

Symphonic Brass Ensemble To Give Concert on Sunday

Ashland—Music lovers who hear the Oregon Shakespearean festival's first concert of Elizabethan music Sunday evening will hear the second brass ensemble formed by professional musicians in this country.

The Portland symphonic brass ensemble, made up of musicians from the Portland symphony orchestra, was formed this past spring and the group's debut, at Reed college in Portland, was an experiment to determine whether the public desired the unusual musical fare. The success of the debut was marked by a re-engagement to play at Reed graduation ceremonies and the installation of a new president at the Portland institution.

Following these engagements, the group played in various schools in the Portland area. Next year, three extensive tours will take the musicians to colleges and universities in Washington, Montana, Idaho and California, and into Canada.

The concert from the festival theater stage Sunday evening will be two hours long, and will feature the spirited marches and dances of the Elizabethan era. The concert will begin at 8:30 p.m.

Tickets are on sale at the theater box office in Ashland and in Swen's Book and Gift shop in Medford. Tickets will be available to holders of festival season tickets at a lower price. Children's tickets are also available.

The part that Miss Womack is now playing, Sandoe said, is that of a boy-king — a minor with better judgement than most of his elders, who strives sensibly but ineffectually to resolve the conflicts within his kingdom.
