

Eisenhower - Stevenson Debates Receive Backing of Democrats

Washington—(U.P.)—Sen. John J. Sparkman, Democratic vice presidential nominee, gave cautious backing Saturday to the proposal for televised Eisenhower-Stevenson debates.

Sparkman told reporters the TV debates would be "a good thing" provided the people "want them" and such an undertaking could be arranged.

Plan Put to Stevenson

The proposal, paralleling the historic Lincoln-Douglas debates of 94 years ago, will be taken up with Stevenson at Springfield, Ill., this week-end in a series of campaign strategy huddles which Sparkman, Democratic National Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell and other party leaders will attend.

Mitchell told a news conference Friday that he regarded the idea of direct debates, first advanced by Sen. Blair Moody of Michigan, as "very interesting," and one which he would "cer-

tainly" discuss with Stevenson. Mitchell added that he thought both Stevenson and Sparkman would come off very well in face-to-face debates with Eisenhower and Sen. Richard M. Nixon, the GOP vice presidential candidate.

Lincoln-Douglas Debates

By an odd twist of history, it was Stevenson's great grandfather, Jesse Fell, who arranged the Lincoln-Douglas debates during the 1858 campaign between the two men for the Illinois Senate seat. Lincoln lost the Senate race to Douglas, but through the debates achieved a national prominence which contributed greatly to his later successful bid for the presidency.

Sparkman, who said he personally would welcome participation in the TV debates, declared that:

"The people certainly are entitled to full and free discussion of all the issues by the candidates. The most efficient way of getting that kind of discussion should prevail and everybody should cooperate in bringing this about."

"If the people want it done by direct debate it seems to me that it would be a good thing,"

Expressed Interest

Sen. Earle C. Clements of

Kentucky, chairman of the Senate Democratic campaign committee, also expressed interest and tentative approval of the proposal. Clements pointed out that there might be practical difficulties in scheduling face-to-face meetings between the candidates, but that with modern television facilities debates might be arranged emanating from two different points.

An offer of free television or radio facilities for the direct debates was made Friday night by the National Broadcasting Co. NBC President Joseph H. McCannell said he sent telegrams to both presidential candidates saying that the company's facilities would be available "for such a debate if you decide to follow such a course."

FBI Agnts Arrest Subject of Lengthy Midwest Manhunt

Detroit—(U.P.)—John Thomas Hill, 49, one of the nation's 10 most wanted fugitives, was arrested in bed without a struggle by FBI agents early Saturday.

Hill, wanted for murder in Maryland and felonious assault in Virginia, had been working in a Detroit junk yard for the past three months.

Subject of Search

Subject of an intensive search since May, 1950, Hill was tracked to New York last spring, then his trail was lost until agents picked it up again in Detroit.

He was arrested in the Polish suburb of Hamtramck, going under the name of James Smith. He offered no resistance when FBI agents awakened him with handcuffs ready.

Hoover said Hill admitted participation in the robbery of a store in Willoughby, Md., where the elderly store keeper was beaten to death with a hammer.

Hill has been employed in a Detroit junk yard for the past three months, Hoover said.

Hill's criminal record dates back to 1926.

Hoover said Hill will be arraigned before a federal judge in Detroit on charges of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution.
