WILSON BROTHERS' FATE RESTS WITH GOVERNOR; UTAH TO BE QUESTIONED

Convicted Killers Scheduled To Hang Early on Friday

Langlie Gets Report On Truth Serum Test

Olympia — (U.P.) — Gov. Arthur B. Langlie must make a life or death decision for Turman and Utah Wilson, brothers scheduled to hang at 12:05 a.m. Friday for the 1950 kidnap-murder of JoAnn Dewey.

The governor received a detailed report Thursday on the testimony of the condemned brothers after taking truth serum (sodium pentothal) at the Washington state penitentiary Wednesday night.

To Study Report

Langlie will go over the report with Van Hinkle, supervisor of public institutions who questioned the brothers after Dr. Sol Levy of Eastern State hospital administered the drug.

A preliminary report of the tests was telephoned to Harold Van Eaton, director of institutions, but he said only the governor was in a position to release any of the testimony.

Turman Goes To Sleep

Turman was first to take the truth serum test, but the initial dose put him to sleep for two hours and it was necessary to begin all over with him.

Should the test fail to save the Wilson brothers from the gallows their attorneys were expected to attempt last-minute legal maneuvers aimed at a fourth stay of execution.

Three times in the past two weeks Irvin Goodman and Sanford Clement, Portland attorneys, have been successful in preventing the executions. Twice the case has gone to the U.S. Supreme Court only to have the higher court refuse to review it.

During the past few weeks petitions asking the governor to commute the death sentence of the brothers to life imprisonment have been circulating in Washington and the Portland area.

And ever since the first execution date was set, a standing request for commutation of the sentences to life imprisonment has been before the governor. Langlie's position consistently has been that he must be shown evidence which indicates the courts were wrong before he can step in and change the judgment of the courts.

From the date of their arrest and throughout their confinement, the Wilsons have steadfastly maintained they are innocent of the murder of 18-year-old Miss Dewey near Vancouver, Wash.

Crewmen Bail Out; B-29 Demolished

Ritzville, Wash. — (U.P.) — An Air Force B-29 was demolished when it ploughed into a wheatfield near Ritzville early Thursday after its crew of 15 had bailed out safely.

Col. M. G. Zumwalt, commander of Fairchild Air Force Base at Spokane, said the crew members suffered only minor cuts and light bruises in their "very satisfactory" bailout.

The bomber, piloted by Capt. John Heraty, was attached to the 11th strategic reconnaissance squadron at Fairchild and was on a routine training flight. Names of the other crew members were not immediately available.

Sweetland Declines Request To Seek Help For Wilson Brothers

Portland — (U.P.) — Monroe Sweetland, Democratic national committeeman from Oregon, said Thursday he had turned down a request to seek help from President Truman to try and halt the scheduled execution early Friday of Turman and Utah Wilson for the 1950 slaying of JoAnn Dewey. Sweetland said the request was made by Rev. Allen Lambert, Portland, who is a member of a group working for clemency for the brothers. He said he did not believe such action was within the jurisdiction of the president.

Top Hungarian Posts Shuffled; Rakosi Premier

Budapest — (U.P.) — Matyas Rakosi, secretary-general of the Hungarian Communist party and undisputed leader of the country was elected premier Thursday in a reshuffle of two of the nation's top posts.

Rakosi, who has been vice premier since February, replaced Istvan Dobi, who resigned as premier and was promptly elected president of the Hungarian presidium.

Ronal Resigns

Dobi replaced Sandor Ronai who also resigned in the shake-up. No new post was announced for Ronai.

The presidium, or presidential council, is a 21-member group which exercises the functions of parliament in between parliamentary sessions. It has power to dissolve government bodies and annul legislation and is the nation's top official authority.

Elected by Acclamation

Rakosi was elected by acclamation with an eight-minute demonstration in a special session of the national assembly. Rakosi, balding boss of the nation's Communists for many years, has been considered the actual head of the government ever since he moved into the vice premiership.

Strikes Continue In Meat Industry

Chicago — (U.P.) — The nation's meat packing industry walked on cats paws Thursday as hit and miss strikes hit plants across the country and contract negotiations bogged in Chicago.

Officials of the CIO United Packinghouse Workers said they would meet Thursday with Armour and Co. and Wilson after all day sessions with Swift and Wilson Wednesday failed to produce an agreement.

Top union officials maintained their stand they would not call a walkout as long as negotiations continued, but individual union groups gave notice they might walk out at any time.

