New York — (U.P.) — Vic Raschi, whose locker looked like an untidy lumber yard, scrambled over the bats his mates had stacked up as a gag and declared that his record night at home plate was the most baffling thing that ever happened to him in baseball.

The Yankee pitcher turned slugger last night and drove in seven runs to set an all-time Major league mark for hurlers as the New Yorkers humbled Detroit with a 15-hit attack. The victory kept them five games ahead of Chicago which topped the Athletics 8-3.

"I sure can't figure it out," Raschi said. "Not even back in school or when I played as a kid, did I ever have a game at bat like that."

A Real Pasting
Raschi drove in only two runs during the entire 1952 season. Virgil Trucks whipped a strong four-hitter for Chicago to gain his 14th victory buoyed by a six run fourth inning rally in which they collected only three hits but also took advantage of four walks and a wild pitch. Al Carrasquel tripled to produce one run. The Sox made only five hits in all.

In other American league games Boston topped St. Louis 6-2 to end an eight game losing streak and Mike Garcia pitched Cleveland to a five-hit 3-0 triumph over Washington.

Robbin Roberts pitched victory No. 19, a five-hitter, as the Phils defeated the Cardinals 8-1, while

Fishermen Receive Cradle-to-Grave Aid

Lisbon, Portugal — (U.P.) — The 56,000 professional fishermen of this seafaring nation benefit from a unique government-backed assistance project that aids them literally from cradle to grave.

The 15-year-old program, known simply as "House of the Fishermen," not only helps provide model homes and whole villages for fishermen and their 150,000 dependents, but also provides medical treatment, medicines, economically priced food and clothing, schooling and even holidays for their children.

The scheme includes an insurance program and a cooperative for consumer buying, and works largely on the principle of helping the members help themselves, rather than merely passing out financial handouts. Any fisherman can become a member of this self-help society, and most do join.

Tyler set up the winning run when he doubled and stole third, and Perkins' bunt proved to be the difference.

Cuban Monarchs Slated To Play Studs Thursday In Exhibition Contest

The Medford Cheney Studs will go up against their most colorful competition of the year tomorrow night when they meet the Havana Cuban Monarchs. The game is scheduled for 8 p.m. at the fairgrounds ball park.

Advance word on the Monarchs says this year's nine is a well balanced club with crafty performers in each position. One of the most-talked about players on the Cuban roster is Manual Heredia, who plays third base for the traveling nine. His rifle arm and good fielding, coupled with ability to bang out the hits, particularly in the clutch, makes him one of the most valuable men on the roster.

A hero in the Latin American countries is Bambino Barrera, hard-hitting first sacker. He is hailed as the "Babe Ruth" of Cuban baseball, and has lived up to his reputation by slamming out a four-bagger in virtually every game this season. The Cubans have adequate
