Mistress Spoils Captive Robin

Wichita, Kan. — (U.P.) —Punkie is spoiled, there's no doubt about it. He knows it. His mistress admits it. So does the whole neighborhood. Punkie is a robin who has lived in captivity for 18 years. Actually Punkie lives as an honor guest rather than as a captive.

His story goes back to 1935, when, after a storm, two boys found a young robin that had been blown from its nest and suffered a broken wing.

The boys, Mark and Wells Adams, took the robin to their grandmother, Mrs. Wells W. Miller. She doctored it, kept it for the boys while they were off to camp.

Returning, the youngsters lost interest in the robin, but not Mrs. Miller. It thrived under her care, acquired the name Punkie and decided it had found a happy home.

Said white-haired Mrs. Miller: "For 18 years that bird has never been outside the house. Sometimes I think Punkie actually has forgotten he is a bird and believes he is a person."

Punkie, old for a bird, usually sits and nods. When he starts to move he seems to have trouble getting his bearings and will circle before lining himself up

in the direction he wishes to fly. "Punkie was a beautiful robin readbreast when he was young," said Mrs. Miller. "But now his breast has faded."

No longer a singer, the bird will move close to the radio when music is being broadcast and will cock his head, listening. When the music ceases, he goes away.

The Millers have a cage for Punkie in which he sleeps.

One of the robin's favorite foods is hamburger. Mrs. Miller roils it in the shape of worms for him.

In young Miller the festival directors have a most promising young actor whom we hope returns for other seasons. This young man has a handsome, graceful stage presence and a truly tremendous voice. If the audience had been seated across the street in the next block we venture to say his lines would still have been heard distinctly, yet the voice is not harsh and his diction is excellent. One would have to look for to find an actor to play the swashbuckling Petruccio so well.

Angus Bowmer, of course, is practically perfect as the bleary-eyed Christopher Sly who is almost persuaded that he is a lord. Bowmer has played the role before, and we hope he does again in coming festival seasons. Last night he was aided in setting the tone of the comedy by Richard Graham, who played the suave and debonair lord who plots against Sly.

At this point your reviewer knows not whom to praise next, for praise is due almost every person on the stage last night.

The comedy work of Richard Weber as Grumio and George Peppard as Biondello, even in a play where so many lines bring laughs, was outstanding. We marveled at Peppard, who doesn't "seem the type" and yet who delighted the audience with the delivery of his lines and his ridiculous mannerisms. Weber deserves double praise for he gave a bright and pleasing performance as the servant of Petruccio while suffering severe pain from an injured leg which almost incapacitated him.

Richard Rizzo, substituting in the role of Bartholomew, a page who masquerades as a woman, proved that he also has a knack for comedy.

Garbed in an Elizabethan dress with hoop skirts, young Rizzo seemed to enjoy this bit of horse-play as much as did the audience.

Whatever the role, one can depend upon Paul Kliss and Bill Ball to bring something new and fresh in the way of interpretation. In "Shrew" Kliss has elected to play Tranio much as one might expect a ballet dancer to present the role, and the results are most interesting. Young Ball, who fills in as a page for this play, has one scene as a tailor and again demonstrates his skill as a makeup artist as well as an actor.

Record Audience Attends Opening Night of "Shrew"

The largest audience ever to attend an opening performance of a Shakespearean festival play saw "Taming of the Shrew," last night in Ashland, and thoroughly enjoyed every minute of it. Angus Bowmer's opening scene as Christopher Sly brought applause, and throughout the evening the audience constantly interrupted the players to signify their approval.

This boisterous comedy is popular with playgoers everywhere, and the fast-paced production brought to Oregon Shakespearean festival fans this year by Director Philip Hanson in every way does justice to this old favorite.

Two newcomers to the festival company, Patricia Saunders of Portland and Howard Miller of Lock Haven, Pa., give sparkling performances in the famous roles of the seemingly shrewish Katharina and the virile Petruccio who "tames" her.

Miss Saunders, it is said, was the only player unanimously agreed upon for any one role when the difficult task of casting was undertaken after tryouts. All four directors said as one "Saunders must play Kate" and her performance lived up to their expectations. She did a truly skillful piece of work not only as the waspish girl of the early scenes, but as the deeply charming young woman of the later scenes, and was truly "beautiful Kate" as Petruccio calls her.

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Slang Can Give Tip on Personality

Memphis, Tenn. — (U.P.) — Better watch that slang — it can give a significant tip as to your personality.

Dr. James A. Wax of Temple Israel says only people of little faith have a "so what?" attitude, ask "what's in it?" or wonder "what's his angle?"
