

BLOODY RIOTING BREAKS OUT IN EGYPT

Marines Turn Back Third Red Attack On Strategic Hill

Huge Gaps Torn In Communist Lines

Seoul Korea—(U.P.)—American Marines, in their "toughest battle" since they've been on the Western Front, tonight slammed back the third Chinese attack on Bunker Hill in 29 hours.

The Leathernecks tore huge gaps in the lines of an advancing Chinese battalion—approximately 750 men—that struck at 9:05 p.m. under a sky luridly lighted by shell fire.

Reds Charge Recklessly
At 10:15 p.m. a Marine spokesman said, the attack was broken.

The Chinese charged recklessly through an intense barrage from their own artillery and mortars.

Big guns kept on throwing shells into Allied lines after the Red infantrymen broke and ran. Allied artillery boomed in reply.

Third Try
It was the Reds' third try since 4 p.m. Tuesday to knock the Marines off the strategic height, five miles east of the truce village of Panmunjom.

Maj. Gen. John T. Senden, commander of the 1st Marine Division, said the fight for the hill was "the toughest battle since we've been over here" on the Western Front.

State Institution Job Openings Told

Salem—(U.P.)—Job openings for a supervisor of industries for the blind and for a food manager at the state penitentiary were reported Wednesday in Salem.

The State Civil Service Commission said applications are being taken for examinations for someone qualified to supervise industrial projects for blind persons. The job involves production, home industry programs and sales of material produced.

Starting pay is \$336 a month and preference will be given to applicants who are physically handicapped themselves.

Warden Virgil J. O'Malley said applications for the penitentiary job must have had extensive experience in large scale food management. The position offers a salary of \$4828 a year.

Korea War Veterans' Applications Taken

Washington—(U.P.)—The Veterans administration announced Wednesday that it is accepting applications from Korean war veterans for education and training under the new GI bill.

It said a limited number of application forms are now available at the VA regional offices and additional forms will be available next week. The agency said, however, that while veterans may apply for training under the law prohibits the educational allowances for any period beginning before August 20.

Warning Issued on Psychotic Veterans

Portland—(U.P.)—A Veterans of Foreign Wars official issued a warning Wednesday against allowing veterans in need of psychiatric care to freely roam the streets.

Col. George E. James stated "psychotic veterans left wandering the streets because of a lack of hospital space are becoming an increasing menace to the public."

Two Destroyers Crash 50 Miles Off San Diego

San Diego—(U.P.)—Two destroyers collided during "routine exercises" 50 miles off San Diego Wednesday but both ships were headed toward port under their own power, the Navy reported.

Headquarters of the 11th Naval district said the destroyers were the USS Gregory (DD802) and the USS Marshall (DD676).

Eisenhower Launches Verbal Attack Aimed At Democratic Party

Denver—(U.P.)—Dwight D. Eisenhower took off the gloves in his presidential campaign Wednesday and launched a broadside attack on Democrats in general and the Truman administration in particular.

The GOP nominee's sharpest outburst yet in his bid for the White House was prompted by the visit to Washington Tuesday of the Democratic presidential nominee, Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, and the talks Stevenson had with President Truman and other government officials.

Formal Statement
Eisenhower issued a formal statement from his headquarters here in which he said it had become evident Stevenson "is subservient to the political forces which have too long been in power in our country."

"The American people want a change, not just for the sake of change," Eisenhower said. "They want more than a change of names and faces."

"They want a change in order to replace corruption with honesty; reckless spending with economy; inflation with economic stability; mismanagement in foreign affairs with clear-cut policies and programs for positive peace; brazen assertions of 'inherent power' with constitutional government, both in spirit and deed."

Three Specific Points
Eisenhower raised three specific points in connection with the Stevenson visit:

1. He objected to a military briefing by Gen. Omar N. Bradley, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. The GOP nominee said this "implied a decision to involve our government in political affairs of our government which bear heavy responsibilities in our national defense organization into a political campaign in which they have no part."

2. The meeting "signified that the present administration is de-

Situation Unchanged In Meat Packing Tiff

Chicago—(U.P.)—Walkouts ended at some meat packing plants today but new work stoppages cropped up at others in a dispute which threatens to develop into a nationwide packing plant strike.

So far, the sporadic walkouts had caused no meat shortages and only minor dislocations in the normal channeling of livestock.

But negotiations here covering major plants across the country appeared to have hit a stalemate.

Stevenson Called 'Helpless Captive' Of Harry Truman

Springfield, Ill.—(U.P.)—Sen. Richard M. Nixon, Republican vice-presidential nominee, invaded the home grounds of Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson Wednesday and called him a "helpless captive" of President Truman.

Nixon arrived in Springfield to deliver the major speech at Republican Day at the Illinois State fair and charged the governor won the Democratic presidential nomination with the aid of "political bosses."

Staff Invited
Meanwhile Stevenson sent out invitations to his campaign advisory staff to meet with him over the week-end to discuss election strategy.

The governor will have a chance to reply to Nixon's blast when he speaks at Governor's day at the fair.

