Spiegelberg Expects Big Turnout For Grid Camp at Lake O' Woods

Fred Spiegelberg, new head coach of the Medford high school football aggregation, and his staff will have a huge turnout of candidates from which to mold the 1952 Black Tornado, he indicated Saturday.

Spiegelberg said that he expects about 80 boys, among them about 20 lettermen, to report for the opening drills. Workouts this year will commence with a one-week training camp at Lake O' Woods. The camp opens on Sunday, August 24, and will conclude the following Saturday.

Grid aspirants will be billeted at Camp McLoughlin, the Boy Scout camp. Spiegelberg and Backfield Mentor Bob Newland were to go to the lake today to check the facilities.

A full schedule each day, mostly of football, has been planned by Spiegelberg and kept the youths busy and get them in trim for the fall campaign. Activities other than football will include hiking and wood sawing.

Six coaches will staff the camp. In addition to Spiegelberg and Newland, they will be Paul Evenson, line coach; Frank Roelandt, junior varsity coach, and Mel Boldenow and Jim King of the junior high staff.

Physical fitness of grid candidates will be checked Thursday when the boys will have examinations at the Medical Center building starting at 7 p.m. All senior high youths planning to turn out for football must have the examinations. The physicals are required before an aspirant may come out to practice.

Brough Wins; 'Little Mo' Rained Out

Manchester, Mass. — (U.P.) — Veteran Louise Brough of Beverly Hills, Calif., advanced to the finals in the Essex County Club Women's Tennis tourney Saturday by defeating upset specialist Anita Kanter of Santa Monica, Calif.

Miss Brough, U.S. Champion of 1947 and Wimbledon Queen the next three years, was hard pressed to take the first set, 8-6. But the unseeded Miss Kanter, who had scored two major upsets, faded and lost the second, 6-2.

Rain interrupted the second semi-final match, between present U. S. and Wimbledon Champion Maureen Connolly of San Diego, Calif., and third seeded Shirley Fry of Akron, O.

The nineteen-year-old Miss Connolly had taken the first set, 6-3, and the second set was tied at 2-2 when rain stopped the match.

The Connolly-Fry match will be resumed today with the winner meeting Miss Brough in the afternoon.

Aussies Reach Tennis Finals

Newport, R. I. — (U.P.) — Frank Sedgman and Ken McGregor of Australia maintained their domination over the best tennis players America has to offer and reached the men's singles final of the Newport Casino invitation tournament Saturday.

Sedgman, regarded as the world's outstanding amateur player, eliminated Dick Savitt of Orange, N. J., 6-4, 6-2, 6-4, and McGregor whipped Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, 6-2, 6-4, 6-3. Seixas is the United States' top-ranked player and Savitt is ranked second.

Sedgman and McGregor thus will meet in an all-Australian final today.

Helen Dettweiler To Hold Golf Clinic Here Tuesday

A young woman of varied abilities is Helen Dettweiler, teaching professional who will perform in a golf exhibition and conduct a clinic Tuesday at Rogue Valley Country club.

In addition to mastering the teaching and playing of golf, Helen has flown B-17 bombers, has been a baseball player and announcer and has designed a golf course. She has been called a "typical American girl" and once won a trip to England and France for an essay on that subject.

Miss Dettweiler, recognized as the leading woman teaching professional in the links sport, will

contend in a nine-hole exhibition here at 10 a.m. Tuesday. Her partner will be Mrs. Mahr Reymers and their opponents will be Mrs. W. W. Davies and Mrs. Maxine Hammond. The clinic will be at 1 p.m.

As she was growing up Helen wasn't much interested in golf. Her first interest was baseball. It was a chocolate soda that she didn't get that started her links career. Her brother, Bill, a golf standout as a youth, offered her the soda if she could club a ball four straight times. She hit the ball the first time then missed

three swings. Infuriated, she went to a pro in Washington, D. C., for instruction.

Helen learned her lessons fast and her prowess became known around the Manor club at Washington. She made the club team then began entering sectional matches on the eastern seaboard. She won the District of Columbia, Maryland State and Middle Atlantic titles several times as an amateur.

Desire to Help

A desire to help others while continuing her own tournament play was a factor in her decision to turn pro. In her first tourney playing for pay she won the Western Open in 1939. Helen is now head pro at the Cochran ranch course, Indio, Calif., which she designed.

