Marines Turn Back Fifth Enemy Try To Capture Hill

Chinese Casualties Reported Heavy

Seoul, Korea — (U.P.) — Two hundred Chinese Communists charged up Bunker Hill in a driving rainstorm Friday in a sixth attempt to capture the strategic height, but American Marines again cut them to pieces with a deadly rain of shell fire and machinegun bullets.

The Chinese, apparently the survivors of a regiment that once numbered more than 2,000 men, launched their surprise attack without benefit of preparatory artillery.

Uselessness Seen
For 55 minutes they charged into the volleys of Marine bullet before the Communist commander saw the uselessness of it and called for a retreat.

It was the second assault Friday by the Chinese Reds. Earlier, 300 enemy troops, apparently ordered to recapture the hill or die in the attempt, fell before the sharpshooting Marines.

Bodies Litter Slopes
Bodies of dead Chinese littered the slopes of Bunker Hill. United Press Correspondent Frederick C. Panton said it was obvious from the smell alone that the Reds were suffering heavy casualties in their futile attempts to oust the leathernecks.

Panton said the accurate Marine shooting has prevented the Reds from removing their dead. The 8th Army announced the Marines have inflicted nearly 2,100 casualties on Chinese troops since the Bunker Hill battle began. The figures include 271 Chinese dead, 626 believed dead and 1,183 wounded.

American Thunderjet fighter-bombers blasted a North Korean coastal defense base today, destroying 30 buildings at the base north of Koson on the Korean east coast. Marine warplanes struck an airfield north of Sariwon and cratered the runways and their bombs.

U. N. F-86 Sabrejets searched North Korean skies for Communist MIG-15 jet planes, but for the fourth straight day no MIGs were sighted.

**Barkley To Retire
From Public Life**
Springfield, Ill. — (U.P.) — Alben W. Barkley says he plans to retire from public life when his term as vice president ends next January.

The 74-year-old "Veep" told a Democratic rally at the Illinois State Fair Thursday "I expect to retire from office" at that time. He said he'll be leaving "a public life I have enjoyed for 40 years."

Barkley delivered a rousing hour long speech during which he criticized Republican presidential nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower for supporting congressional candidates who Barkley said differ from Eisenhower on foreign policy.

**Flapjacks Flipper
Sentenced to Jail**
Portland — (U.P.) — Chester M. Phillips, 35-year-old merchant seaman, is spending 90 days in jail and must pay a \$25 fine.

He admitted to Municipal Judge John J. Murchison Thursday that he tossed a plateful of hotcakes at a woman in a downtown cafe.

"It was a short stack," was his only explanation.

**Reconciliation 'Possible'
As Prince and Rita Meet**
Hollywood, Calif. — (U.P.) — A reconciliation between Aly Khan and Rita Hayworth seemed possible Friday after the debonair prince came to the star's home for dinner and wound up staying until three in the morning.

Khan literally ran into Rita's Beverly Hills mansion Thursday night for dinner immediately after he arrived from New York lugging 75 pounds of toys and gifts for Rita and his daughter.

Emerges at 3 a.m.
As he left his limousine he told his chauffeur, "I'll only be a minute."

He didn't emerge from the house again until 3 a.m., about an hour after a houseboy had sent the chauffeur away, indicating that the prince planned

Eisenhower Advisers Grin Over Confusion Of Truman Invitation

Denver — (U.P.) — Dwight D. Eisenhower's campaign advisers chuckled Friday over the confusion in Washington about the top-secret reports on world affairs that the GOP presidential nominee was supposed to be told about but wasn't.

Associates of Eisenhower figured that, at least for the moment, they had the Democrats on the defensive. The big question was how to keep them there.

May Take Advantage
Eisenhower himself may take advantage of the situation next week when he makes a couple of public appearances. He will go to Boise, Idaho, Wednesday for a conference of Western Republican governors, and to Kansas City, Kan., the following day for a meeting of Republican candidates for office.

These occasions will provide the Republican presidential candidate with a sounding board to keep after the Democrats if he desires to try to keep on the offensive.

Invitation Declined
The feeling of "we've got 'em on the run, boys" started early Thursday when it was announced that Eisenhower had declined an invitation of President Truman to attend a luncheon and foreign affairs briefing in the White House next Tuesday.

Mr. Truman's offer to entertain Eisenhower in Washington came after the GOP nominee had sharply criticized a similar visit to the capital by the Democratic presidential nominee, Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois.

After the Eisenhower rejection of Mr. Truman's invitation had been made public, the president told a news conference that a week or 10 days ago Eisenhower had been offered top-secret reports on world affairs.

Offer Not Received
This statement of the president's brought an immediate huddle of Eisenhower's advisers. After considerable searching of files Arthur H. Vandenberg, Eisenhower's executive assistant, said that no such offer had been received here.

