Anatomy Must Be Covered On Beaches, Spain Rules

Madrid — (U.P.) — It's back to bloomers and Victorian modesty on Spanish beaches this year.

Vogue notwithstanding, Spain's traditionally strict code of morality will be adhered to by all seaside visitors, both foreign and domestic, unless they wish to be arraigned for indecent exposure.

In a memorandum issued by police headquarters here, men and women looking forward to the restful pleasures of sand and sea were reminded to be clothed "with the traditionally modest and good-taste becoming Spaniards."

The memorandum, published in all the papers, admonished against current indecencies of strapless and two-piece bathing suits, bikinis and G-strings.

The memorandum said, "Swimming suits should cover both chest and back adequately. Women's bathing suits should have a skirt and men must wear sport-shorts."

"Swimming suits may not be worn on beaches, at clubs, bars, restaurants, boats or generally outside the water."

Some States OK Tax Reductions

Chicago — (U.P.) — A study by the Federation of Tax Administrators reveals that a number of states have approved proposals for income tax reductions in the form of credits, expanded deductions and rate revisions. This is what the various state legislatures have done thus far in 1958:

Colorado: A 20 per cent credit allowed individuals and corporations for every taxable year since 1950 was extended for another year.

Idaho: A 15 per cent tax credit was allowed individuals and corporations beginning with the 1953 tax year.

Iowa: The legislature has sent the governor a measure to make permanent a temporary 25 per cent tax credit first allowed on 1947 income.

Kansas: Allowed an added deduction of \$600 to persons over 65 and blind.

Maryland: Extended the 15 per cent credit first allowed individuals last year.

Montana: Allowed a medical deduction up to \$1,250 for each taxpayer and each dependent, with a maximum deduction of \$2,500 on a single person's return and \$5,000 on a joint return.

New York: Extended for another year the 10 per cent credit it has allowed on personal income taxes and a 25 per cent reduction in its unincorporated business tax rate.

North Dakota: Revised tax brackets, cutting taxes from two to one per cent on net income between \$2,000 and \$3,000, from 12.5 to 10 per cent on net income between \$10,000 and \$15,000, and from 15 to 11 per cent on net income above \$15,000. The state has also raised the personal exemption for single taxpayers and dependents from \$500 to \$600 and allowed an additional \$600 exemption for individual taxpayers and each spouse over 65.

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Plywood Firm Denies Fire Responsibilities

Salem — (U.P.) — The Vancouver Plywood Co. denied liability for any forest fires in Oregon in an answer to a suit filed in Marion county circuit court by the state of Oregon.

The firm is one of several defendants in an action by which the state seeks to recover \$282,582 it says it spent fighting fires in the Santiam canyon in August and September of 1951.

Vancouver Plywood said the cost to the state was not more than \$10,000, and it alleged further that the flare up involved was the result of carelessness or negligence on the part of the state and fire patrol associations which took over patrolling of the district. The question was also raised as to the proportionate liability of Marion and Linn counties.

Roller-Coaster Belt Transports Coal

Charleston, W. Va. — (U.P.) — A "roller-coaster," almost three miles long but dedicated to a more serious purpose than thrills is functioning every day in the Kanawha river valley near here.

It is the 14,000-foot-long conveyor belt system leading from a mine in the side of a mountain to barges in the Kanawha river near Montgomery, W. Va.

The mine is one of the sources of coal for a large steam-generating plant being built on the river at Glasgow, W. Va. Geologists estimate that at the present rate of production the mine will still be going full blast after the next 100 years.

The belts are in nine sections, each hooked up with a power system capable of delivering 550 HP but actually using only 263 net HP electrical input. Three of the belts move down hill and actually generate power.

The distance traveled by the

belts, down, around, up and over is about one-fifth of the distance a truck would have to travel over the mountain roads to go the same distance. Mine operators say it would take at least a dozen 15-ton trucks working 20 hours a day to match the belt's carrying capacity.

If the mine should suddenly give out and leave the owners with an empty hole and a long belt on their hands, they might make a comfortable living with paid underground tours and a thrill ride thrown in for good measure.

Seattle — (U.P.) — Members of the Seattle Times unit of the American Newspaper Guild, (CIO) were to vote today on a new wage scale increase offer proposed by the newspaper yesterday in an effort to end the strike which has kept the Times out of circulation since July 16.

Oregon Public Health Grant Suffers Cut

Portland — (U.P.) — Oregon's expected federal public health grant for the current fiscal year has been reduced by \$99,516 because of congressional cuts, Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer said today.

He said that the state's venereal disease program would be wiped out because of loss of all the \$26,411 grant for this purpose. Reductions also will be made in tuberculosis, cancer, mental health, heart disease and maternal and child health programs, Dr. Erickson said.

Dr. Erickson said that unless the State Emergency Board moves to replace the federal funds, no action to restore the cuts by the state could be taken until the next Legislature, in 1959.

Oregonian Injured In Bay Area Mishap

San Francisco — (U.P.) — A man tentatively identified as Melvin A. Swanson, 40, Dexter, Ore., was critically injured yesterday when he was run over by a car following a downtown fist fight.

Swanson had been knocked into the street by a blow from Pedro L. Villa, 30, San Francisco. He was then run over and dragged 101 feet by a car driven by John T. Scanlon, 22, a sailor stationed aboard a ship in port here.

No citations were issued, but Villa was booked at city prison on suspicion of aggravated assault.

Washington — (U.P.) — The Agriculture Department will ask the tariff commission to set import fees on foreign wool until the 100,000,000 pound domestic wool surplus can be reduced, an official said.
