MAN SNUBS STEADY WORK, WIFE MUST CONTROL PURSE

Hand - to - mouth living is very precarious. You never know, from one minute to another, what will turn up to upset the situation. The young mother who wrote the following letter is beginning to realize this:

(Q) "I have been married for two years and we have a baby 11 months old. My husband is good to us but he does not work regularly. He hasn't had more than one full week out of every month since we were married. I even went to work to help him out, thinking that might change him but it didn't. If I try to persuade him to go to work, he doesn't speak to me for days. Every time a little money comes in, he'll take off and then I'll have to use what I saved for the bills. The way things are going, neither the baby's nor my future is secure."

(A) No one can count on complete security but you are entitled to at least reasonable security for yourself and your child. This you do not have nor does your husband show any appreciation of the importance of such security.

Unless there are relatives on either side of your family who can or will help you out in an emergency, you must be prepared to be self-reliant.

That means, you are the one who must manage the family income and you must drive your husband to harder work, even if it does annoy him and make him grumpy.

It is ridiculous for a married man to think he can get along with working only one week a month. If he can't get more work in his present job, there are plenty of other jobs avail-

able. Insist that he work and earn more money.

Then, insist that he give you all or nearly all of his earnings to manage for the family. You can turn over a reasonable sum for his pleasures but he cannot have pleasures at the expense of the family's security. Keep your hands on the purse strings if you want to have any security in your life.

HOW TO GET INFECTED

Infection is defined as the process of invasion of the tissues by disease-producing micro-organisms which produce injury. Note that in this definition nothing is said about "weather permitting."

I cannot vouch for the source of the story but it is scientifically acceptable. It concerns a class in medical school yawning through a lecture on the common cold. The instructor, halfway through his canned speech and noting the disinterest of the class, called for volunteers to "catch cold" in order to provide actual clinical instruction on the subject.

"Well," asked the volunteers, "how do you catch cold?" "Tsk-tsk," responded the instructor, "everybody knows how to catch cold. Go out and get wet and chilled and stand in a draft somewhere." Ten of the twelve volunteers did just that. The other two, with time off for the purpose, decided to skip the whole thing and went to a movie instead.

Yes, you're right. Two days later, the only students who had "colds" were the two who had gone to the movies. It is generally known that the nose and throat of perfectly healthy persons contains a large variety of disease-producing germs. The quaint notion still persists in unenlightened quarters that wetting, chilling and the like, decreases the "resistance" of a person to these germs.

The facts are that a person is immune to his own germs as long as they are confined to the usual sites and that infection, as such, only occurs when someone else's germs invade the tissues. If such were not the case, it seems doubtful that the human race could survive very long. The Eskimos, for instance, despite the chilling to which they are constantly exposed, catch "cold" only when visitors from the south arrive. But while the "common cold" is not one of their main disorders, they are extremely susceptible to tuberculosis which passes from one to the other. The element of chief importance is CONTACT or close proximity. If you want to get infected, get in close contact with a person who has an infection. The weather has nothing to do with this.

It has long been known that tuberculosis strikes hardest amongst the malnourished victims of unsanitary surroundings. Nevertheless, most health departments insist that a child not be allowed to live in a house where any one with active tuberculosis lives—despite the factors of nutrition and sanitation, good or bad, which may affect them. Here again the element of CONTACT or close proximity is stressed as the factor of impor-

tance. Even a well nourished person in sanitary surroundings can be infected by contact.

The person who attributes his "cold" to a drafty office or shop, or to cold or damp weather, is simply ignorant of the facts. The parent who bundles up a child with overcoats, mufflers, parkas and the like with the thought that such "protection" against the weather will prevent the child from "catching cold" or catching anything else is kidding himself.

The parent who keeps a child indoors because the weather is "inclement" and subjects the child to all the accumulated disease-producing germs contained in the atmosphere of the overheated, "draftless" house, serves only to perpetuate the hoary malarkey of fish-wives and prattlers to the detriment of the health of the child.

I repeat: Infection is caused by germs—not by weather.

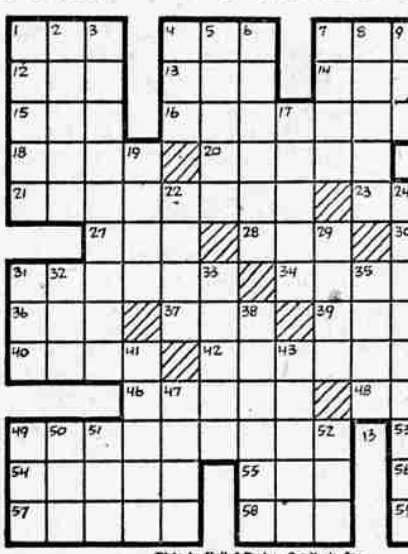

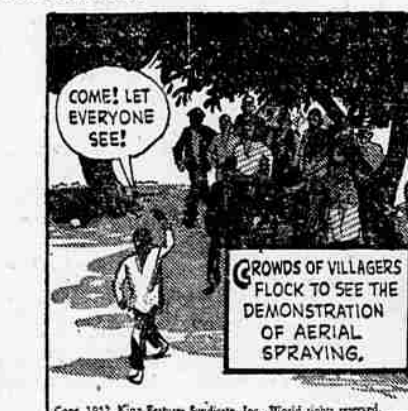
