

Crowing Contest Plan Outlined at R.R. Council Meet

Rogue River — A request for closure of Depot street and a part of Main street during the rooster crowing contest scheduled for Saturday, September 5, was given consideration by the city council at the regular meeting Tuesday evening. Shade Combs, president of the Booster club, who asked that the streets be closed, stated the contest will probably be held in the forenoon from 9 to 12 o'clock.

While discussing the feasibility of closing Main street, which is a link of the county road, for three hours, the council was informed that, at a later date, the Rock Point bridge is to be closed for some months and local traffic diverted to the county road and that Gold Hill has requested the road be oiled to keep down the dust.

It was pointed out the local stores, due to lower overhead costs, are drawing trade from considerable distance. That their customers and the tourists alike enjoy the scenic drive along the old Stage road. Also, that route is preferred by many local people who wish to avoid the heavy trucking on Highway 99, and the high speed traffic which is thought to be responsible for increased fatalities.

Mention was made also of the flooding of Highway 99 when all traffic must be detoured to the Old Stage road. After due consideration the council voted to request Jackson County to improve and oil the Old Stage road from Gold Hill to the Jackson-Josephine county line.

The council voted to meet Friday and look over the area of the proposed Pine street storm drainage system and to measure the route of the drain.

Recorder Orva Jean Cruise reported three property owners opposed the closing of a part of Berglund avenue.

Mrs. Harry Nelson was appointed a member of the library board to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. John Knutson and Mrs. R. W. Hargitt was reappointed for a term of four years.

The council discussed the cleaning of vacant lots as a fire prevention measure.

Shivers Assured of Presidential Backing

Seattle — (U.P.) — Gov. R. F. Kennon of Louisiana said he would support Texas Gov. Allan Shivers for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1956.

But Kennon, attending the annual governor's conference here, said he believed Shivers could not win because the "Truman-Stevenson axis" still is in control of the Democratic party.

Furthermore, the Louisiana chief executive said he considered it "entirely likely" that President Eisenhower would be re-elected in 1956 "unless something no one has dreamed of should come up."

Easy Adjustment Seen for Oregon Business Firms

Portland — (U.P.) — Oregon businesses will be able to adjust to the changed Korean situation more easily than those in other states, according to business analysts for the National Association of Manufacturers.

The NAM based its optimistic prediction on the 40 per cent increase in industrial output in the state in the four-year period between 1947 and 1951. A 17 per cent increase was recorded in the single year from 1950 to 1951. National average for the same year was 14 per cent.

The research council for the NAM said "this is a strong plus for Oregon in that it shows the state is well ahead in the race to create capital and jobs for the expanding population." The council said some \$2,600,000,000 in expansion investment will be needed to provide jobs for the expected increase in Oregon's working force.

Water Trial Reset In District Court

The case of the state vs. Curtis O. Gerhardt, Applegate, for unauthorized use of water, has been reset for August 11 at 9:30 a.m., according to district court records.

The trial was originally set for yesterday, but had to be reset as the defendant's attorney, Gus Newbury, was ill. The firm of McAllister, Duncan and Brophy has taken on the case for the defendant.

Gerhardt pleaded innocent to the charge, a misdemeanor. The complaint was signed by Ed Kubli and involves other water users. It alleges that the defendant used all the water in a ditch which belonged to Kubli and some neighbors.

Natural Gas Found In Sams Valley Well

A steady flow of natural gas to about three to four feet above its outlet was located Monday on the Cliff Heeter home property in Sams Valley just north of Sams Valley school. The gas was struck at a depth of 110 feet while Heeter was drilling a well for water.

Pressure is not great and is not built up by keeping the casing capped, Heeter said. The gas appears to be pure, and makes a light blue, nearly invisible flame when lighted. It is not colored with orange or reddish tones common to gas found in oil well areas, Heeter explained. He is thinking seriously of piping a line from the flow to his home for domestic use, he added.

Oregon Man Hopes To Bring Reindeer Back From Alaska

Salem — (U.P.) — John Zumstein, Salem, left the capital city yesterday for Alaska and he hopes to bring back a herd of reindeer to Oregon.

With the help of Eskimo herders, bush pilots and the U. S. government, Zumstein says he thinks he has a chance to round up the reindeer.

Last year the federal government received 288 applications to buy reindeer in Alaska and bring them to the states, but only 44 reindeer left—or about one-seventh of a reindeer per application. Zumstein got 10 reindeer last year, but seven died before he was back at his ranch near Redmond with them. This trip he hopes to acquire 18 reindeer, and with his experience of last year, he hopes to bring all 18 safely and hale to Oregon.

Incidentally, what is the going price for reindeer? About \$10 for a fawn to \$200 for a bull, which makes the reindeer less dear than cattle in this country.

McKay's Choice of Assistants Praised

Seattle — (U.P.) — Interior Secretary Douglas McKay "has done his best to get good people and it would have been impossible to have been less political in his selections," Gov. Howard Pyle of Arizona said yesterday in Seattle.

Pyle, attending the 45th annual governors' conference, praised McKay's management of Interior affairs during the seven months of his administration.

Referring to power, reclamation and irrigation problems, Pyle said he believed they should be judged on the basis of whether they will be self-sustaining and whether they can reimburse the federal government for the original cost.