Southwest Sizzles in Prolonged Heat Wave

The Southwest sizzled in a prolonged heat wave Thursday while portions of the Midwest cleaned up damage from tornadoes which took one life.

Elsewhere, scattered thunderstorms were forecast for the East Coast south of New England, and for drought-stricken Tennessee, the Upper Mississippi Valley, the Rocky Mountains and the Northern Plains.

Possibility Seen Linking Brother With Two Slayings

Multnomah County Murders Studied

Walla Walla — (U.P.) — Utah Wilson, condemned to die with his brother, Turman, at 12:05 a.m. Friday for the 1950 kidnap-slaying of JoAnn Dewey, said a Portland, Ore., sheriff offered him his life Thursday in exchange for a confession to two 1948 murders.

The sheriff immediately denied he had made any such offer.

Multnomah County Sheriff Terry Schunk talked with Utah in his death row cell Thursday morning about two Multnomah county murders.

Schunk said he did not talk about the Dewey case at all, since his office did not work on that case. He said there were three deputies in the cell with Utah and himself during the questioning and said they would verify his denial.

Portland — (U.P.) — Sheriff Terry Schunk said Thursday that Utah Wilson would be questioned about two unsolved 1948 slayings in Multnomah county.

Utah and his older brother, Turman, were scheduled to hang at 12:05 a.m. Friday for the 1950 kidnap-murder of JoAnn Dewey.

Strong Possibility

Schunk said, "we think there is a strong possibility that Utah was responsible for, or involved in, two Multnomah county murders. We are investigating those murders; not getting involved in the JoAnn Dewey murder."

The sheriff said the new investigation was based on wire recordings of conversations in the Clark county jail between Utah and Turman which were recorded by Earl Anderson, former Clark county sheriff. He added that other leads have also been run down.

Slayings Listed

The unsolved slayings listed by Schunk were those of Roman Marion Podlas, 29-year-old merchant seaman, and Pierre Alfred Schultze, 47. Podlas' body was found floating in a shallow creek the day before.

Schunk said Deputy Sheriffs Walter Graven and Jack Willis had worked for a week on the case. He said efforts were redoubled when the word "Podlas" suddenly emerged from continued playing. Since then, the sheriff said, much other revealing material was discovered in the recordings.

Last-Minute Response Puts Over Blood Drive

A "gratifying last-minute response" was credited with putting the August blood drive far over the quota, according to Red Cross volunteers. Yesterday at the Elks' temple 227 pints of blood were donated.

The bloodmobile unit processed 283 persons. The quota here was processing of 250 persons and 200 pints of blood. Blood drive officials said it was the large number of "drop-ins" that made the program a success.

The Medford Elks were particularly commended for their cooperation in the drive.

Byrnes Would Place Ike as Independent

Columbia, S. C. — (U.P.) — Gov. James F. Byrnes, who recently whipped South Carolina Democrats into the party fold, has thrown his support to a move to put Republican presidential candidate Dwight D. Eisenhower on the South Carolina ballot as an independent Democrat.

Byrnes declined to comment on his signature at the top of a number of petitions being circulated to enter an independent Eisenhower slate upon the general election ballot.

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MAYOR D. L. FLYNN Agrees To Run

Mayor D. L. Flynn Bows to Requests To Seek Reelection

Mayor Diamond L. Flynn has changed his mind and will seek a third term as mayor of Medford, he announced today. His petition containing 45 signatures was filed this morning with Deputy Recorder Neva Samuels.

The mayor announced July 6 that he would not be a candidate for reelection because of personal considerations. He said then that the city's growth has made the mayor's position a much greater burden, both financially and physically.

In announcing his change of mind, Flynn said he has been urged by many to continue in the office. Both common citizens and civic leaders have asked him to remain as mayor, he added.

Would Complete Program

Flynn said he decided to run for reelection because he wants to see the program outlined by the city council carried through to completion.

Mayor Flynn took office Jan. 1, 1949, and besides his Medford duties he is a director of the League of Oregon cities. This group also urged him to remain in office because the progress of the league is so closely identified with its member cities.

Mayor Flynn is the first candidate to file for the mayor's office.

Five Candidates

There are now five candidates for the four city council posts up for election this November. There are two candidates in Ward 1—the incumbent John Snider and Granvil Brittain. Candidates in other wards are Harold Frye, incumbent, Ward 3; Jack Fitzgerald, Ward 4, and Dick Woodcock, Ward 2.

Less than two weeks remain before the deadline for filing petitions for city offices.

