Pickin' Pears

By SID HOLLINGSWORTH A look into the theater of Elizabethan England was enjoyed by six world war veterans from the Camp White domiciliary at the Ashland Shakespearean Festival the other evening.

The play was the immortal tragedy of Julius Caesar. The members were: Chris Rivers, James Shuffelbarger, Dean Stuart, Joseph Hill, Hans Sorenson and the writer. They went at the invitation of the Red Cross by motor corps transportation. Mrs. Martin Luther of the Gray Ladies, arranged the details of the party.

All were impressed by the simplicity and authenticity of the setting in the outdoor theater, and not a seat was vacant. The actors with their colorful and appropriately blended costumes formed a high relief against the plain background, divided as in Shakespeare's time into two parts, an upper or balcony stage and a lower, or main stage with no scenery and only a few props.

A third dimension was found in the short scenes which the great dramatist devised for the effect of interlude and transition before the curtain. There was no intermission—the acting going forward without interruption—a smart touch.

It was easy to get the real idea of the Elizabethan artists who made the "king's English" rise above other theatrical effects. In fact, the acting, slightly subdued in histrionic power, seemed to enhance the glory and effect of Shakespeare's poetic diction.

The lines were carefully spoken and the true plot as conceived by the master was apparent without the effect of modern microphone attachments. Stage effects such as lighting and thunder were used artfully, and nature added a few touches, especially as Cassius, pointing upward, exclaimed "the fault, dear Brutus, is not with our stars but with ourselves that we are underlings."

And there above was a full canopy of stars, bright in the heavens, with the North Star and the big dipper marking the time, as Caesar compared himself to the great Pole star, fixed and steady with the others moving about in their courses.

The entire cast performed as a unit, no part being played to transcend the others, except as intended by the part itself, an unusual treatment in Shakespearean acting. Credit then goes to the entire company for a well coordinated presentation.

An incident occurred on the way to Ashland, while driving into Medford from the domiciliary, showing a sense of alertness along the highway to the fire danger. Someone in a jeep drove around the Red Cross driver and motioned to pull over to the side. At first she thought it was a flat tire. Apparently the official personage was a fire warden. One of the men had tossed a cigarette out into the highway. He called this to our attention.

"While we are not in a forest area, the sparks from a lighted cigarette may start fire," he warned. It was agreed that such a procedure along the highway at this time is one way of becoming more fire conscious.

Young Reds Expected To Suppress Religious Feeling

London — (U.P.) — The pre-war days of militant atheism are back again in Russia and young Communists are expected to combat "religious prejudices" in their own homes, the Soviet press has revealed.

Komsomolskaya Pravda, official newspaper of the Komsomol, Soviet Communist youth league, which trains young people for admittance to the Communist party, stated at length Soviet Russia's case against religion.

The newspaper published a two-column reply to a Komsomol member, V. Gnilemedov, who had written asking if he had done well to remove an ikon (religious painting) from his mother's room although his mother believes in God and often prays.

"The statute of the Komsomol demands that every member of the organization take active part in the struggle against religious prejudices," Komsomolskaya Pravda declared.

"A member of the Komsomol is, therefore, an active fighter against religion."
