

Complete Renovation Of Catholic Church Finished Within Week

A complete renovation of Sacred Heart Catholic church by parishioners was announced today by the Rev. Vincent Cuniff, assistant pastor. The work was under the direction of the Very Rev. Nicholas Deis, with Mrs. R. A. Micksche as chairman for the parish.

The entire project was completed in one week, the pews of the church being removed immediately after the last mass on Sunday, July 25, and the church was returned to order by the following Saturday, according to Father Cuniff.

Parishioners Do Work

Women of the church cleaned all the stations of the cross, the windows, and statues, while men of the parish did all the interior work in way of painting and carpentry after their regular working hours, with the exception of some of the interior done by Western Decorating company on the higher walls and ceiling and some other work done professionally, which included cleaning the large sanctuary mural, he said. New aisle carpeting was laid by the members.

A drapery was added at the back of the sanctuary, and draperies were placed over choir grilling. Pews, while at the St. Mary's school gymnasium where they were stored during the renovation, were completely refinished and men of the church redrilled floor positions and reset the pews in the church.
