BE MORE FORCEFUL WITH SLOPPY WIFE

Many young wives grow tired of the day-in, day-out work of running a home. Then they begin to let their work slip and their homes and families suffer. What is the husband to do under such conditions, this young husband asks:

(Q) "Can a man be happy with his wife when she never tries to keep a house clean or cook meals like other wives do? My wife remains in bed through the day while I work. Then I come home to a mess. When I am out of town working, she chases from one tavern to another, and leaves the children alone at home. The children hate the way we quarrel and it disturbs them to grow up in a home like this. I know if she was a good housekeeper and a good mother, we could make a go of our marriage. She has refused to cook for me now so there's nothing for me to go home to except my two sweet children. Would you advise a divorce?"

I advise against a divorce, except as the last measure in a long and complicated marital tangle. Only when every possible effort to save a marriage has failed should there be any thoughts of divorce.

In your case the court would award your wife the custody of your two children unless you could prove that she was unfit to be their mother. Then they would be awarded to you. How could you take care of them properly while you were working and would you be satisfied to have them under the sole care of your wife, when she has neglected them and her home? Try more forceful tactics to save your marriage. Tell your wife her job is to run the home and take care of the children. Unless she is willing to do this, you will not give her your earnings but will use the money to provide outside help for your children. And let her know that she will have some time off to be with her friends when you

will take charge of the home and children.

Getting a change may help to relieve the monotony she suffers from. But, she must realize that a woman has a responsibility, just as a man has, when she marries, and she cannot shirk.

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Engineers Simulate Weather Conditions

Camden, N.J. —(U.P.)— Engineers at RCA can simulate any weather condition on earth in a 14 by 10 foot chamber.

A 50-ton "stratosphere chamber" was installed in the firm's engineering products department for testing all types of electronics equipment under any atmospheric condition.

Heating and refrigeration equipment in the \$150,000 chamber creates temperatures ranging from 185 degrees F. more than 50 degrees above the highest natural earth's surface temperature, to minus 85 degrees, within a few degrees of the lowest natural earth's surface temperature ever recorded.

Atmospheric pressure can be reduced to a level attained at an altitude of 70,000 feet, almost as high as man has ever ascended in a balloon, while humidity can range from a heavy fog to al-

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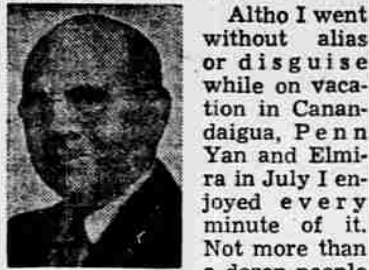

PRAY DO NOT BLOW YOUR NOSE

I advise against blowing the nose under any circumstance, but others were just as certain that I recommended vigorous nose blowing as a natural means of keeping the air passages clear and expelling germs before they can gain a foothold.

I'm plumb delighted to know that the office staff is sufficiently interested in the question to argue about it. It reminds me that this column was resuscitated after a ten-year hiatus in that neck of the woods—and probably the girls in the office had to grow up without benefit of good health education.

Frankly, I'd rather sneak out through the rear patio and toddle over to the bowling green than try to arbitrate this dispute, but it's too late for the draw now

anyway, so here is a compromise which I hope will satisfy both factions, and the boss, too.

Instead of forcibly blowing the nose it is better and safer, I think, just to wipe it, or hold the handkerchief under but not upon the nose and permit secretion to drain from the nostrils as you breathe out or expel air through the nose.

Do not compress or grasp the nose between thumb and finger, but always leave the nostrils open. Blowing with one or both nostrils compressed is a good way to force possibly infected secretions through the Eustachian tube into the tympanum (middle ear cavity) and cause otitis media, mastoiditis or other ear trouble. Vigorous nose blowing matter into one or another access-

sory skull cavity which is ventilated through the nasal cavity and set up inflammation of the lining of the cavity, sinusitis.

To the best of my recollection the one kid on Chapel Street in Canandaigua who never had earache, gathering in the ear, sinusitis (of course no one then knew the skull was not solid bone), mastoiditis, adenoids, enlarged tonsils, diphtheria, scarlet fever, measles, etc., never had a handkerchief either, but a remarkably prehensile tongue.

Mind you, I do not condemn the use of handkerchiefs, garters, hats, overcoats, mufflers, girdles, neckties or brassieres. I contend merely that one should use these things only when com-

fort or convention demands and the more one goes without, the better for health.

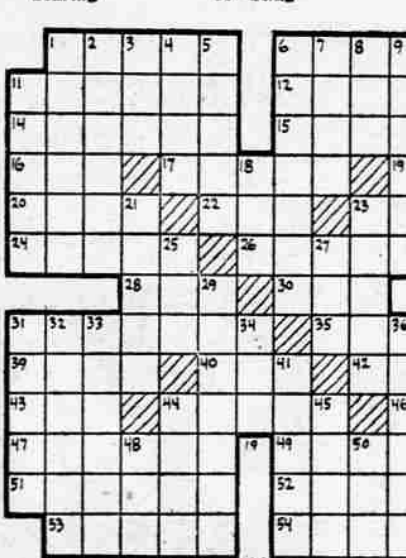

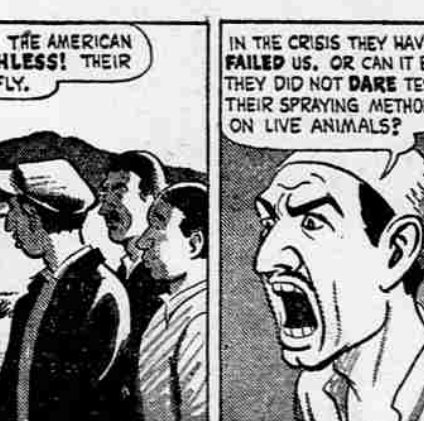

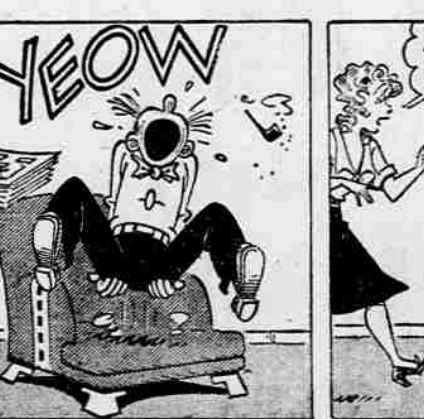