Among her pupils have been Jack Benny, Mary Livingston, Ray Milland, Randolph Scott, Gene Raymond, George Montgomery and Danny Kaye. But, her prize student has been Beverly Hanson. Bev won the Eastern Open last year in her first start as a pro. The Hanson-Dettweiler combination of pupil-teacher is the first ever to reach the top in big-time golf.

Open to Public

Helen learned to fly B-17s as a member of the WASP during World War II.

She is now on the advisory staff of the McGregor Golf company.

The exhibition and clinic here are open to the public free of charge.

Sub-Par Round Gives Ed Oliver Lead in KC Open

Kansas City, Mo. — (U.P.) — Ed (Porky) Oliver, Lemont, Ill., the fat man of golf, shot a five-under-par 67 Saturday to take the lead in the \$15,000 Kansas City Open Golf tournament with a 54-hole total of 204.

Oliver closed with a brilliant 33, three under par, on the tough back side. He gained a one-stroke lead over Dave Douglas, the thin man from Newark, Del., who carded 70 for a 205 total.

Cary Middlecoff, the defending champion from Memphis, first day leader with a 67, started Saturday's play in a three-way tie at the top with Douglas and pint-sized Jerry Barber, of Pasadena, Calif. He could do no better than equal Milburn's par of 72, and remained three strokes off the pace with a 207 total.

Middlecoff was joined there by big Al Besselsink, of Escondido, Calif., who shot 69 Saturday.

Eugene — (U.P.) — Two youthful golfers from the sunny south led the National Junior Chamber of Commerce golf tournament here Saturday after one of them shot the first sub-par round of the tourney on Friday.

Tommy Jacobs of Montebello, Calif., moved up to share first place with Scotty Fraser of Panama City, Fla.

Jacobs, who led the qualifiers, shot a two-under-par 70 for a 54-hole total of 217 in Friday's play. Fraser, Thursday's leader, had 72.

Kenneth Scott, Rockford, Ill., who also shot a sub-par 70, was third man with 220 as the tournament moved into its final day. Smith Has 251

Country Club Readies for Links Ruckus

With Medford's biggest golfing affair of the year less than two weeks away, Rogue Valley Country club committees under General Chairman All Littrell are in the midst of preparations.

The event is the annual Southern Oregon tournament. It will open on Friday, August 29, and will conclude with 36-hole finals on Monday, September 1, Labor day.

Bob Atkinson, Portland, and Mrs. W. W. Davies, Medford, will defend their 1951 diadems in a tournament that club officials anticipate will be bigger than last year. A field of 167 men vied in 11 match flights and 43 women engaged in medal play in the 1951 hassle.

Hixson Entered

Atkinson won by a narrow 1-up margin over Eddie Simmons, Medford star, Simmons, a six-time champ of Southern Oregon, is again considered a leading contender. Another man expected to be in the thick of the fight is Harvey Hixson, Eugene, who in 1948 won the tourney which was abbreviated to medal play because of the state tourney here just before it.

Other probable men's entries include Dick Estey, Portland city champ, and Linn Creason from Hershey, Pa.

Women's competition will get more emphasis this year with match play replacing the previous medal play. Most of the ladies action, however, will be on the Oak Knoll links at Ashland. Women will qualify and vie in Saturday and Sunday rounds on the Ashland course but will move to Rogue Valley Country club for the finals.

2 Rounds Saturday

All men's rivalry will be at Rogue Valley. The top 32 qualifiers will see two rounds of matches on Saturday and the second and lower flights each one. There will be two rounds of tussles on Sunday with the final round Monday, that in the championship flight to be 36 holes.

Qualifying Friday, August 29, will be for out-of-town entries and for local individuals aiming for the championship flight. Club members who want to qualify for lower flights will be given the opportunity during a few days ahead of the tourney.

Californian Wins Junior Chamber Golf

Eugene — (U.P.) — Tommy Jacobs, 17, Montebello, Cal., is the seventh national Junior of Chamber of Commerce golf champion. Shooting a one-over-par 73 Saturday for a total of 209, he finished the tournament one stroke ahead of Scotty Fraser of Panama City, Fla.

Fraser, who finished with a last round score of 74 and a total of 291, mistakenly used an iron in his drive from the rough at the 18th fairway and cost himself two strokes in the earlier round during the afternoon. The ball hit a tree and bounded on to the practice field, which is out of bounds. The shot cost him a bogey on the last hole and erased his two-stroke lead over other contenders.

