Dick Haymes, Singer, Arrested for Deportation To Native Argentina

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Dick Haymes, one of the nation's top singers and current beau of movie queen Rita Hayworth, was arrested today for deportation to his native Argentina.

The handsome crooner was charged, as an alien, with illegally leaving and re-entering the country when he flew to Hawaii to visit Miss Hayworth two months ago.

Picked Up in Hollywood
Haymes was picked up by immigration officers as he was walking down Sunset blvd. in the famous Sunset Strip area, a belt of swank restaurants and nightclubs.

The singer was freed on \$500 bond after being held at immigration headquarters in downtown Los Angeles.

Haymes' quick trip to see his lady love got him into legal tangles because of a chain of events regarding his citizenship that began during World War II.

Haymes was born in Buenos Aires, Sept. 13, 1918. He entered this country, the Justice Department said, for permanent residence May 28, 1937.

Exempted from Army
The deportation warrant against the singer charged that during World War II he obtained an exemption from military service on the grounds he was a citizen of a neutral nation, Argentina.

Under the McCarran-Walter immigration law this exemption makes him ineligible for naturalization.

The Justice Department learned about this "military relief," it said, when Haymes returned to Los Angeles from Honolulu.

Under normal deportation proceedings Haymes will be given a hearing by an inquiry officer on the deportation charges.

If a deportation order is issued by the hearing officer, Haymes can then appeal to the Board of Immigration Appeals and ultimately to the courts.

Linked With Rita
Haymes recently has been mentioned in Broadway gossip columns as a close friend and frequent companion of actress Rita Hayworth.

The government refused Haymes a visa for foreign travel in 1952 because of unpaid back taxes.

Miss Hayworth, when informed by the United Press of the arrest of her swain, refused to comment.

But his estranged wife, Nora Eddington Flynn Haymes, gasped, "this is awful. I feel so sorry for him."

Mrs. Haymes vigorously denied that the singing star had "tried to get out of the draft."

"He tried several times to enlist in the American army, and he was turned down because he has high blood pressure. That's why he went all over the United States on those Army camp tours," Nora said.

"He wanted to do what he could to help. He didn't try to get out of serving because of his citizenship."

Prison Riots Cite Weaknesses, Fine Tells Governors

Seattle — (U.P.) — State prisons throughout the nation must be greatly improved "if we are to dull the explosiveness that hovers over an imprisoned colony," Gov. John S. Fine said today.

The Pennsylvania Republican, leading the final panel discussion on the 45th annual governors conference said violent prison riots in the past year actually served one good purpose.

Weaknesses Pointed
"They pointed up weaknesses and deficiencies in prison administration," Fine said.

"Prison riots have awakened in the minds of every governor here not only the imperative need for corrections in prison administration, but also adoption of preventative measures against a recurrence of disturbances," he added.

Fine said there would be more riots "unless we change our centuries' old governmental behavior of placing this problem at the bottom of our lists where a myriad of other problems cause it to be soon forgotten."

Joint Obligations
The Pennsylvania governor said the states have a joint obligation "to initiate a thorough study of the entire penal system from convictions . . . to prisoner rehabilitation."

Yesterday, the governors went into the question of rising school costs, the teacher problem and educational television.

Gov. Norman Bunsdale, (R.), of North Dakota expressed the opinion of many governors when he said part of the problem of school financing could be solved by placing more emphasis on control at the local level.

Mayhem Charge Made Against Local Woman

Pasty Lou Knox, 21, of 638 South Holly st. in Medford, was arraigned in district court this morning on a charge of mayhem, and bail was set at \$1,000, according to court records.

The case was continued until 10 a.m. tomorrow for the defendant to obtain counsel. The complaint was signed by Arthur Fears, who alleges that the defendant struck him on the ear with a beer bottle in a local tavern the night of July 31.

Fears' ear was almost cut off from the blow, District Attorney Walter Nunley said, and internal ear damage was also sustained.

Dulles, Rhee Again Dodge Talk on Peace Conference

Seoul, Korea — (U.P.) — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and President Syngman Rhee again sidestepped the crucial issue of the Korean peace conference today.

