McCoy Released On Property Bond

Chester Henry McCoy, 36, 1401 Ashland street, Ashland, was released on \$1,500 property bond Wednesday afternoon, following confinement in the county jail on a warrant charging larceny of an automobile, according to the sheriff's office.
