Call Girl Service Charges Angrily Denied by Jelke

New York —(U.P.)—Minot F. (Mickey) Jelke, 22-year-old socialite heir to a multi-million dollar oleomargarine fortune, said Saturday he and his stunning blonde "steady girl" were just watching television when the police burst into his apartment Thursday night and hauled them off to jail on charges he was running a \$500-a-night call girl service.

Jelke, minus the blonde, but accompanied by a red-haired divorcee and an unemployed press agent, appeared in felony court Saturday for hearing on charges they ran a cafe-society vice ring that kept beautiful models and TV actresses in spending money provided by tired business men.

Hearing Adjourned
The hearing was adjourned to Monday, but Jelke again denied to reporters that he ever trafficked in women.

"Sure I know a lot of girls," Jelke told reporters angrily. "Who doesn't? That doesn't make me a procurer. This is a bum rap. I've never taken money from any girl in my whole life."

Jelke said he and Sylvia Eder, 24, who was held with him as a material witness, were "watching television as we often do" in his swank east side apartment, when the raiders burst in on them.

Jelke said Miss Eder was "my steady girl. I've been going with her for six months. We are not engaged as yet. She's above reproach."

He said they sat home and watched television lots of nights "because I can't afford to go to night clubs and places like that."

The handsome, pint-sized socialite appeared in court with two attorneys, Martin Benjamin, who had arranged his \$50,000 bail Friday, and Edward Broderick, noted criminal attorney, who said he was engaged by Jelke's father who telephoned him Saturday morning from Chicago.

Wants More Time

Assistant district attorney Anthony J. Leiber asked the court for a one week adjournment in the case to give him time to prepare evidence for a grand jury.

The five-foot-five inch blue-blood, whose name appears in the 1952 Social Register, was specifically charged with compulsory prostitution, two counts of living off the proceeds of prostitution and Sullivan law violations.

Summerfield Sees Eisenhower Victory

Grand Rapids, Mich. —(U.P.)—GOP National Chairman Arthur E. Summerfield predicted Saturday the Republicans will win in November because the American people are "fed up with mismanagement, bungling and corruption."

"The American people are fed up with one disaster after another in the field of international relations, fed up with the deadly hedge-podge of Socialist doctrine, profligate spending, higher and higher taxes, and more inflation and unbelievable corruption," Summerfield said.

"The American people are on the march... They are going to clean house from top to bottom. And in our two great nominees—Dwight D. Eisenhower and Richard M. Nixon—we have given them the men to do the job."

Summerfield, former national committeeman from Michigan, spoke before the Michigan Republican state convention.

Three Persons Hurt In Friday Accidents

Three persons were injured in Jackson county automobile accidents Friday, according to state police and Conger-Morris ambulance service.

Eugene Hamilton, 16, of 275 Hershey street, Ashland, and Georgia Hill, 15, of 496 Carroll street, Ashland, were taken to Community hospital by the ambulance service following an accident in Phoenix at about 7:30 p.m.

The mishap occurred when a car driven by Raymond D. Cook, 21 Fourth street, Ashland, skidded while attempting to miss a car pulling on to the highway, police stated. They said Cook's car overturned in front of a pick-up truck driven by Olen H. Barlow, Phoenix, and the two vehicles collided.

Hamilton was treated for cuts and bruises and Miss Hill received a fractured pelvis, hospital attendants said. Both were passengers in Cook's car. They remained hospitalized Saturday.

Elmer J. Colley, Medford, received minor injuries at about 3:30 p.m. Friday when a bunker on his log truck broke while he was driving on the Tiller road near Dead Horse canyon, residents of the area reported. Details of the accident were not reported.

Miners, Operators Receive News With Mixed Emotions

Pittsburg —(U.P.)—Leading coal mine operators here and the rank and file of the United Mine Workers union Saturday received John L. Lewis' one-week "memorial" shutdown of the nation's mines with mixed emotions.

George H. Love, president of the Pittsburgh Consolidation Coal Co., the industry's largest, said Lewis was taking work away from his own men.

"Almost inhuman" "Most of the men around Pittsburg mines have only been working two or three days a week," Love said, "and this shutdown won't hurt the industry's economy." It's hard and almost inhuman."

Lewis, who heads the United Mine Workers, charged in Washington that the industry repeatedly violated safety rules which he said "approximates criminal intent."

