Cleveland Gains on Yanks in Flag Race

Al Lopez charged up his Indians with a "hustle or else" edict Monday for their final tour of the Eastern Badlands where they have cracked up in other years in the stretch drive for the pennant.

He demonstrated how tough he could get Sunday when he ordered slugging star Larry Doby out of the first game with the White Sox for failing to hustle.

The Indians swept both games, 6 to 2 and 2 to 1, to move within 1½ games of the leading Yankees. Doby, the league's biggest run producer with 83, sat on the bench all the way after his misadventure in the fourth inning of the opener.

Doby Piqued
The incident occurred when Doby, apparently piqued because the scorer did not give him a hit on a ball that was fumbled by Eddie Robinson, failed to get from first to third on a single to right by Luke Easter. Wally Westlake, Doby's replacement, did not get a hit, although the Indians won both games on fine pitching by Bobby Feller and Mike Garcia.

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Leo Durocher Faces Fine For Rhubarb

New York — (U.P.) — Manager Leo Durocher of the Giants, who was only an impulse away from baseball, faced a fine and possible suspension Monday for what looked a lot like an attempt to punch Umpire Augie Donatelli.

Giant front office officials, admitting that Durocher would have been bunched from baseball for life had he punched the umpire, conceded Leo would be fined but hoped that he would avoid a suspension.

The incident occurred in the ninth inning of Sunday's opener with the Boston Braves, and Warren Giles, president of the National league, was telephoned a full report on it Sunday night.

Little To Say
The main characters in the incident—Durocher, Donatelli and Manager Charlie Grimm of the Braves—had little to say, leaving it in Giles' hands.

Durocher, attempting to make light of the affair, refused to confirm or deny that he had attempted to hit Donatelli.

"It's just like any manager being thrown out of a ball game. That's all there is to it," he said.

Examination Asked
The incident flared up suddenly as Hal Gregg, fifth Giant Pitcher in the opener, reached the mound from the bullpen to start the ninth inning. Donatelli, umpiring at second base, asked to examine the baseball. Durocher grabbed the ball from Gregg's glove and threw it instead to Plate Umpire Al Barlick.

After a brief exchange of words, Donatelli waved Durocher out of the game. The Giant manager jumped into the air, waving both arms. Then he clobbered his right arm as if to throw a punch and raced after Donatelli.

AUSSIE'S WIN

Jones, a right-hander, has been plagued with a sore arm for a large part of the season and had a 2-3 record in 13 appearances.

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Drinking College Students Had Liking Before School

New York — (U.P.) — Boys and girls don't suddenly acquire a liking for whiskey and beer when they go off to college — they had the liking before they ever saw the campus.

Yale University's laboratory of applied physiology made a five-year study of college students' drinking habits which involved 17,000 boys and girls enrolled in 27 colleges and universities.

It had nothing to do with excessive drinking or with any question of campus morality. Or, rather, the first findings now being disclosed at Yale's summer session in alcohol studies, didn't.

It demonstrated, the researchers claim, that boys and girls in their drinking ways are much like their parents. Robert Straus, research associate, who made the studies with Selden D. Bacon, director of Yale's center of alcohol studies, said:

Drinking Relationship
"Of the men whose parents both drink, 90 per cent are themselves users. However, only half of the men (51 per cent) whose parents both abstain, drink. An even more striking relationship between parental use and own use is seen for the women."

"Where both parents are users, 83 per cent of the women drink on occasion. However, when both parents abstain, only 19 per cent of the women students drink."

"The customs and attitudes of young persons with regard to drinking, are already pretty well determined before they come to college — by the practices, attitudes, and customs of their families, their social groups and their communities."

In the absence of facts, there has been much conjecture and misinformation and often many sincere persons have acquired quite a distorted impression of the nature of drinking behavior and the problems of alcohol in American colleges. It is hoped that this study will provide a body of knowledge to replace present wild speculation."

