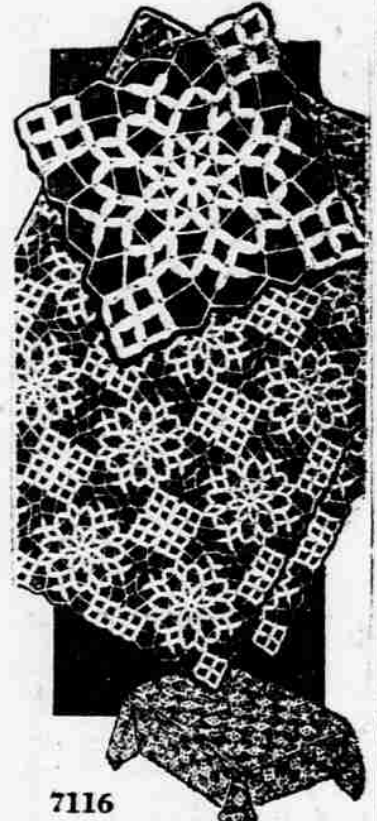


Relatives Visit At Kaylor Home

As We Live

DON'T RUSH INTO SECRET MARRIAGE

Rushing into marriage without considering all aspects of the problem is characteristic of youth. When a man reaches middle age, he should not marry unless things are right. That is why I am advising the man who wrote the following letter to wait his step:

(Q) "Is it good sense for a widower, age 35 years, who has three married children, to marry a woman of 28 years, keep it a secret, and live apart for about one year? It is important financially for me to wait. She insists that we get married within a month. Shall I marry on her terms or break it off? Will it be a happy marriage? I'm strongly against secret marriages at any age."

(A) I agree wholeheartedly with you on the subject of secret marriage. There is really no excuse for them in our modern, 20th century America. If two people can't marry and live together as man and wife, they should not marry.

If it is important for you to wait for a year before you marry, explain the reason to your fiancée and expect her to accept your decision. If she refuses, then you must choose between her and your financial problem. I cannot see why she feels she must rush through this marriage within a month. There are rarely circumstances that justify such a rush, except when the man is going into the service.

Another point that is well worth considering, is the matter of your ages. The woman you are planning to marry is literally young enough to be your child. Can you have much in common? I doubt it. This idea of hers about a secret marriage for a year and rushing into marriage within a month suggest immaturity on her part that may be hard for a man of your age to live with.

Give In to Wishes

Decide just what you can and cannot do. Give in to her wishes if they are reasonable. But, don't allow her to rule you now unless you want to be ruled for the rest of your life. Then, if she does not like the stand you have taken, you will know that she does

not love you enough to build a happy marriage. That will be your exit signal.

Federal Aid Fund Plan Gets Approval

Portland—(U.P.)—Wasco County Judge W. R. Webber told the State Highway Commission Tuesday that 27 counties in Oregon have approved a plan which would distribute federal aid funds for county roads on a basis of 80 per cent on rural population and 20 per cent on county road mileage.

Judge Webber, chairman of the roads committee of the Association of Oregon Counties, said three counties, Gilliam, Morrow and Walla, voted against the plan. Six others have not notified the association of a decision.

Ben Chandler, chairman of

the commission, said the commission would "go along" with the plan for a two-year period to see how it worked out.

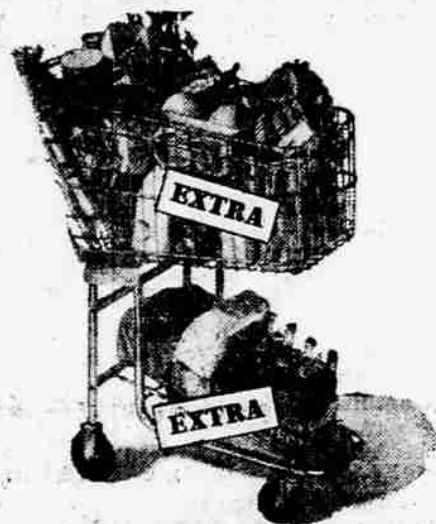

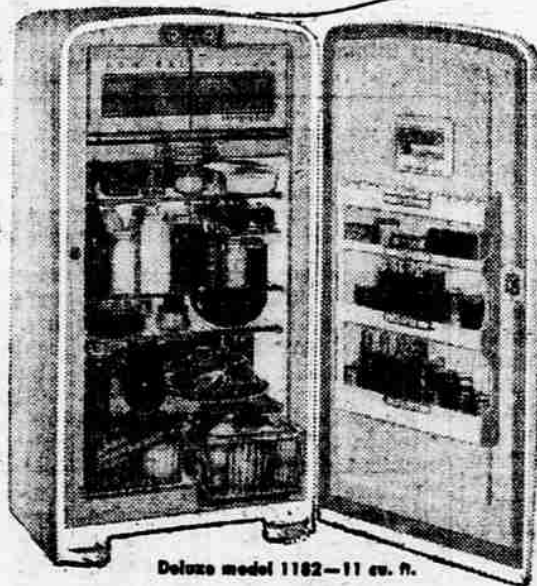
