Grieving Mother Nurses Sixth Youngster as Polio Takes Heavy Family Toll

Taylor, Wis. — (U.P.) — A grief-stricken mother, who saw one of her eight children die and four others become dangerously ill with polio, Monday watched over a sixth child who may have the disease.

Mrs. Helge Hjernevik, 40, said nine-year-old Dennis was sick with a fever and might have to join his three brothers and one sister in St. Francis hospital at nearby La Crosse.

Another sister, 20-year-old Beatrice, died last Wednesday. She was stricken with bulbar polio.

The disease struck the family again as funeral arrangements were being made for Beatrice on Thursday, this time sending both Ardella, 12, and Bernard, 14, to the hospital.

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British Speedster Will Take Crack At Eight Records

Bonneville Salt Flats, Utah — (U.P.) — Col. A. T. (Goldy) Gardner, 61, British racing driver who broke 13 records over the week-end before his car skidded out of control, will try to set eight other marks at dawn Wednesday.

The lanky British racer has abandoned further attempts on the 10-mile circular course where his MG magic midget went into a spin Saturday.

To Seek Sprint Marks

The usually excellent salt bed surface has been too slick since a recent cloudburst, Gardner said. However, he will aim at eight national and international sprint records over the eight-mile straightaway course on Wednesday.

Before the mishap, Gardner unofficially broke three international and five American class "E" records. He posted these times:

International, standing start—50 kilometers, 143.23 miles per hour; 50 miles, 147.39 mph, and 100 kilometers 148.72.

American, flying start, beginning on second lap—25 kilometers 155.70 mph; 25 miles, 155.17 mph; 50 kilometers 155.07 mph; 50 miles, 154.95.

These marks are subject to verification by the American Automobile association.

Three Cases of Polio Reported in County; No Cause for Concern

Three cases of infantile paralysis were reported in Jackson county last week, according to Dr. A. Erin Merkel, county health officer. They are the first cases of the disease reported this year for local residents.

The first was a three-year-old boy, who is hospitalized in Medford, and who is suffering a mild shoulder weakness from the disease, Dr. Merkel said.

The other two cases involve a Central Point husband and wife. The woman was stricken with polio last week, and was flown to Eugene's Sacred Heart hospital by a Mercy Flights plane for treatment.

Husband Ill

Yesterday, her husband came down with polio. Arrangements were completed with the non-profit air ambulance service to take him to Eugene last night, and the service's twin-Cessna plane left the airport at about 10:45 p.m. A mechanical difficulty in one engine developed about 10 minutes out, however, and the plane returned to the airport. The patient, who was having difficulty breathing, was transferred to the Beechcraft twin engine plane owned by the Morrison-Knudsen company. The M-K pilot, Bill Evans, flew the man to Eugene, and Bill Yerkey, of the Conger-Morris ambulance firm, accompanied him and serviced the Conger-Morris respirator which was used to aid the man's breathing.

Responding to Treatment

Both he and his wife are suffering from paralytic polio, but the Eugene hospital reported this morning that they are now responding to treatment. Both were subscribers to the Mercy Flights pre-paid plan.

Only other polio case in this area in 1952 was a transient, whose disease was not classed as a Jackson county case. Another

polio case, which resulted in the death in southern California of August 4, was not classed as a local case.

No Cause for Concern

Dr. Merkel said this morning that there had been six or seven cases of polio by this time last year, and the fact that there were three cases in one week here is no cause for any particular concern. Epidemic incidence is not reached until there are 20 cases per 100,000 population.

The health officer advised, however, that usual anti-polio precautions be observed. Most important of these are to avoid excessive fatigue and excessive chilling, particularly while swimming. Lots of rest is important too, he said.

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
