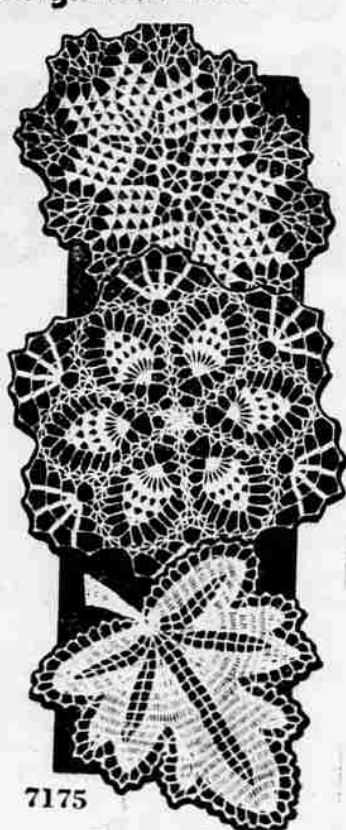

Siletz Application Returned to PUC

Salem — (U.P.) — An application for higher rates for log shipments on the 41-mile-long Valley and Siletz railroad was back in the hands of the State Public Utilities Commissioner Thursday.

The State Supreme Court Wednesday reversed a decree of Judge Charles W. Redding in Multnomah county circuit court and handed the application back to the PUC to enter correct findings.

In the original suit, the railroad, which extends from Independence to Valse, had claimed the prescribed rates were confiscatory and would result in a loss of \$25,000 annually. George H. Flagg, then public utilities commissioner, was the respondent in the appeal to the Supreme Court.

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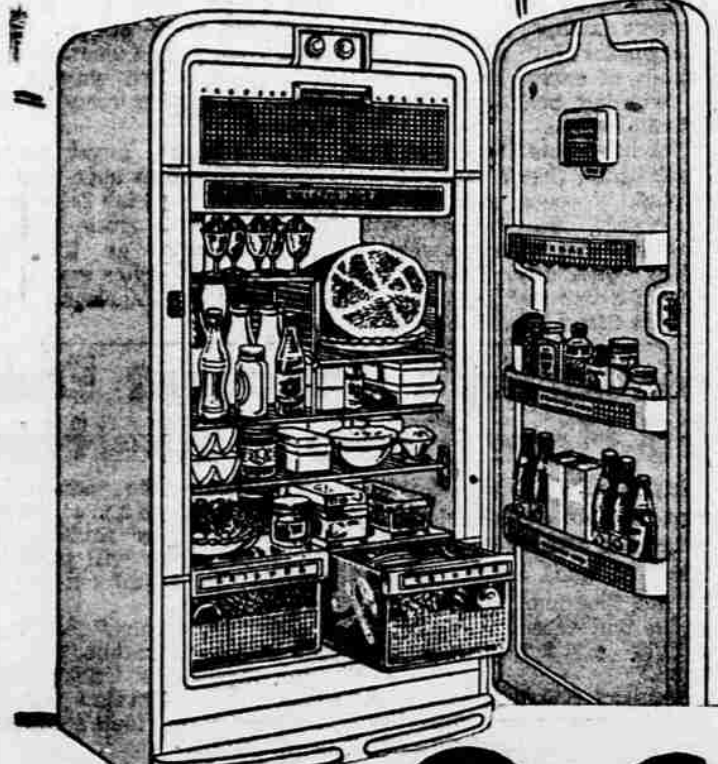
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
