dick Twiss of The Dalles and Mike Starling of Eugene shot 82's, Leighton Tuttle of Eugene had 83, and Bob Prall of Salem an 84.

Dick Madsack of Olympia and Robert Boyd of Tacoma led Washington's entries with 82's. Jim Moody of Tacoma had an 83 and Bob Seeds of Vancouver 93.

Central Point Scene Of Softball Play-Off

Julius Boros Wins Playoff For Tam O'Shanter Crown

Chicago — (U.P.) — "How lucky can one man get?" pro golfer Julius Boros asked Tuesday.

"I win only two tournaments all year," he added, "and they're the two big ones."

Boros won prestige in June when he came home in front in the National Open Tourney at Dallas, but Monday he picked up cold cash on a down payment and dividend plan when he whipped Dr. Cary Middlecoff, an ex-Memphis dentist, by two strokes to win Tam O'Shanter's \$75,000 "world" tournament.

Split Top Prize
Boros, a Connecticut Yankee now playing out of Mid Pines, N.C., actually didn't take home

the entire \$25,000 first prize, since he and Middlecoff in a pre-match deal agreed to split the profit, including the \$12,500 second prize, evenly after provision for taxes.

To add to this \$37,500 melon, they received half of the gate receipts, \$200 per head from about 2,500 spectators. But Boros, who shot a four-under-par with a Garrison finish on the last five holes, gained a cushion for his 1932 tourney swing, too. He was credited with the entire \$25,000 first prize to increase his 1932 earnings to \$34,332.97 and virtually guarantee him top ranking as money winner this year, an honor which pays off in appearance money at \$250 per tournament next year.

Finishing Drive
Middlecoff, who won the National Open Crown in 1949, controlled their match Monday for the first 13 holes as he went two under par and Boros got one under for the first nine. Then Boros started his finishing drive with a two and one half foot putt for a birdie three on the 14th and that squared the battle.

TO DEFEND CROWN
Washington, D.C. — Mason Kline Jr., San Francisco, Calif., surprise winner of the 1951 National Smallbore Rifle championship on his home range last year, will defend his crown at the National Rifle association's 67th renewal of the championships at Jacksonville, Fla., August 21-24. The young Golden Gate city shooter, now an ensign in the Navy, will put his national title on the line against 250 of the nation's best sharpshooters. A national title rifle shoot is being held in Florida for the first time since 1916.

The appointment of Oliver "for the 1952 season" was announced by Yale's Athletic Director, Bob Hall. Oliver, a star tackle in his collegiate days with Villanova, has been head coach at Villanova and Loyola of Los Angeles where his combined record showed 50 victories, 31 defeats, and two ties.

Mickey Mantle Rated No. 1 Switch Hitter

They still speak in almost reverent tones of Babe Ruth and Joe DiMaggio in Yankee Stadium and no fresh 20-year-old kid will ever replace the memory of their exploits, but Mickey Mantle Tuesday stood as potentially greater than either of them.

Not that he'll hit the home runs of the Babe or field with the grace of DiMaggio or perhaps deliver in the clutch like Joltin' Joe. But already they're hailing him as the greatest power switch-hitter of all time.

Already he has hit some of the longest homers on record around the American League and particularly in the Stadium—both to right and left fields.

Powers Two
Monday night, swinging from the left he delivered two homers in a single game for the first time in his meteoric major league lifetime. The blasts pro-

vided Allie Reynolds with all the help he needed to beat the Red Sox 7 to 0.

As Reynolds spun a two-hitter against the Red Sox who haven't scored on him in Yankee Stadium in two years, Mantle delivered his first homer in the first inning—right at the foul pole. The Red Sox protested it was a foul ball, but they had nothing but grudging admiration for the second smash. It went to the back of the right field bull pen on the fly, 450 feet at least.

Reynolds, who struck out seven but walked eight, gained his 14th victory and fifth shutout and the Yankees went in front by 2½ games once more.

Indians Rained Out
The second place Indians were rained out of their game with Detroit, while the Senators topped the Athletics 6 to 5 with an unearned run in the ninth inning, then dropped the second game 2 to 1 as lefty Alex Kellner pitched seven-hit ball to gain his ninth victory. The Browns and White Sox also were rained out.

In the National League, the Dodgers took their biggest lead of the season, moving nine full games ahead of the Giants by splitting with the Phils while New York lost a pair to Boston 11 to 10 and 4 to 2.

The Phils were 7 to 2 victors as Robin Roberts won his 18th game and his seventh in a row in the opener, but Brooklyn rebounded to take the second game 9 to 5 with a home run spree in the sixth inning. The Cubs slammed down the Cards 10 to 2, and the Reds topped the Pirates 10 to 4 in other National League games.

The commission said hunters wanting tags for hunting in Area 2, opening August 23 and Area 3, opening August 30, must have their applications in by August 14. Area 1 comprises portions of Klamath, Deschutes, Lake and Harney counties; Area 2, portion of Lake and Harney counties, and Area 3, portions of Harney and Malheur counties.

More Birds Seen For Duck Hunters In Coming Season

Washington — (U.P.) — Director Albert W. Day of the Fish and Wildlife Service said Tuesday that hunters can expect more bird targets during the 1952-53 hunting season than a year ago.

The increase will range from "slight" to "major," he said, depending on the section of the country.

Day based his forecast on data gathered at water fowl breeding grounds this spring and summer. He reviewed the information last week before members of the water fowl advisory committee, but Day's forecast was not made public until today.

He gave this forecast by flyways—the skylarks water fowl follow in migrating north and south:

Pacific—The fall flight of ducks in the Pacific flyway will show a moderate to considerable increase over 1951 while the goose flight may be about the same.
