## Festival Concert Planned Sunday Evening in Ashland

Ashland — The Oregon Shakespearean festival association will present the Portland symphonic brass ensemble in a two-hour concert of Elizabethan music adapted for brass instruments, on the theater stage in Ashland at 8:30 p.m. Sunday, August 9.

The first of two concerts of Elizabethan music this season, the program is a part of the festival's expanding music program.

The concert featuring the Portland musicians, all of whom play with the Portland symphony and have outstanding musical experience, will run the gamut from serious to extremely gay and sprightly music of the period. Included are 13 compositions, beginning with a brass adaptation of Purcell's brilliant organ piece "Voluntary on the 100th Psalm Tune," and ending with the same composer's refreshing "Air and Allegro from King Arthur."

Tickets for the concert may be had at the theater box office in Ashland or at the festival branch office in Swem's Book and Gift Shop, Medford. Membership holders in the festival may have tickets for \$7.50, including tax, and others for \$1.00 including tax. Children's price is \$7.50.

### Auxiliary Gives Camp White Party

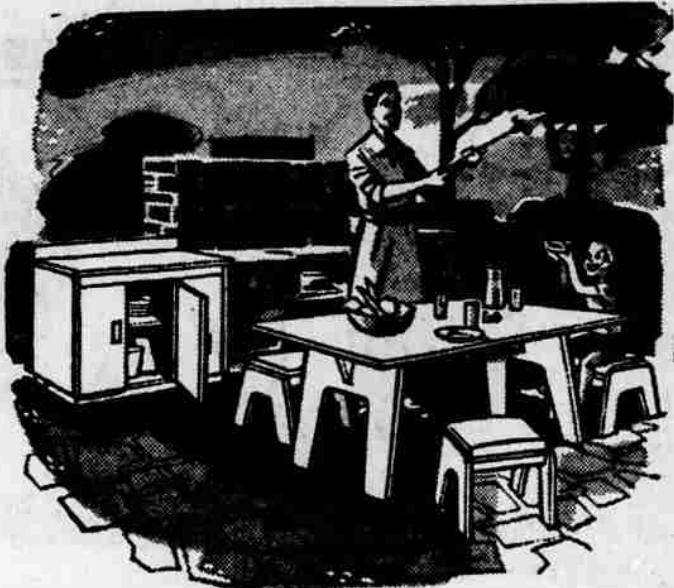

## Oregon Schools Have High Rate

Salem—(U.P.)—Oregon schools have a high rating, according to Donald A. Emerson, assistant state superintendent in charge of supervision and instruction in the state school system.

Of 388 elementary schools visited and evaluated by supervisors of the State Department of Education in the past school year, 92 per cent were rated as standard or conditionally standard.

The basic school support act passed by the 1947 Legislature placed responsibility on the state department of education to examine and evaluate schools of Oregon to determine their eligibility to receive benefits from the basic school support fund.

### Ratings Explained

Of 95 high schools visited, 87.2 per cent were rated as standard or conditionally standard. Emerson said the ratings for school are standard, conditionally standard, standard with advice or non-standard. Only five per cent of the grade schools and 3.2 per cent of the high schools were rated as non-standard. Since a school rated as non-standard is not eligible to receive basic school support funds,

Emerson said every effort is made by local school authorities, with the aid of state supervisors to earn better status.

### Improvement Plans Adopted

Several schools rated have not yet attained standard status, Emerson said, but have adopted plans of improvements that will, when completed make them fully standard. Meanwhile, they are designated as conditionally standard, a temporary status.

Other schools that come as near to complete standardization as present circumstances allow but have not yet made plans for a fully standard school, are rated as standard with advice. The high percentage of standard schools in Oregon has been achieved despite a rapid growth in school population. Emerson said:

"The rate of increase in population has been so great in some districts that their financial condition will not permit them to keep abreast of current needs. However, a majority of such districts have a program of improvements that is permitting them to advance at a reasonable rate toward the goal of complete standardization, and are rated

conditionally standard or standard with advice."

### More Schools Standard

A total of 117 grade schools were rated as standard in the past school year compared with 89 the previous school year. But high schools did not fare so well. A total of 54 high schools won standard rating during the last school year, compared with 99 in the 1931-32 school year.

Emerson said the job of visiting and evaluating schools made it impossible to cover the entire state with a single visit to each school oftener than in each three-year period.

### Oregon College Woman Struck by Automobile

Salem—(U.P.)—Mrs. Myrtle Tyler, bookkeeper at Oregon College of Education at Monmouth, was struck by a car yesterday while she was crossing a downtown Monmouth street.

Mrs. Tyler was taken to Dallas hospital where she was treated for a broken leg. Police said she was struck by a car driven by Carl McMahon, retired farmer and caretaker at the college.