Later it developed that Gen. Omar Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, had been asked by Mr. Truman last Thursday to see that Eisenhower was offered the reports. But Bradley said that "being unfamiliar with political matters," the timing of the notification to Eisenhower appeared to him to be unimportant.

**Mercy Flights Carries
85th Passenger to SF**
The 85th Mercy Flights passenger, a Roseburg woman, was taken to San Francisco this morning in the air ambulance service's twin Cessna plane, according to Mercy Flights representatives. She was accompanied by members of her family.

The woman was taken from Roseburg to San Francisco for emergency X-rays. The plane, piloted by Lee Flink, left here at 11:30 a.m. after stopping at the Medford municipal airport for gasoline.

**Two Klamath Falls Men
Drown in South Umpqua**
Dillard — (U.P.) — Two Klamath Falls brothers drowned in the South Umpqua river near here Thursday as the 7½-year-old son of one of them watched helplessly from the bank.

Drowned were Everett Reed, 36, and Roland Reed, 29. Sheriff's deputies said the brothers apparently decided to go swimming after a day of picking beans on the Hoy Rice ranch.

Local Television Channel Permit To Be Requested

Sheldon Sackett Tells Of Application Plans

Sheldon Sackett, publisher of the Coos Bay Times and owner of radio stations KROW in Oakland, Calif., KOOS in Coos Bay and KVAN in Vancouver, Wash., today announced plans to file for television outlets in Medford, and in Walla Walla, Wash.

In a telegram to the Mail Tribune from his headquarters in San Francisco, Sackett said the applications to the Federal Communications Commission for very high frequency channels for the two cities would be filed by two newly-formed corporations headed by himself. The corporations are named MED, Inc., and "WW, Inc.," respectively. Call letters will be KMTV for Medford and permission will be sought for the station to operate on channel 4 VHF.

No Television Now
Both Medford and Walla Walla are presently unserved by television.

Sackett said at least 30 percent of the common stock of both corporations will be owned by managers active in the conduct of the stations or other stations for which he has previously made application. "Stock will be sold or subscribed only by men active in the operation of the television outlets," he stated.

Contracts to equip both stations have been confirmed, according to Sackett who said he planned to construct a 500-watt station here at an estimated outlay of \$350,000 including equipment, buildings and working capital. It will, if permission is granted, have a high gain antenna permitting grade A television service to surrounding towns including Ashland, Central Point, Jacksonville, and B. plus service to Grants Pass. The Walla Walla station outlay will be about \$400,000.

Region Studied
The new applications, Sackett said, follow an exhaustive research into the economic and social background of the areas. He added that the program structure contemplates not only entertainment facilities to the area served, but extensive programs dealing with political and cultural life of the communities.

He said every reasonable effort would be made to press for an early grant of the applications.

While new corporations are to be formed to handle the applications, control of the companies will rest with Sackett who is presently, through existing corporations, applicant for television outlets in Oakland-San Francisco, Calif., Vancouver, Wash.-Portland, Ore., and Coos Bay, Ore. Application for the Oakland-San Francisco station was filed in October 1947 and for the last two named stations in June 1952.

**Salem Police Warned
On Political Activity**
Salem — (U.P.) — Salem's police officers were warned Friday they may lose their jobs unless they stop circulating petitions to amend the city charter.

The police force has been seeking to change Salem laws to permit a 40-hour week in the department, but City Attorney Chris Kowitz said "employees in the classified civil service are prohibited from activity engaging in promoting or opposing any political measure or charter amendment."

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Convicted Killers Wonder at Future As Reprieve Heard

Innocence Maintained In Truth Serum Test

Walla Walla, Wash. — (U.P.) — In their cells at the Washington State penitentiary at Walla Walla, Wash., Utah and Turman Wilson were wondering Friday what the future holds for them.

Granted a 90-day reprieve by Gov. Arthur B. Langlie Thursday, one of the brothers expressed the wish officials would stop investigating them.

"We wish they would stop investigating us and investigate the JoAnn Dewey case," Turman said quietly.

Langlie said the Wilsons maintained their innocence under the influence of truth serum administered Wednesday and that, although he doubted the validity of the test, he felt the reprieve would provide a safeguard against any possible miscarriage of justice.

"Well, that's the longest one we've gotten yet," Utah said to his brother after Warden John Cranor notified the brothers of their fourth reprieve just 30 minutes before they were to be shifted to the death cell.

Sentenced To Hang
The Wilsons are under sentence to hang for the 1950 kidnap-slaying of JoAnn Dewey. Their case has twice gone before the U.S. Supreme court only to have the high tribunal refuse to review it.

The boys' mother threw her arms around her sons and wept Thursday when notified of the reprieve. No arrangements had been made by the parents for disposal of the brothers' bodies because they were confident of a reprieve.