A full dress meeting at Rhee's mansion lasting nearly two hours concentrated instead on economic aid that the United States will furnish for rebuilding the shattered South Korean economy.

Dulles said as he emerged from the meeting that the Korean unification plans, key issue before the peace conference beginning in October, were not discussed.

Thunderstorm Sweeps Across Rogue Valley

A "typical summer thunderstorm" swept over the Rogue valley yesterday afternoon and evening.

Lightning strikes set a few small fires in surrounding forests, and hail sufficient to cause limited commercial damage to pears was reported in a restricted area northeast of Medford.

The tall cumulus clouds started moving over the valley at about 3 p.m., and the height of the storm came between 6:30 and 8 p.m. Heavy rain was reported in some sections of the valley, although .04 of an inch was measured at the weather bureau.

Hail Reported
Reports of hail came from several orchards in the Big Boulder area, where some commercial damage to pears was reported to C. B. Cordy, county agent for horticulture. The hail fell shortly before 8 p.m. and after dark, the reports said.

No other hail was reported to Cordy or to the weather bureau from other sections of the valley, although one-inch hailstones were reported at Sexton Mountain and heavy hail near Grants Pass also was reported to the weather bureau.

Cloud seeding pilots for the Rogue River Valley Traffic association flew for 4 hours, 48 minutes during the storm, and they believed they prevented damaging hail from falling generally over the valley's peach and pear orchards. Tops of the clouds built up to around 30,000 feet, the fliers said, and they flew through "an amazing exhibition" of lightning of all types and colors.

"The world was on fire up there," one of them said, and the storm at higher altitudes was as rough as anything they'd encountered before.

Two Fires
Two small fires, in the Elk creek area and near Butte Falls, were reported to the state forestry department here, but they expected no trouble with them. Some rain fell during the storm throughout the forests, department memos said. They expected no trouble with them.

Bodies of Dentists Located in Klamath

Yreka, Calif. — (U.P.) — Bodies of two San Jose, Calif., dental partners have been recovered from turbulent waters of the Klamath river near here, sheriff's deputies said today.

The body of Dr. Horace Rowe, 63, was discovered yesterday and that of his partner, Dr. Charles D. Bradley, 60, was found Tuesday.

The two launched a boat Saturday 20 miles south of here and were not seen again. Dr. Bradley's body was found 10 miles downstream and Rowe's about 30 miles below where the boat was launched.

Mrs. Dorthe Neilson Dies; Rites Pending
Mrs. Dorthe Neilson, wife of the late George Neilson, former district attorney of Jackson county, died last night at a local hospital.

Two Safe Burglars Get Prison Terms In Circuit Court

Two safe burglars received indeterminate prison sentences not to exceed 15 years yesterday from Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna according to District Attorney Walter Nunley.

The men, David Clinton Crockett, 31, Lander, Wyo., and Donald Edward White, Billings, Mont., had pleaded guilty to a charge of burglary by explosives at the O. K. Market at 1202 North Riverside ave., Medford, the night of July 16.

Blow Safe Open
They obtained \$1,100 in cash after blowing the market's safe with the use of nitro-putty, electric blasting caps and a battery. They returned to the market for the battery they had forgotten and met Police Officer Edward Zander, who arrested them on suspicion.

The two also admitted eight other burglaries in the Rocky mountain region, and rifle thefts. Monte Joe Treadwell, 33, formerly of Jacksonville, and James, Tex., was sentenced to the state prison for four years on a forgery charge involving cashing signed checks taken from the Jackson County Feed Co., at Court and McAndrews rd., Medford, Nunley said.

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Plans for funeral services will be announced later by Perl funeral home.

Russians Massing Troops and Armor In East Germany

Berlin — (U.P.) — Columns of Soviet troops and armor were reported moving toward industrial centers throughout rebellious East Germany today to put down rapidly spreading strikes by workers who defied a Red ban on acceptance of American "Eisenhower food parcels."

Massed in East Berlin
Heavy concentrations of Soviet troops and armor were reported being massed in East Berlin a few miles from the West sector distribution centers where upwards of 1,600,000 hungry East Germans have collected free food sent by the United States.

