Released POW Tells Of Mass Burials of Fellow Prisoners

Freedom Village, Korea — (U.P.) — Mass burials were held at the notorious Communist "mining camp" and "hundreds" of Americans starved or froze to death, a freed American Indian POW revealed today.

"Every day," said Cpl. Russell P. James, 25, an American Indian of Auburn, Wash., "we had to furnish a burial detail of 40 or 50 men. I was on most of the details."

"We buried at least 30 Americans every day," he said, "in big holes. They had just starved to death or frozen to death."

Burials Every Day
James, who was captured in December, 1950, while serving with the U. S. Second Infantry, said "more than half" of the Americans at the mining camp died of malnutrition and exposure.

"I just can't remember how many there were," he said. "It went on for months like that, 30 every day. Sometimes more."

The freezing weather "got" a lot of the American soldiers. "We didn't have any clothing the first year," he said. "The medical treatment, they just didn't have any. Some of the men were wounded and they died a few at a time."

"All we got to eat was in little cups about the size of a teaspoon, of millet or cracked corn twice a day. And we had to work all the time. Most of them just couldn't take it."

"They were coughing all the time and it was bad and every day we had to bury them."

James could not tell just how many Americans were in the infamous mining camp, but other returns have put the figure at "thousands."

"More than half of the prisoners died," James said.

Of the eight men captured with him, none of whom was wounded at the time, James said only three survived the brutal conditions of the Communist prison camp.