Comes at Bad Time
Sonny Dankovich, 35, Fredrick, Pa., a miner with 14-

years service, thought the shutdown was coming at a bad time. "Why didn't Lewis have a memorial week during the steel strike," he said, "But I'm willing to go all the way with him even if it means suffering. We've done it before and we can do it again."

A number of olio acts will be featured along with the turn of the century melodrama. Persons attending the play have been invited to wear costumes of the era in which the play is set.

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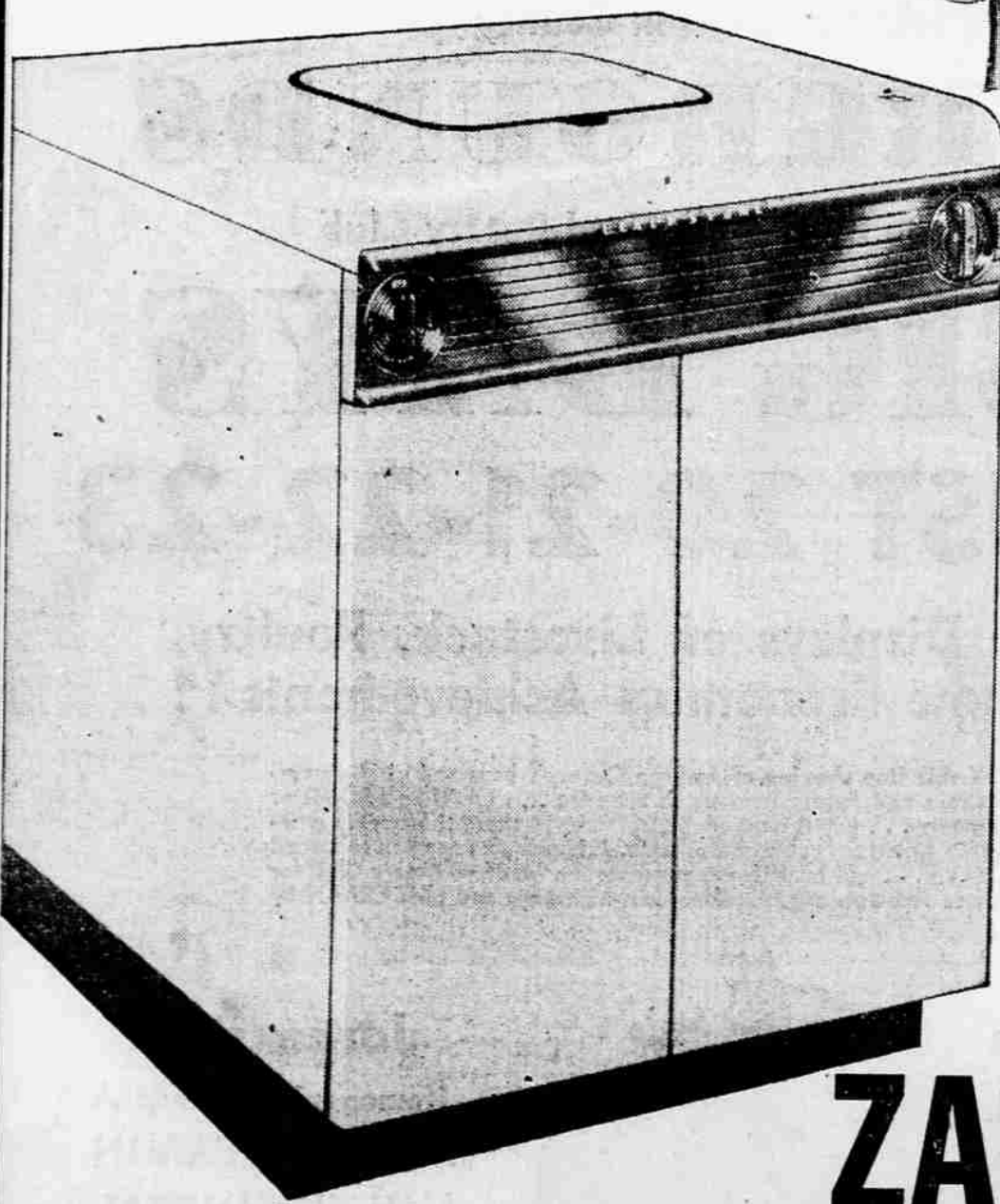
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
