Portland City Employees Given Salary Increase

Portland — (U.P.) — Local policemen, firemen and other organized groups of municipal employees said today newly approved salary adjustments would still leave them far behind.

The new wages for many city employees total \$385,000 annually. They were approved yesterday by the city council and are retroactive to July 1.

To Release Inequities
The new pay scales are designed to relieve inequities and bring Portland city pay more closely in line with wages paid in comparable Pacific Coast cities and outside city employment.

P. C. Leineweber, spokesman for Portland Firefighters association, said local policemen and firemen will still be the lowest paid of comparable cities on the coast. He said the average for

the ten largest cities is now \$380 monthly.

Police patrolmen and fire fighters, the largest group affected, will realize a monthly increase of \$14, bringing their pay from \$326 to \$340.