Nixon said Stevenson is "truly a hand-picked candidate, and that the hand that picked him was that of Harry Truman."

Harry's Hand To Rule
"The Democratic ticket will be known as the Truman-Stevenson ticket from now on out," the youthful California senator said. "The voice will be that of Stevenson but the hand will be that of Harry Truman."

Stevenson flew back Tuesday night from a conference with the President and his Cabinet in Washington. Wilson Wyatt, his personal campaign manager, announced the campaign advisory committee of the Democratic nominee has been summoned to the governor's mansion for major discussions Saturday and Sunday.

Nixon said the "only possible interpretation" of Stevenson's visit in Washington is that:

"Stevenson was there to get a briefing on how he can best carry forth the Truman policies; and to marshal for his campaign the great resources of the federal government, which, incidentally, belong to the American people and not to any political party."

Administration Officials Contradict Each Other On Rising Food Price Issue

Washington—(U.P.)—High officials of the Truman administration were contradicting each other right and left Wednesday on the subject of rising prices.

Some capital quarters thought the President himself might have to step in soon to break up the public feuding between Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall, Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer, and Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan.

Stevenson Ducks Row
Gov. Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, took himself neatly out of the row which began boiling up last week when Arnall went to the White House to plump for a special session of Congress to strengthen price controls.

Stevenson, at the end of his

visit here Tuesday, announced through a spokesman that he feels that "any decision on a special session will have to be made by the people here who know whether it is desirable or necessary."

Mr. Truman, who has full constitutional authority to call Congress back any time he thinks necessary, has said only that he is considering Arnall's suggestion.

Brickbats Tossed
Arnall has been ducking verbal brickbats from his fellow administration officials ever since he told Mr. Truman—and the public—that food prices are about to "get out of hand," partly as a result of the long drought in farming areas.

Granvil Brittsan Files for Ward 1 Council Position

Granvil F. Brittsan, 1129 Niantic street, filed a petition Tuesday to be placed on the November ballot as a city council candidate from Ward 1.

Brittsan is the second candidate from the first ward to file a petition with the city recorder's office. John Snider, the present councilman from that ward, filed more than a week ago.

Brittsan was born and raised in Jackson county and is a Mason and a Shriner. During World War II he served with the armed forces in the South Pacific area. He is now manager of the O. K. market, 1202 North Riverside avenue and has two sons, both of them in high school.

Two Petitions Checked
Petitions for Jack Fitzgerald and Dick Woodcock, candidates from the fourth and second wards, respectively, have both been checked and found to have enough signatures, according to Deputy Recorder Miss Neva Samuels.

With less than two weeks remaining to enter petitions, no candidates for mayor have filed. Mayor Diamond L. Flynn announced he will not be a candidate for reelection. A petition for Councilman Paul Selby has been circulated, but it is still out. Other petitions for mayor are out, according to the recorder's office, but it is not known for whom they are being circulated.

Recorder Ralph Woodford has warned that the deadline for petitions for city offices is August 30. However they must be filed by August 26 to provide time to have the signatures checked, according to Woodford.

Battle Casualties Now Total 114,685

Washington—(U.P.)—The Defense Department announced Wednesday American battle casualties in Korea now total 114,685, an increase of 375 over last week's summary.

The casualties include those whose next of kin were notified through last Friday. They do not include all casualties to that date because it requires from one to three weeks to notify next of kin.

The total since the beginning of the Korean war includes 20,167 deaths, 82,134 wounded, 9,466 missing, 1,553 captured, 1,385 previously missing but returned to military service.

Jet Plane Crashes On Firing Range

Fort Lewis, Wash.—(U.P.)—The public information office here said Wednesday a jet fighter plane from McChord Field, Wash., has crashed on a firing range at the fort.

Details of the crash were lacking, but officials said no one was killed.

The unidentified pilot was reported to have escaped injury, but the occupant of the radar compartment was believed to have suffered a broken leg.

Five Persons Die In First Violence Since Army Coup

Alexandria Under State of Emergency

Cairo—(U.P.)—Five persons were killed and 33 injured Wednesday in a bloody outbreak of rioting and arson in the ultra modern Kafr el Dawar cotton mills near Alexandria. It was the first civil violence since the Army coup which ousted King Farouk.

A state of emergency was declared in Alexandria, Egypt's second largest city, when the riot broke out among 5,000 workers in the sprawling factory town 25 miles away.

Reason Not Known
Reports from Kafr el Dawar said two soldiers, one policeman and two workers were killed. Eight policemen, one soldier and 24 workers were injured.

The reason for the outbreak was not immediately known.

Workers set fire to bales of cotton, the sprawling spinning and weaving factory, and the administrative building.

Fire damage was estimated at \$1,158,000.

Cabinet Budget Slashed
The outbreak came as Premier Aly Maher's government slashed the Royal Cabinet's budget by nearly two-thirds and boosted high bracket income taxes in its anti-corruption campaign.