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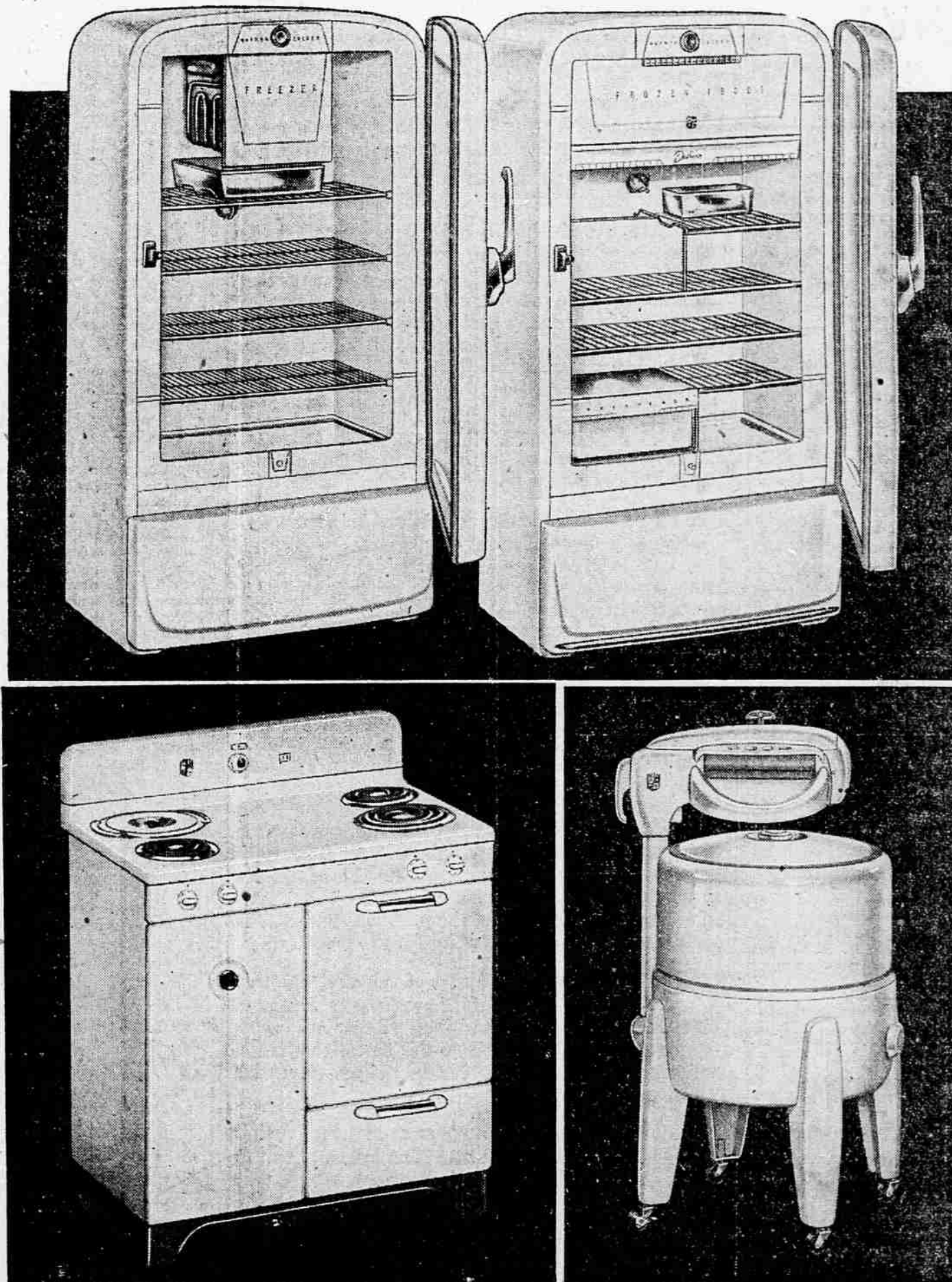
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