CIO Urges Support For Adlai Stevenson

Washington — (U.P.) — The CIO urged its members Thursday to support Democratic nominee Adlai E. Stevenson for president to ensure "an unflinching continuation of the best traditions and ideals of the New Deal and Fair Deal."

The CIO executive board, top policy making body of the organization, said the Illinois governor is well equipped "by background, training, and experience, to fill with honor the presidency."

The CIO added that Stevenson will "lead the fight to enact into law the great promise of the Democratic platform," which it hailed as "the most liberal, forward looking, and realistic ever adopted by any political party."

Stevenson May Visit Oregon Next Month

Portland — (U.P.) — Adlai Stevenson, Democratic candidate for president, may visit Oregon early next month, Monroe Sweetland, Democratic national committeeman, said Thursday.

Sweetland said "it looks pretty definite that Stevenson will be here early in September." He said he thought the nominee would stop in several Oregon cities in a swing up the Pacific coast.

Sweetland said he received word of the impending visit from Democrats mapping Stevenson's campaign itinerary but "I can't give you the exact source of my information."

Ike Turns Down HST's Invitation

Candidate Feels Briefing Would Bring Confusion

Denver — (U.P.) — Dwight D. Eisenhower, Republican presidential nominee, politely but firmly rejected Thursday an invitation from President Truman to attend a White House briefing on the foreign situation.

Eisenhower told Mr. Truman in a 300-word telegram he felt that under present circumstances any communications between them "should be only those which are known to all the American people."

He thought it would be "unwise and result in confusion in the public mind" if he were to attend a White House meeting.

The GOP nominee thus took a position contrary to that of Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, the Democratic presidential candidate, who attended a White House Cabinet meeting and foreign policy briefing Tuesday.

Eisenhower had been sharply critical of Stevenson's visit to Washington. He said it showed the Democratic nominee is "subservient" to Mr. Truman's political forces.

In his telegram to the President Thursday, Eisenhower made a point of noting that he was not invited to attend a briefing until after Stevenson had returned to Springfield, Ill.

Eisenhower's Staff Members Included

At Washington the White House disclosed that the invitation was for next Tuesday and included any member of Eisenhower's staff that the GOP nominee wanted to include at a Cabinet luncheon.

White House Press Secretary Joseph Short said the invitation to Eisenhower had been "in the works" prior to the visit to the White House by Stevenson.

Short said it was Mr. Truman's intention to follow the same briefing procedure with Eisenhower that he did with Stevenson.

In giving his reasons for turning down Mr. Truman's invitation, Eisenhower said he felt it was his duty "to remain free to analyze publicly" the policies of the present administration whenever it appeared to him to be proper to do so.

"During the present period the people are deciding our country's leadership for the next four years," Eisenhower told the man who, as commander-in-chief, was the boss when Eisenhower was a five-star general.

"The decision rests between the Republican nominee and the candidate you and your Cabinet are supporting and with whom you conferred before sending your message."

Confusion Seen
"In such circumstances and in such a period I believe our communications should be only those which are known to all the American people. Consequently I think it would be unwise and result in confusion in the public mind if I were to attend the meeting in the White House to which you have invited me."

The GOP nominee did accept one offer of Mr. Truman's. He said he would welcome the weekly report of the Central Intelligence Agency. Head of this agency, Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, was one of those who participated in the briefing of Stevenson.

Eden Takes Boss' Niece As Bride In London Rites

London — (U.P.) — Blushing Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden was married to his boss' niece Thursday with Prime Minister Winston Churchill standing by as chief witness and—some say—matchmaker.

10-Minute Ceremony

The handsome 55-year-old British foreign service glamour boy and Miss Clarissa Spencer Churchill were married in a 10-minute ceremony at Caxton Hall—the scene this spring of the marriage of actress Elizabeth Taylor and British actor Michael Wilding.

In the cream painted marriage room Eden and Miss Churchill sat on red leather upholstered chairs before Registrar J. B. Holiday, who also married Miss Taylor. The guests sat on plain wooden chairs behind them or lined the flower-banked walls of the little room.

There were no curtains on the windows. They were sent to the laundry and had not been returned in time for the ceremony.

Giadulus and other flowers from Churchill's country home at Chartwell banked the room. The civil ceremony was necessary because Eden has been divorced. It does not contain the "obey" clause of church weddings.

Approximately 7,000 persons jammed the narrow street outside.

