Wheat Election Dated Aug. 14

A wheat marketing quota referendum election for the 1954 crop will be held Friday, Aug. 14, from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. in the Jackson County Production and Marketing administration office on the first floor of the courthouse, according to Talbert Sehorn, office manager.

Immediately after the election, the ballots will be publicly counted by the staff, he reported. About 65 growers in the county are eligible to participate in the election, Sehorn pointed out.

Any owner or operator having an interest in a certain farm's crop is eligible to vote, he said. Only farmers who plan to grow more than 15 acres of wheat in 1954 are eligible, however.

Farms which are exempt from wheat marketing quotas are those on which the normal production of the acreage planted to wheat is less than 200 bushels and where the acreage is 15 acres or less.

Newlyweds Killed In Crash; Parents Leave for Scene

Mr. and Mrs. G. Page Stauffer, accompanied by daughter, Miss Phyllis Stauffer, 961, Lutzer lane, left at noon today by plane for Suquamish, Wash., near where their son, G. Page Stauffer Jr., 22, and his wife, Lois, 19, were killed Tuesday in an automobile accident.

The son was a Marine corps corporal, and the parents and sister recently returned from Suquamish where they attended the young couple's wedding July 18.

Joined Marines in 1950
The corporal was born in Medford, attended Oak Grove grade school and Medford junior and senior high schools. He lived here until joining the Marine Corps in October, 1950.

He has since served at Kodiak and Adak islands off the coast of Alaska.

Funeral arrangements are pending and will not be held until next week, according to his family. The corporal's wife has brothers in the service who hope to be at Suquamish for the double funeral. An announcement of the date is to be made here.

War Veteran Wins Idaho Farm Drawing

Rupert, Ida. —(U.P.)—An Illinois war veteran topped the list of 72 winners in a Bureau of Reclamation drawing for choice \$10,000 farm units in the irrigated Minidoka northside pumping project near here.

A crowd of 5,000 roared its approval as the name of Edward Madden of Ottawa, Ill., was drawn out of a box by a member of a special board of examiners.

The next four names drawn were Frank E. Wendell of Alamo, Tex.; Forrest O. Son of Heyburn, Ida.; John R. Kurby of Boise, and Dale C. Stroller of Covina, Calif.

Each of the farms is valued at about \$10,000. Some of the land has already been irrigated and planted and a few units are complete with buildings.

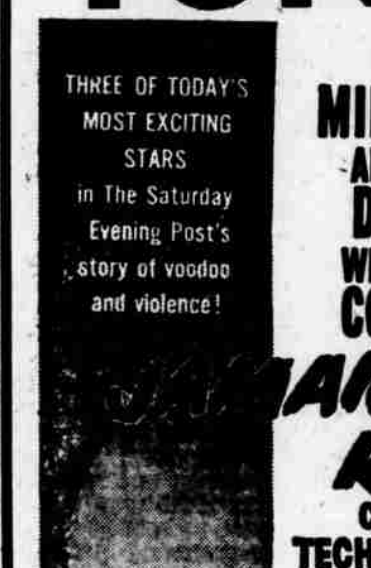