The anti-Communist Fighting Group Against Inhumanity, which has reliable contacts throughout the Soviet zone, reported Soviet troops in division strength were moving in many areas. Russian trained East German police also were reported moving in on trouble centers.

Tanks and Guns
The northwest German radio (British) reported that 400 freight cars carrying the Red army men, T-34 tanks, trucks, artillery and machine guns have rolled into the Magdeviehof freight yards in East Berlin in the last three days.

Forty to 50 of the big T-34 tanks were said to have arrived in the East sector of the city.

Western observers said it was too early to determine whether the troop movements were designed to intimidate rebellious workers or were in preparation for Russia's autumn war maneuvers.

Phone Rate Boost Hearings Ended

Salem — (U.P.) — Hearings before State Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel on the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co.'s application for rate increases were concluded here at noon today.

In all the hearings have taken more than nine days with the transcript running close to 1000 pages.

Last witness today was J. L. Kennedy, chief accountant for the commissioner, who presented testimony regarding the company's earnings. He said that the cost of capital to the company had increased and he proposed a six per cent return on net invested capital to the company instead of the 5.6 per cent return allowed PT & T after its last rate hearing. The company has been asking a return of 7 1/2 per cent which would mean an increase of some \$5,966,000.

Heltzel indicated it would take some time for him and his staff to study the hearing transcript before he makes his decision.

