HELP FOR DISILLUSIONED
MUST COME FROM WITHIN

Some people are bitter and
disillusioned. As a result, their
outlook is poisoned. Nothing
will make a person un-
happy or un-
popular sooner
than this.

It is most un-
pleasant to be
around a person
who is always
finding fault. No
one likes this
kind of person.

no one likes to
be around a person who has this
outlook on life.

How does a person get that
way, you may ask. The answer
is that he becomes that way be-
cause of some unhappy expe-
rience he has not dealt with prop-
erly. We all have unhappy expe-
riences and we could all be
bitter and disillusioned if we
allowed ourselves to be. But
most people adjust to their un-
happy experiences and come out
on top.

The person who is **grouched** on
life has made a poor adjustment.
Instead of being rational and
sensible, he has allowed himself
to become bitter and unhappy.
Then, with that outlook, every
new problem is exaggerated out
of all proportions and every
new disappointment is coal
added to already smoldering
fires. As a result, the person gets
more and more bitter as time
goes on.

Strong Desire Needed
What can be done to help
such a person? It takes hard
work on the person's part plus
a strong desire to change. Fur-
thermore, it's easier to correct
in childhood than in later years.

Fundamentally, the change
can come only when there is a
change in the person's outlook
on life. He must convince him-
self that things are not as bad

as he made them out to be, and
that he must take the good with
the bad, just as everyone else.
Then, when his attitude is
changed, he must learn to look
at life through partially rose-
tinted glasses. This means that
he must try to see the best in-
stead of the worst in everything.
And, finally, he must learn to
get a perspective on things that
bother him. This is a big order
on life and few people who are
sour on life are willing to try to
fill it.

LETTERS FROM READERS
Emotional Tension: "What
makes a person excitable and
easily upset? Can this be con-
trolled?"

(A) Emotional tension and ex-
citability come from lack of
training in emotional control or
from some physical cause, such
as a glandular or calcium defi-
ciency. It is fairly easy for a doc-
tor to discover the cause if it is
physical, and treat it. When,
however, excitability has no
physical basis and comes entire-
ly from lack of control over the
emotions, the cure must come
from the individual himself. A
doctor, psychiatrist, or friend of
the family can tell the person
how to control his temper. The
actual bringing of the emotions
under control must come from
the efforts of the person him-
self.

Meddling Families: "Most of
my teen-age friends complain
that their families are constantly
meddling in their affairs, telling
them what to do and how to do
it. How can we control our fam-
ilies?"

(A) A teenager has a lot of
nerve to talk about "controlling"
families. Don't you and your
friends realize what terrific sacri-
fices of time, energy, and
money your parents have made
for you? And, don't you realize
that they are trying to help you
to avoid making mistakes that

will follow you for the rest of
your lives? If they treat you like
children, it is because you act
like children. You and your
friends will be smart if you turn
the tables and let your parents
control you instead of trying to
control them.

Guardianship of Child: "Can
a mother-in-law take a child
away from its mother when the
mother wants to marry another
man and divorce her son?"

(A) No one, relative or unre-
lated, can take a child away
from its parents without authori-
ty from the courts. If the moth-
er of the child provides herself to
be an unfit guardian and the
court would require proof of
this, not just neighborhood gos-
sip—then the court can appoint
a legal guardian for the child.
This is usually a relative or
friend of the family.