Aly Khan Leaves for Reunion With Rita

New York — (U.P.) — Prince Aly Khan walked up a red carpeted airplane ramp Thursday and took off for Hollywood with 175 pounds of excess baggage, bent on winning back his princess, Rita Hayworth.

The handsome Moslem said he didn't think they'd meet at the airport, however. And he said he would be staying with "friends," not with his wife.

But "obviously, I'll see her when I get there," he said. (See Story Page 1, Sec. 2)

McCarthy's Opponent Ends 25-Hour Radio 'Talkathon'

Madison, Wis. — (U.P.) — An opponent of Sen. Joseph McCarthy finished a 25-hour radio "talkathon" in good voice, and the Florida idea man who engineered the scheme said it would free politics of the "smoke-filled room."

Leonard Schmitt, who hopes to win Wisconsin's republican senatorial nomination from McCarthy, finished his oral ordeal at 9 p.m. Wednesday. His hair was tousled and his shirt unbuttoned to the second button, but his voice was still firm.

Summarizing Opposition

Schmitt answered questions from 8 p.m. Tuesday until 8:48 p.m. Wednesday and then spent 12 minutes on a summary of his opposition to McCarthy's charges of Communism in government.

He fired answers to the questions, which came from the studio audience and by telephone from the listening public, at the rate of one-per-minute.

Marines Set for Another Assault By Communists

Planes Concentrate Support Missions

Seoul, Korea — (U.P.) — Rain-soaked U.S. Marines, their trigger fingers itching, steeled themselves Thursday for another Communist night assault on bloody Bunker Hill and this time they promised the enemy a "clobbering."

Col. Walter F. Lyster, regimental commander of the Marine unit now holding the height east of Panmunjom, expected the Chinese Communists to launch a fifth counter-attack Thursday night.

Ready for Them
"And if they do," he said, "we will clobber them. We're ready for them now."

Leathernecks defending the strategic hill have battered back four Communist assaults, crippling an entire Red regiment in the process. The last two attacks came Wednesday night and early Thursday.

Support Concentrated

Fifth Air Force warplanes concentrated their close support missions in the Bunker Hill area Thursday, hitting enemy bunkers, soldiers and gun positions.

For the third straight day, UN Sabrejets failed to sight any Communist MIG-15 jets, but fighter-bombers struck troop concentrations near Yonan and Sariwon and bombed a Red airfield north of Pyongyang, the North Korean capital.

Heavy Rain Falls

Heavy rain that fell Thursday gave a brief respite to the dirty, tired Marines who have fought and won against 2,800 veteran Communist soldiers in scorching heat for the past three days.

Earlier Thursday, the victorious Marines planted a torn and stained battleflag dedicated to Saint Michael the archangel on Bunker Hill. It was later removed when the unit to which it belonged was relieved.

Aviation Groups Set Meeting Today

The aviation committee of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce will meet with representatives of the aviation committees of the Grants Pass, Klamath Falls and Ashland chambers this evening to "help formulate the basic thoughts" concerning proposed air service between Medford and Klamath Falls.

The group will meet at 6:30 p.m. in the Pioneer room of the Jackson hotel. Don Lane, manager of the Jackson county chamber, said representatives from the other organizations have been invited to attend because this entire area is affected by the proposed service.

Frank J. Van Dyke, chairman of the local chamber's aviation committee, will preside over the dinner meeting.

Cooler Temperatures Ease Fire Dangers

Cooler temperatures and higher humidities eased fire dangers over Oregon Thursday, but one major fire broke out in eastern Lane county and continued to burn uncontrolled despite the efforts of a large crew of firefighters.

Guy Johnson, forest service regional fire dispatcher, said authorities believed the Lane county blaze started from a fisherman's campfire on the Blue river about 45 miles east of Eugene near the McKenzie highway.

McCarthy's Opponent Ends 25-Hour Radio 'Talkathon'

The Miami, Fla., advertising man who invented and copyrighted the "talkathon" said his new campaign device will push the "smoke-filled room" out of politics.

"It's a philosophy," Bob Venn said of his "talkathon." "It means the smoke filled room is gone... in time anyway. It makes a candidate's commitments public."

Can't Tell Lie
"If a guy tells one lie," Venn said, "people will gang up on him. A candidate can't tell a lie if he wants to use the talkathon."

The "talkathon" is a marathon-type radio question and answer show, combined with a fund drive, in which a candidate airs his political views and aims. The next politician who will use the "talkathon" will be former Price Stabilizer Mike DiSalle, who is running for the Senate against incumbent Sen. John Bricker, R-O.