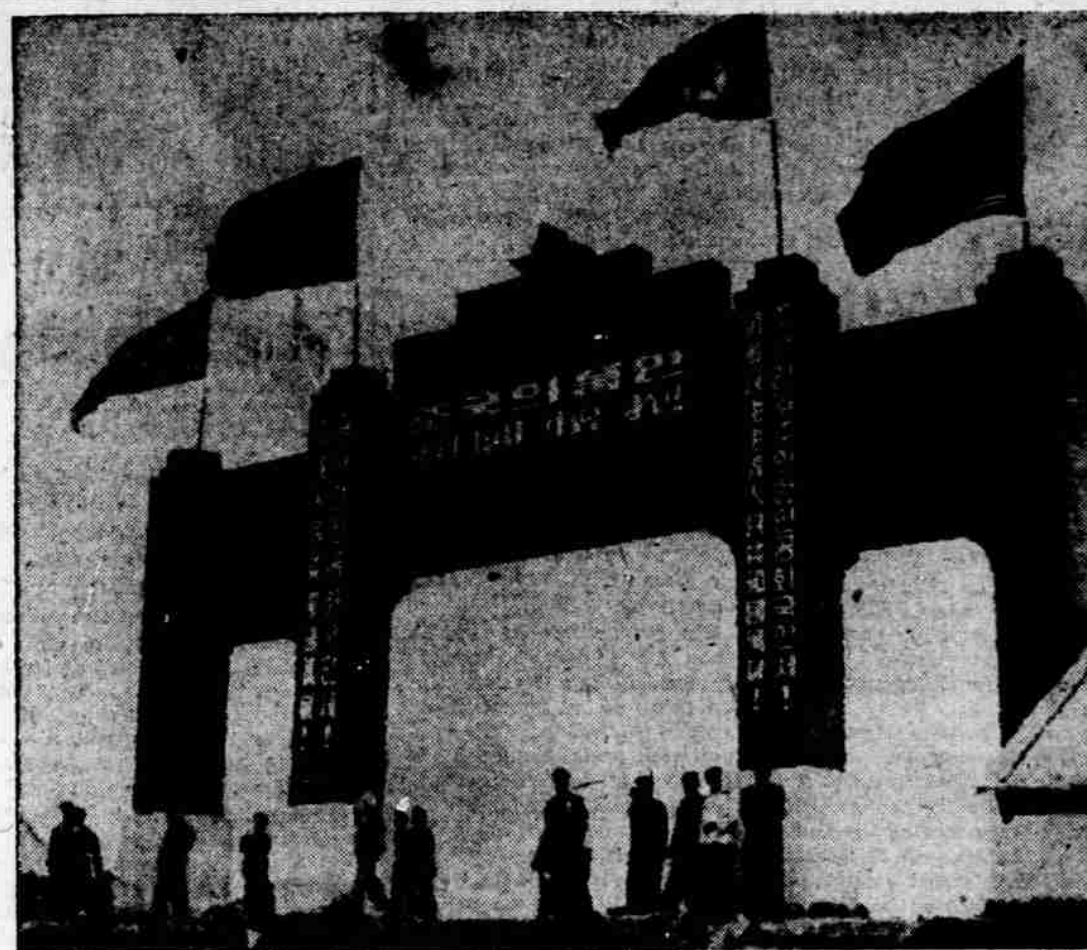
Forged Check Passed At Medford Market

Applegate Release Aid Asked of USSR

Washington — (U.P.) — The State Department disclosed it has asked Russia to use its influence with Red China to win release of three Americans captured aboard a private yacht last April.

The three Americans are Richard Applegate, Medford, Ore., former United Press correspondent; Donald Dixon, International News Service reporter, and Benjamin Krasner, a ship captain. The three were seized when the Red Chinese captured the yacht Kert on which they were traveling from Hongkong to Macao.

A department spokesman said the United States has made "several approaches to the Soviet Union asking them on a humanitarian basis to use their influence with the Peiping regime to rectify the unjustifiable treatment of American citizens in China."

He said the first approach was made in September, 1951, and the latest in May of this year.

Garbage Man Tires Of Hauling Away Bills

Orland, Calif. — (U.P.) — Garbage Collector Leone Penna told the city council he has given up sending garbage bills to his customers.

"What's the use?" he complained. "I send a bill, they throw it in the garbage can and then I have to haul my own bill to the city dump."

Red Promises Dimmed By Prisoners' Tales

Panmunjom, Korea — (U.P.) — The Communists promised to return 81 more "healthy" Americans at freedom gate today, but the joy over their return was dimmed by the growing fear that thousands of other captured Americans may never come back.

Three returning Americans now have told of fellow prisoners being sentenced by the Reds on phony charges of endangering the lives of other prisoners or "instigating against peace."

The 81 Americans to be returned today will bring to 221 the total released by the Reds in the first three days of "Big Switch."

In Bad Condition
However, the condition of ill and haggard prisoners, their appearance reminiscent of victims of the Nazi torture camps of Dachau and Buchenwald, will delay the United States homecoming of the few that are "healthy."

American officers at Inchon said the Reds are delivering so few able bodied prisoners that it may take three weeks or more before enough are collected to make up a shipload of 400.

Meanwhile, an American warrant officer painted a gruesome picture of North Korea's "Death Valley" where more than 2,000 American soldiers starved or froze to death in the bitter winter of 1950.

In Mass Graves
Dwight E. Cox, 50, of Fresno, Calif., now awaiting shipment home at Inchon, said mass graves were dug by the Americans for their buddies as they perished at the rate of five to 17 a day from starvation, dysentery and exposure.

Medical attention, he said, was "a farce."

Returning Americans hobbled on canes or crudely fashioned crutches to the reception tents for identification and preliminary medical examination. Some left the Communist ambulances on stretchers.

Two Americans were unconscious. They were not identified. One of the South Koreans was returned dead. Another ROK soldier was a living skeleton who dried to pull his tightened skin over his teeth to smile but couldn't.

Marines Shocked
Battle toughened Marines on duty at the reception center were shocked by the appearance of the gaunt, haggard shells of men.

A dazed Negro soldier stood like a robot on the tailgate of his truck and toppled into the arms of medics.

Guilty Plea Made On Larceny Charge

Floyd Earl Denno, alias Don Smalley, 23, Sun Valley, Calif., pleaded guilty Wednesday afternoon in circuit court to a charge of larceny by baillee, according to James McGowan, deputy district attorney.

The case was continued for sentencing, pending receipt of FBI records. Denno is charged with not returning an electric sander, valued at over \$75, which he had rented from the Sherwin-Williams Co. office in Medford on June 17.