Kenneth Scott of Rockford, Ill., shot the last round in 76 strokes to give himself a tournament score of 296.

Tied at fourth with totals of 299 were Mickey Justin of Birmingham, Ala., with 27, and James Raines of Augusta, Ga., with 74 in the final round.

Tom Watros, son of a Royal Oak, Mich., pro, and Louis Bates of Atlanta, Ga., made the best rounds of the day. Each scored two-under-par 70's which tied them in fifth place with aggregates of 300.

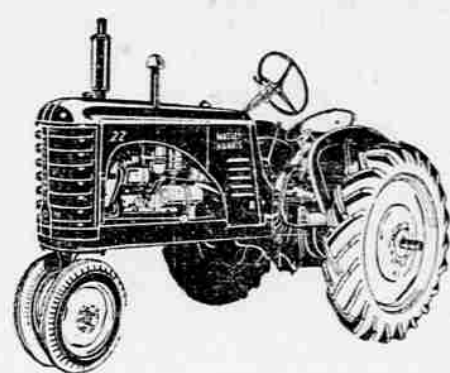
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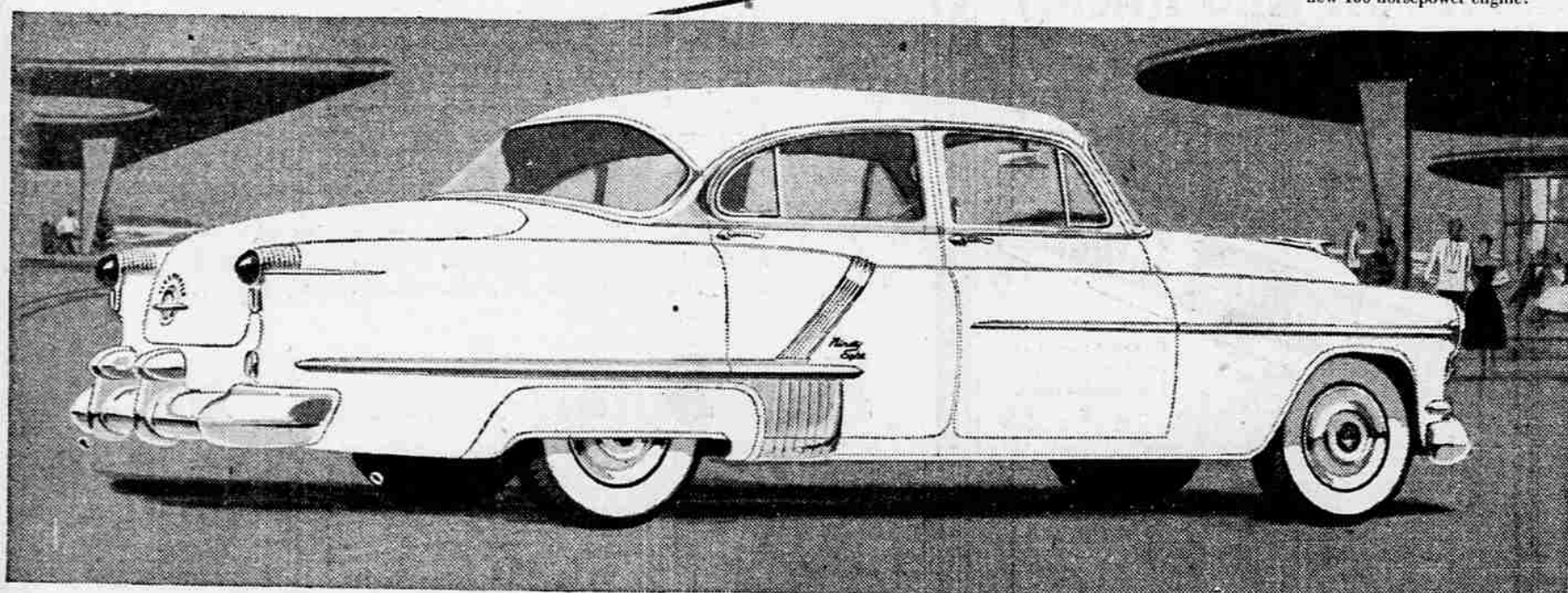
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
