South American Investments Urged

Washington — (U.P.) — Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower has appealed to private U. S. interests to invest heavily in South American industries to help combat Communism and build hemispheric solidarity.

Eisenhower, brother of the President and head of Pennsylvania State College, said these industries offer investors "opportunities" of possibly "huge proportions."

The educator made the statements in a television report last night on his recent 20,000-mile good will tour of 10 South American republics.

Wing Glider Flying Eyed for Family Use

Starkville, Miss. — (U.P.) — Only two people have mastered flying a "wing glider" that has no motor, no fuselage or tail structure but is being experimented with here to make family flying possible.

The odd-shaped aircraft consists of a 65-foot wing that contains a capsule in which the pilot navigates while lying flat on his stomach. German designers built similar models during World War II, but the model here is part of an advanced sailplane research project.

Rudolph Opitz, a former commander of a German rocket squadron, and Ray Parker, a craftsman in the Mississippi State College aerophysics department, are the only persons

who can fly the wing. They hope to develop aircraft of low cost and high speed that require little space for takeoffs and landings.

Another phase of their research is testing the wing, which has thousands of pin-point holes in the fabric through which air is sucked and forced out at the rear of the ship.

Dr. August Raspet, who directs the research, said the experiment is the next step in "streamlining" speedy, economical aircraft that may make flying possible for every family.

Wolfe would like to have the \$12.71. He can't get it. Uncle Sam would like to pay off, but under the complicated system of government accounting that is not possible.

Lost the Proof

The way Wolfe figures it, while he was paying for the scarf for little Mona Lou, those parlor car stubs must have slipped to the floor. Anyhow, he can't find them.

Since then, once a month he has been visited by representa-

tives of the Bureau of Accounting and by workers in the General Accounting Office.

These folks scream, "Wolfe, Wolfe! You have us in a mess. We want to pay you."

Every time Wolfe replies he could use that \$12.71. Nothing has happened, and it appears nothing ever will.

The irony of it is that just the other day, the lawyer got a polite little note from his boss. Because of a reduction in force in his department he is being separated on Aug. 23 from the government—minus \$12.71.

Pin-Up Girl Roamed During Last Ice Age

Washington — (U.P.) — Anthropologists may have discovered a veritable pin-up girl in Iran—one who walked the earth sometime during the last ice age.

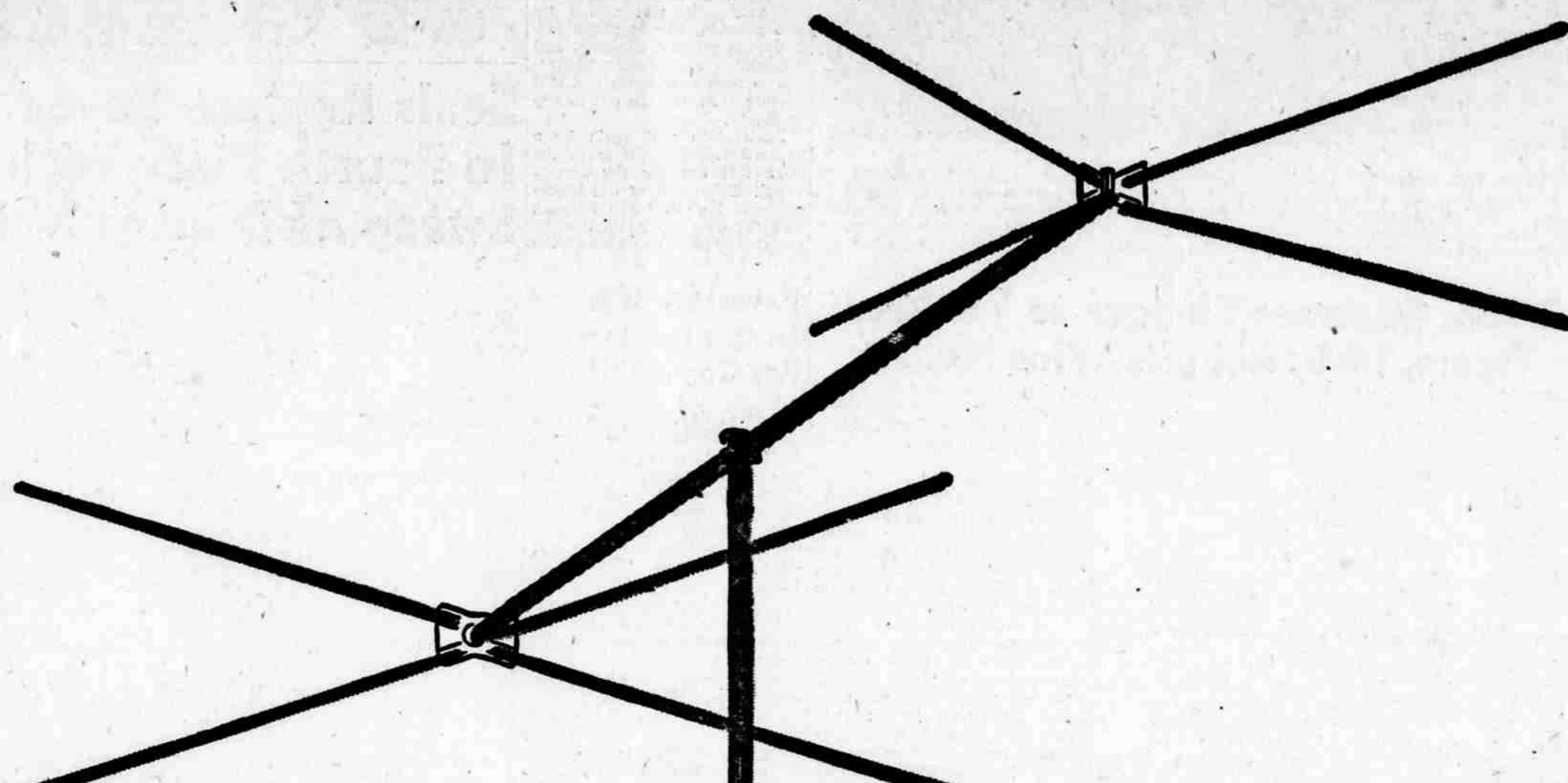