At the same time, the all-powerful Army, which put Maher in power in a military coup last month, asked the government to order an arbitrary 10 to 30 percent cut in rents. The government was certain to comply as part of the campaign by Maher and Army strongman Maj. Gen. Mohammed Naguib to wipe out corruption, stabilize Egypt's economy and ease the plight of the nation's poor.

Wilsons To Get Truth Serum Test

Walla Walla—(U.P.)—Turman and Utah Wilson, brothers scheduled to hang early Friday for the 1950 kidnap-murder of Jo Ann Dewey, submitted to a "truth serum" test Wednesday.

Warden John Cranor of the state penitentiary said the truth serum, sodium pentothal, will be administered by Dr. Sol Levy, clinical director at Eastern Washington State hospital.

Cranor said he knew nothing more of the test than that "it definitely will be given." It was not known if anything the Wilsons said after taking sodium pentothal would be made public.

At Olympia, Gov. Arthur B. Langlie approved the use of the truth serum although he did not request it. The test was suggested by Tom Smith, former warden of the state prison, and attorneys for the Wilson brothers.

Smith is working on the Wilsons' case for Argosy magazine's "court of last resort."

Airport Terminal Building Started

Construction work at the Medford municipal airport is proceeding satisfactorily according to City Superintendent Robert Duff. Erection of the terminal building has begun, he said.

Steel posts for the four-story Civil Aeronautics administration are in place, and workmen are starting to put up the frame for the building. The CAA is conducting tests preliminary to the installation of an instrument landing system.

Conduits under the building for the weather bureau, the CAA and the air lines have been installed and the foundations poured, Duff said. Plans for a sewer and drainage system have been completed.

Bill Seeks Direct Vote For Primary Elections

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—Sen. Blair Moody says he and Sen. Paul Douglas, D-Ill., are drawing up a bill to have presidential nominees chosen by direct primary.

The Michigan Democrat told a press conference here, however, that national political conventions would still be necessary, but only to draft party platforms.

Prineville—(U.P.)—Sen. Guy Cordon, R-Ore., planned Wednesday to confer with Indian leaders about use of Indian land for the controversial Pelton dam project.

Arrival in Medford Ends Girls' Lengthy Trip on Horseback

A couple of trail riders arrived in town yesterday afternoon. Except for getting lost one day in the Siskiyou mountains, they reported the trail fine from California, and the people along the way "superb—they're just wonderful."

A hundred years ago some of the pioneers might have disagreed with them as to the people along the trail, especially the bandits and Indians, but would have highly approved of their method of travel, the horse.

Some of the riders in these parts might be a little startled to learn that the strangers in town were women, instead of men, who decided to meander some 350 miles from Greenville, Calif., 30 miles southeast of Lassen Volcanic National park, up to pasture a horse in the Rogue river valley.

The old timers around here might warm up a little, however, when they find out that the girls didn't even lose one shoe on any of their three horses during the whole trip, and had "so much fun" that they want to start back within the next couple of days and do the same thing all over again, in reverse.

Some of the more modern timers who favor horseless carriages might think the latter is pushing a good thing too far, but they had better meet and absorb a little of the pioneer enthusiasm of the two trail-weathered young ladies.

To begin with, 22-year-old Shirley Goodell, a Greenville school teacher, was trying to decide how to get her horse, Token, up to pasture at the home of her uncle, George Flanagan, at Elk City Lumber company north of Medford, when a friend jokingly said, "Why not ride?"

Court Corrects June Statement
A correction of the monthly statement of the Jackson county court proceedings for June, as released by the court, was made this morning "in view of the erroneous impression gained by the public," according to court members.

Truman Establishes Political Liaison
Washington—(U.P.)—President Truman Wednesday set up a close political liaison between the White House and Gov. Adlai Stevenson's campaign headquarters in Springfield, Ill.

Two presidential assistants, David Bell and Clayton Fritchey, flew back to Springfield with Stevenson Tuesday after the Democratic presidential nominee spent three and one half hours discussing campaign strategy with Mr. Truman.

Establishment of the liaison was the only concrete result of the Truman-Stevenson meeting to come to light immediately.

Pipefitters' Strike Hits Atomic Project

Paducah, Ky.—(U.P.)—A pipefitters' strike at the billion dollar atomic energy project near here spread Wednesday with the establishment of pickets, and half of the 18,000 workmen were reported off the job.

The strike started Monday night when some 1,900 pipefitters employed by the W. M. Kellogg and Co. walked out. They were followed Tuesday by more than 600 employees of McGraw Construction Co., major contractor at the plant.

Since then the strike has spread steadily.

Middle Aged Doctors May Face Draft Call

Washington—(U.P.)—Selective Service officials said Wednesday that sooner or later they may have to start drafting middle aged physicians and dentists.

Draft questionnaires already are being mailed to all physicians and dentists under 51 who have not previously served in the military forces or have not served since Sept. 16, 1940, the date on which the nation's first peacetime draft law was enacted.

Portland—(U.P.)—A. R. Hartung, president of the CIO International Woodworkers of America, said Wednesday that Jack Kroll, director of the CIO political action committee, would speak at the Woodworkers convention here Sept. 15-18.
