Research Balloons Will Be Released

Washington (U.P.)—The Navy said Monday that research balloons will be released soon in Oregon to float across the country from west to east.

A spokesman warned that the balloons might set off another epidemic of "flying saucer" reports. For months there has been speculation that some of the persons who claimed to have spotted a "saucer" may have actually seen only one of the huge balloons that the armed forces and several private agencies use for weather research.

In announcing the coming experiments, the Navy said the 37-foot balloons will be launched near Tillamook, Ore., by General Mills, Inc., under a contract with the Office of Naval Research.

The balloons will carry electric equipment designed to determine the characteristics of atmospheric radio waves. They also will contain instructions telling balloon finders where to return the instruments.

Eugene — Architect William Laing of Medford has been retained by a Lane county citizens' committee to prepare preliminary plans and cost estimates for a modern, fireproof, 150-bed nursing home. It is planned to seek a vote in November on a four-mill levy, to run for two years which would raise an estimated \$1,000,000 for construction of the institution.

Oregon Vacationists Injured by Gunshot In Mistaken Identity

Tonopah, Nev. (U.P.)—Two members of the vacationing John Hill family of Drain, Ore., were injured early Sunday morning when Tonopah Police Chief R. E. Lydon fired a sawed-off shotgun blast through a window of their car at a roadblock in the mistaken belief a desperado was in the vehicle.

Patsy Delle, 13, and Mrs. Della Hill, 35, were being treated at Nye General hospital here for wounds suffered when the shotgun pellets shattered the left rear window of the family's 1951 green Studebaker sedan.

Neither Seriously Hurt
The girl suffered wounds in a leg caused by ricocheting pellets and shattered glass and Mrs. Hill's scalp was creased by a pellet. Neither was in serious condition.

The mishap occurred at dawn Sunday at a roadblock on U. S. Highway 95 set up four miles south of here by Lydon and State Highway Patrolman James Ray.

The two officers were watching for a 1952 black sedan bearing Iowa license plates believed to be driven by William Merle Martin, 42, sought as a suspect in the slaying of an Olathe, Kan., policeman. Martin was believed to have run a roadblock near Las Vegas Saturday night and to have headed northward in the direction of Tonopah and Reno.

Driving North
Meanwhile, the members of the Hill family were driving northward along U. S. 99 in a green Studebaker sedan bearing Oregon license plates. John Hill, 40, his wife, Patsy, and a son, John, 12, were in the car.

Hill said he saw the red lights of the police cars at the roadblock and slowed his car to a speed of 15 miles per hour. He said he rolled down the driver's window and when nobody said anything figured there had been an accident of some kind and that the red lights were meant only as a slow-down warning.

He said he sped up again and as he did so heard a gunshot and the sound of the shotgun pellets shattered the left rear window of his car. The pellets also shattered the right front windshield as they passed
