

CIO's Phil Murray Raps Eisenhower's Domestic Position

Washington—(U.P.)—CIO President Philip Murray Friday assailed the Republican Party and its presidential nominee, Dwight D. Eisenhower, who "is not acquainted with domestic matters."

Murray told a rally of about 300 CIO Political Action Committee leaders that the "average citizen" can find no "comfort or solace" in Eisenhower's candidacy.

Isolationism Charged

He also labeled many leaders of the Republican Party as "isolationists at heart, with the strange and foolish notion that America can live alone."

"The Republican platform reflects a state of political depravity," Murray said, but he told the PAC all labor groups can support the Democratic platform and national ticket "with perfect pride."

Stevenson Endorsed

The CIO executive board Thursday endorsed Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson, the Democratic nominee, for the presidency and warmly praised the Democratic platform.

Murray sarcastically referred to a speech at Galveston, Tex., four years back in which Eisenhower said the most complete social security was to be found in prison.

"That, of course, is a fine, statesmanlike, broad vision of what America should be," Murray said.

Split Threatened Between Factions Of Nudist Group

Mays Landing, N.J.—(U.P.)—There were signs of cleavage Friday among the nudists of America.

The definite possibility developed that the minority faction in the 21st annual American Sunbathers' association convention might take a walk.

A whole new Nudicard party could grow out of the bitter schism in the ranks, based on the "individual nudist autonomy" precepts advanced by Dr. Hsley (Uncle Danny) Boone, grandpappy of the nudist movement who was practically tossed out in Thursday's convention election.

Danny's Slate Beaten

This rump movement centered around Uncle Danny and the defeated slate which he nominated was headed by Alois S. Knapp, a white-haired, pancake-brown veteran in the nudist movement who lives in Rose-lawn, Ind., and has a law office in Chicago.

Knapp was defeated for the presidency Thursday by Mervin Mounce, a 43-year-old Spokane, Wash., contractor who is a power in the Northeast Sunbathing association. The vote was 1,457 for Mounce and 430 for Knapp. Most of the ballots were proxies, mailed in by stay-at-home nudists.

Uncle Danny said this trouncing by proxy was highly unethical and smacked of Communist methods. He said the proxy votes were recruited behind an iron curtain of secrecy.

Talent Rural Fire District Schedules August 18 Meeting

Talent — All persons living within the Talent Rural Fire association's district have been invited to attend an important meeting Monday, August 18, at 8 p.m. in the Talent city hall, according to Andrew Hawver, chairman of the board of directors.

Refreshments will be served at the meeting, which is an adjourned session from the August 4 meeting. Two directors will be elected at the gathering.

The district extends from the south limits of Phoenix to the Dutch Gus-Valley View corner, into the Valley View and Suncrest areas and also the old Pacific highway and the Anderson-Wagner creek communities.

Hawver expressed the urgent need for citizens living within the district to support the fire department which is in need of more money to pay its insurance of \$164 a year on truck and personnel, \$192 for direct telephone service, additional hose, two hose nozzles, fire extinguishers, an additional booster hose reel and several small items necessary for efficient fire fighting.

A recent addition to the service by the department was the direct telephone line to the fire alarm system and fire hall. The city of Talent pays half the annual cost for this service.

"Home Grown" Truck
The association's fire truck is strictly a "home-grown" outfit. Hawver related, "slightly over a year ago, we had a few miscellaneous items of equipment, which today has been assembled into a usable, worthwhile pump-truck unit, carrying over 600 gallons of water."

The pump and motor were salvaged from the old Talent fire truck and given to the association by the Talent city officials. Several items, including enough sheet iron to construct the tank, were procured by the individuals of the Talent fire department and donated to the rural group.

Eisenhower Win Seen By 16th Century Seer

New York —(U.P.)—Nostradamus, the 16th Century French seer, predicted the victory of Dwight D. Eisenhower in the November elections, according to an interpretation by the author of the latest book on Nostradamus prophecies.

Henry C. Roberts, who has spent 40 years interpreting Nostradamus' poems, said the seer wrote that "the man of iron who will come to be ruler of Europe" will be defeated by "the man of steel who will be chosen leader of the great Western power." Roberts pointed out that the name Stalin means iron in Russian and the name Eisenhower is derived from German words meaning steel-carrier.

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Local County Agent Named Clerk of PI Show in Portland

W. B. Tucker, Jackson county agent in agriculture, has been designated clerk of the Pacific International Hereford show to be held at Portland, October 4-11, according to Andy Duffie, northwest fieldman of the American Hereford association, show sponsors.

A premium list of \$15,000 in cash awards is being offered jointly by the Pacific International Livestock show and the AHA, Duffie continued. One hundred dollars will be paid for first place in each class and the premiums will be paid for 25 places in most of the classes.

In addition to the cash awards, nine trophies will be awarded in the hereford breeding classes to the winners of the grand championships and the groups.

Premiums Offered

In the open class hereford steer show, \$1,375 in premiums will be offered by the PI and the AHA. Cash awards will be paid on the first 10 places in these classes with a \$60 first prize. Two trophies are to be awarded in this division, one for the champion open class hereford steer and one for the group of three hereford steers.

In addition to these premiums

and awards, the AHA is offering a special premium of \$1,000 for the grand champion steer of the entire show, if it is a hereford. Today, August 15, was the deadline for entries to the cattle sale, consigned to the national hereford sale to be held Tuesday, October 7, according to Duffie.