In other circuit court business, the Jackson county grand jury returned an indictment Wednesday against Robert Kimbrell, 30, of 1468 Prune st., Medford, for drawing a bank check with insufficient funds. It stated that on Nov. 29, 1952, Kimbrell wrote a check, payable to the White City Sales Co. for \$748.42, which was not covered by a bank deposit. A bail of \$1,000 was continued on the charge.

Medford Soldier Among Far East War Returnees
Francis R. Pavao, Medford, an Army sergeant first class, is listed as one of seven Oregon servicemen returning on board the Navy transport Gen. Hugh J. Gaffey scheduled to arrive at Seattle port of embarkation tomorrow from the Far East, according to United Press.

Sergeant Pavao is not listed in local directories.

Bus and Car Plunge Into Canyon; Six Persons Killed

Hyiro, Okla. — (U.P.) — An express Greyhound bus and an automobile collided on a bridge approach near here today and carried six persons to their deaths in a canyon 40 feet below.

33 Persons Injured
The Oklahoma Highway Patrol, which reported the death toll, said 33 persons were injured, several critically.

The patrol listed among the tentatively identified injured: Vivian Corman, Riverside, Calif.; Fred Hill, Long Beach, Calif.; Alice B. Hopkins, Glendale, Calif., and her four year old daughter, Marian Elaine Hopkins, and Dominick J. Infanti, 34, Camarillo, Calif.

Deputy Sheriff E. W. Lewis said at the scene the death toll might climb to "eight or 10."

Officers could not immediately identify the dead.

The driver of the automobile was tentatively identified as Manuel E. Wilkey of the Yuma test station, near Yuma, Ariz. He was critically injured.

Crash on Narrow Bridge
It was not known if there were other occupants in the car. Lewis said the crash occurred on a narrow bridge on U. S. 66 about one mile west of here shortly before sunrise.

Lewis said it appeared that the bus was attempting to pass the automobile when a left tire blew out on the car causing it to skid into the bus's path.

Evidence Indicates Agreement Failed To Include Total

Issue To Be Pressed At Armistice Board

Washington — (U.P.) — Gen. Mark W. Clark, Far East commander, said today the Communists may hold from 2,000 to 3,000 more American prisoners than they have agreed to return as part of the armistice.

"We have certain evidence indicating they (the Communists) have more Americans," Clark told a news conference at the Pentagon.

The Communists have agreed to return 3,313 American prisoners.

Other Information
Clark said the Communist total is "not far from the number of American prisoners we estimated the Communists held for sure." But, at the same time, he said, the United States has "other information that leads us to believe they have more."

Clark said the evidence in American hands is not so certain that this country could make flat charges that the Communists hold more prisoners than they have admitted.

But he said the United States intends to press the issue at the Armistice commission. And if unsuccessful in getting a satisfactory answer the United States will turn the question over to the forthcoming political peace conference.

Must Submit List
The United States lists 8,705 American soldiers "missing in action" in Korea. The mystery of what happened to them may be partially, and tragically, solved in the next few days when the Reds submit a list of prisoners who have died.

For some American families, however, it will be months, if ever, before the fate of their missing sons is determined with certainty.

Clark said that when the Communists presented the 3,313 figure he asked advice from Washington as to whether he should accept that total or continue negotiations.

Can Protest Later
It was finally decided, he said, to accept the Communist figure with a reservation that the United States could protest later before the Armistice Commission.

Clark said he had no knowledge as to whether the Communists had submitted a list of prisoners, as required by the armistice agreement, who died within Red prison camps.

An Army spokesman said that as of last night no such list had been received from the Communists. He added that the list will not be made public until the Army has performed the sad task of notifying next of kin.

Clark also said:

1. There "might be" from 2,000 to 3,000 more Americans in Communist hands in Korea than the Reds have admitted.

2. If the Korean truce is violated, he would personally favor "using any weapon at the disposal of our country" in retaliation. That answered a question whether he would favor using the atomic bomb.

3. The Republic of Korea army does not "have the capability" to go it alone should present Communist forces in North Korea violate the armistice. But if all foreign troops, United Nations and Red Chinese, were removed from Korea, the ROKs "could take care of themselves" if attacked by North Koreans.