Langlie said he asked Howard L. Barkdull, Cleveland, O., president of the American Bar Association have a bar committee investigate all phases of the Wilson case.

Meanwhile, a new snarl developed Thursday when Utah Wilson, through the brothers' attorney, issued a statement which said Sheriff Terry Schunk, Portland, Ore., offered him his life in exchange for a confession to 20 1948 murders.

Schunk, who talked with Utah in his cell Thursday morning, immediately denied the statement and said there were three deputies in the cell with Utah and himself during the questioning who would verify his denial.

A statement issued jointly by the brothers thanked Langlie for the reprieve and stated that "God doesn't choose that we should die for these crimes that we didn't do."

**General Foods Faces
Anti-Trust Charges**
Washington — (U.P.) — The Federal Trade Commission Friday charged General Foods Corp., which markets such familiar groceries as Birds-Eye frozen foods, Jello and Maxwell House coffee, with three violations of the Clayton anti-trust act.

The complaint charged discrimination in pricing and distribution and in payments for certain customer services and facilities.

The FTC said the firm's gross sales in 1949 exceeded \$500,000, and that its alleged discriminations could be substantially lessening competition or creating an illegal monopoly.

Salem — (U.P.) — An increased number of cases of blackleg in Willamette valley cattle was reported Friday by Dr. R. R. Younce, veterinarian with the State Department of Agriculture.

DOUBLE BAD LUCK
New York — (U.P.) — Aaron G. Bass, 40, ran into some tough luck Thursday when his car was stolen and wrecked. But he ran into tougher luck when the police recovered it. In the glove compartment police found 11 traffic tickets Bass had ignored. He was brought into court and fined \$96.

**Cordon Will Discuss
Reclamation With Ike**
Portland — (U.P.) — Sen. Guy Cordon (R.-Ore.) is in Denver Friday to meet Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, GOP presidential nominee, for a discussion of reclamation and public works in the western states.

Cordon said he was confident of a Republican victory on the November ballot and, following his visit with Eisenhower, will meet with the GOP senatorial campaign committee on his return to Washington.

Airplane Mishap Fatal To Brookings Publisher

U. S. Pledges To Support Campaign Against Weapons

Would Protect Against Aggression

United Nations, N. Y. — (U.P.) — The United States Friday pledged support for the elimination of all weapons of mass destruction, "including atomic, chemical and biological weapons."

But the U.S. warned the United Nations Disarmament commission it does not intend, before safeguards have been agreed upon, "to invite aggression by informing would-be aggressors and charter-breakers we will not use certain weapons to suppress aggression."

Red Agreement Asked
U. S. Delegates Benjamin V. Cohen, again denouncing Communist germ-warfare charges against American forces in blistering terms, asked the Soviet Union to agree to the Western proposed plan for verified arms census. He sought to ensure that preparations for waging war with weapons of mass destruction shall not be carried out in peacetime.

He said: "We believe as the Soviet delegate maintained in 1932 at a League of Nations conference on chemical and bacteriological weapons that paramount importance should be attached 'not to the prohibition of chemical weapons in wartime, but to the prohibition of chemical warfare in peacetime.'"

**Paul Selby Endorses
Flynn's Candidacy
For Medford Mayor**

Following Mayor D. L. Flynn's announcement yesterday that he will seek a third term as mayor of Medford, the only other avowed candidate for the position, City Council President Paul Selby, announced this morning that he is endorsing the election of Flynn.

In his statement, Selby said "I am indeed happy to learn that Mayor Diamond L. Flynn has reconsidered, at the insistence of his many friends, and though contrary to his personal wishes, has decided to again offer to serve the city of Medford for another term as mayor."

Experience Important
"I know that Mayor Flynn has served unselfishly in the past and will wholeheartedly serve in the future. Needless to say, his experience in the past as mayor and a director of the League of Oregon Cities is of vast importance to the city in meeting the many problems of our city incidental to our growth and expansion."

Selby added that "From my personal experience, I know the great amount of time and effort that Mayor Flynn has given to the city."

"The first consideration of any member of the council or mayor should be the welfare of the city, and this is shown by Mayor Flynn by his filing for the position of mayor."

Robinson Not Candidate
Fred L. Robinson, Medford businessman who has been mentioned for the mayor's position, said today that he "would not consider seeking the post" in view of Mayor Flynn's decision to seek reelection.

No other candidates for the city council or mayor posts had filed with the city recorder by noon today. Deadline for filing petitions is Saturday, August 30. However, Recorder Ralph Woodford has pointed out that petitions must be in his hands by August 26 to insure a complete check of signatures before the deadline.

