

Giant Hopes Boosted by Farm Boys

The Giants looked into the future brightly Thursday because of three farm boys—Clint Hartung, Jim Rhodes, and Al Corwin.

It is the "immediate future" that interests Manager Leo Durocher who never was one to "wait for next year." And he thinks the results obtained already give him more than a mathematical chance for a second straight miracle.

Down nine full games to the Brooks after splitting Wednesday's day-night doubleheader, the Giants will have to go like fury to come close—let alone catch up. But the performance of the three men in the 8 to 4 night victory after Brooklyn's opening 5 to 4 triumph made Leo beam.

Hartung Standout
Hartung particularly stood out, even though he was charged with a throwing error on a wet ball after a 55-minute rainstorm that let in two Dodger runs. Clint more than atoned for that lapse by driving in three runs with a pair of doubles.

What made this significant was that in 21 games last year, he drove in only two runs and hit only one double. The one-time wonder boy's confidence apparently was restored in his stint this year at Minneapolis.

Rhodes came through with three runs batted in, too, on a double and a single and Corwin, who pitched scoreless ball until the rain, yielded only one earned run and was a strong figure in the third Giants victory over Brooklyn in a week. He was the winning pitcher in the other two.

The Dodgers got an even break when Peeewe Reese singled in the winning run in the opener in which both Bobby Thomson of the Giants and Gil Hodges of the Brooks hit three-run homers.

State Squad Adds Scolari

57 Acres of Hops Fall at Grants Pass

Grants Pass — Fifty-seven acres of hops belonging to Roy Lathrop and Sons on Lower River road collapsed Wednesday. That totals 77 acres of the 250-acre crop. 20 acres on the home place on Upper River road going down Sunday.

The 57 acres comprise what are known as the Rhinehart, Hamilton and Dennison places, Mrs. Roy Lathrop said.

As in the case of the Melvin King crop last week, the Lathrops believe the fallen crops will be within the 40 per cent of total production which must be withheld from market under the 1952 hop-marketing agreement.

Frank Costello To Enter Prison Cell on Friday

New York —(U.P.)— Gambling czar Frank Costello is scheduled to change his address Friday from fashionable Central Park West in Manhattan to a prison cell at Danbury, Conn.

Barring an 11th hour legal maneuver, which appears unlikely, the fashionplate of the underworld will surrender to federal authorities Friday to begin a 18-month prison term for contempt of the United States Senate.

Request Turned Down

Costello's last chance to stay out of jail faded Wednesday in Washington. Supreme Court Justice Robert H. Jackson turned down his second request to remain free on \$5,000 bail while he seeks a review of his case by the nation's highest court.

The term at the federal correctional institution at Danbury will be Costello's first stretch behind bars in 37 years. He served a short term for illegally carrying a gun in 1915.

Eligible for Parole

Costello, identified by the Kefauver crime committee as the kingpin of a New York-Miami gambling axis, will not prison dungarees in place of the expensively tailored suits which are his trademark.

The 61-year-old gambler will be eligible for parole in six months. He can continue to press his appeal while serving his sentence.

Crops Suffer Severe Damage in East, South

Minneapolis —(U.P.)— "The Cargill Crop Bulletin said Thursday crops suffered serious damage in Eastern and Southern states before rains ended the severe drought in those areas.

The report said feed supplies are short and will continue so, forcing importation of hay and feed grains "and in numerous cases the reduction of livestock herds."

The report said "drouth continues to hamper crops in the Southwest and to cause further concern for the winter wheat crop about to be harvested."

Stevenson Urges States To Stop Government Drift

Springfield, Ill. —(U.P.)— Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson asked today for votes to send him to Washington and urged the States to stop the "tidal drift" of government to Washington.

"The people will demand the services and if they don't get them at home they will turn to Uncle Sam," he said. "And every dollar you send to Washington to pay for them will shrink before it gets back home."

First Formal Speech

Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, voiced his this warning in a speech prepared for delivery at Governor's Day at the Illinois State Fair. It was his first formal speech since his address accepting the presidential nomination at the National Convention three weeks ago.

While speaking of the responsibilities of state governments, he ridiculed charges — particularly those from Sen. Richard M. Nixon, the Republican vice presidential nominee, who spoke here Wednesday — that he is a "captive" candidate.

"They say I am a captive of the city bosses and then of the CIO, and then of the Dixiecrats, and then of President Truman, and then of Wall Street, and then of an organization called ADA," Stevenson said.

Not Uncomfortable

"I had no idea I was so popular and I hope I can bear this multiple courtship and captivity with becoming modesty... it's not too uncomfortable to be captured by most everybody except the Republican Old Guard."

He spoke of the responsibilities of the States after pointing with pride to his record as governor for the past three and one-half years. He said such work is important because the States are important.