Rakosi Elevation Completes Russian Reorganization

London — (U.P.) — The elevation of Matyas Rakosi to the premiership of Hungary completes Russia's reorganization and streamlining of Communist leadership in its eastern European satellites.

The formal as well as the actual power in every country behind the iron curtain is now concentrated in the hands of one man directly responsible to the Soviet Politburo.

In Line With Policy
This centralization of power is in line with Russia's general tightening of control over eastern Europe during the past year. The satellites are becoming more and more like Russia itself with each passing month.

Rakosi has been the most powerful Communist in Hungary ever since his return from the Soviet Union with the Russian army in 1945. He was leader and secretary-general of the Hungarian Workers' Party, as the Communist party is known in that satellite.

Was Only Deputy
But until Premier Istvan Dobi, a one-time member of the Smallholders' party who became a convenient front for the Reds, moved up to the figurehead post of Hungarian president Thursday, Rakosi had been only one of several deputy premiers in the government.

As new premier, Rakosi has moved into a position identical with that of four other Communist east European bosses. All hold top positions in both the Communist party and the government in their respective states.

**Two Women Safe
After Night in Woods**
Two Medford women reported lost in the woods near the Foster Creek camp were found safe today, according to Jack Wood, supervisor of the Rogue River National forest.

Reported lost when they did not return to the camp grounds last night were Mrs. Joe Dal-laire, 24, route 1, box 334, and Arlene Hooper, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Hooper, 1028 East 11th street.

Wood said the two campers were several miles from their camp when night fell, so they slept in the brush. A ranger sent from Union creek reported they were scratched up but otherwise unhurt when they walked into camp this morning.

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Pilot Seriously Injured in Crash Near Crescent City

Third Passenger Hails Motorist

Crescent City, Calif. — (U.P.) — Dewey Akers, 52 publisher of the Brookings-Harbor (Ore.) Pilot, was killed and two others are injured in the crash of a light sports plane late Thursday near the head of Gilbert creek, about three miles south of the Oregon-California border.

Injured were Roy Brimm, 50, a former sawmill operator and pilot of the plane, and E. D. Thornton, a Brookings service station operator. Brimm was brought to Seaside hospital here where attendants said both his legs were broken and several of his ribs fractured.

Made Way to Highway
Thornton, despite painful but not serious injuries, made his way from the plane wreckage to U.S. Highway 101 where he hailed a passing motorist and was brought here. A search party was organized immediately by Del Norte county sheriff's deputies.

The searchers reached the wreckage about 11 p.m. Thursday to find Akers dead and Brimm in serious condition. Brimm was carried out to the highway and brought here for treatment.

Crash Cause Unknown
The men left Gold Beach, Ore., in Brimm's Piper Cub Tri-Pacer for Brookings about 4:40 p.m., the Civil Aeronautics Administration reported.

The CAA said neither Brimm nor Thornton could explain how the accident occurred but a CAA spokesman said an investigation into the cause of the crash would be conducted.

**Stevenson Plans
California Visits**
Springfield, Ill. — (U.P.) — Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson probably will make two campaign swings through California this fall, it was disclosed Friday.

This tentative plan was revealed by California National Committeeman John Anson Ford, who conferred with Stevenson and Wilson Wyatt, campaign manager for the Democratic presidential nominee.

The AFL and the CIO and the American Farm Bureau Federation all were represented on the Democratic presidential nominee's calling list as he turned back to a heavy round of political talks. He spent most of Thursday in "Governor's Day" ceremonies for the Illinois State Fair.

**Turkey Growers Face
Marketing Problem**
Salem — (U.P.) — Oregon growers face a serious marketing problem, Gov. Douglas McKay said Friday as he urged the state to observe August 14 to 23 as "Mid-Summer Turkey Time."

Gov. McKay said materially increased national production, large local storage holdings, and heavy supplies of new crop fowl coming to market at low prices were to blame for the situation.

Oregon is one of the leading turkey producing states in the nation and its poultry industry makes an important contribution to the gross farm income of the state, Gov. McKay said.

BULLETIN
Washington — (U.P.) — The Soviet Union has rejected Big Three proposals to grant occupied Austria an early peace treaty, the State Department revealed Friday.

**Efforts To Force Commie
Registration Up To Board**
Washington — (U.P.) — Government efforts to force the communist party to register with the justice department — and thus put a crimp in red activities — now hinge on a decision of the subversive activities control board.

After 16 months of exhaustive hearings, a board panel finally has completed the taking of testimony and is drawing up a finding. If the board's verdict is that the Communist party is foreign controlled — and it is upheld by the courts — the Reds will be forced to open their membership lists to the government and individual members of the party will be subject to limitations.

The case is the first to be tried under the McCarran Internal Security Act passed in 1950. The law is aimed at curbing activities of Communist and Communist-front groups without actually outlawing the party.
