San Francisco — (U.P.) — Shed a tear for San Francisco's Bill Boemler, fans, the guy who has lost more games than any other coast league pitcher this year and can't even win when he fans 16 batters and huris 10 innings of shutout ball.

Wild William's frightening fast one set the year's high for strike outs last night but Portland beat him in the 11th inning, 2-0, when Frankie Austin blooped a bases-loaded double down the left field line. It was Boemler's 14th loss.

The defeat dropped the erratic Seals back into a tie with the Beavers for fourth place and left the club scoreless in its last 23 innings.

Twinks Lead Out

Glenn Elliott got the Portland win last night after battling Boemler for 10 innings. Willie (The Knuck) Ramsdell, Los Angeles castoff, pitched the 11th for Portland.

Seals Stadium tonight for a bob-tailed series, cut Hollywood's lead to five games by defeating Los Angeles 5-4 while Sacramento belted the Twinks, 10-2.

And Al Gettel finally roped that elusive 21st victory as his Oakland mates took off against San Diego, 13-1.

A pinch hit triple by Clarence Maddern in the ninth inning with two on base gave the Suds their heart — stopping triumph over the Cherubs. Walt Jundich started the big rally when he socked loser Bob Spicer for a home run.

One Out Of Four

Marino Pieretti rubber-armed the Twinks into submission with an eight-hitter while his mates connected for 18 blows to salvage the last contest of a disastrous four game series. Pieretti now is 10 and 10.

Jim Marshall spearheaded the Oakland onslaught by whaling a three run homer and driving in three other runs as he smashed a double and two singles. Jim's big blast came during a four run spurge against Theophil Smith, who staggered out with his 13th loss. It was the Oaks' only triumph of the five game session and they remained jammed in the basement.

"Its great advance was among the last and many important of his many important public achievements," the President said.

"Today, I know of no greater inspiration to all men seeking good, just government than the memory of his courage, his integrity and the spirit of selfless cooperation that so brilliantly marked the last months of his life."

Indian Liquor Approval Lauded

New York — (U.P.) — American Indian leaders today hailed the repeal of federal legislation forbidding the sale of liquor to Indians as "a giant step toward full emancipation for American Indian citizens."

Oliver LaFarge, president of the Association on American Indian Affairs also praised both the liquor law repeal and the repeal of other statutes forbidding Indians to buy and sell firearms, livestock and other personal property.

Both bills presently await President Eisenhower's signature.

LaFarge made public similar appreciations from Clarence Wesley, chairman of the San Carlos, Ariz., Apache Tribal Council; Robert Yellowtail, president of the Montana Intertribal Council; and Harry J. W. Belvin, principal chief of the Choctaw Nations, Durant, Okla.

British Champ, Harry Matthews Set Seattle Go

Seattle, Wash. — (U.P.) — Burly Don Cockell, heavyweight boxing champion of the British Empire, bids for a shot at the world crown tonight when he takes on ninth-ranked Harry (Kid) Matthews in a 10-round outdoor bout in Sicks Stadium here.

Matthews, who flubbed his last buildup by stopping a kayo punch thrown by Champion Rocky Marciano in New York last year, also hopes to get another chance with an impressive win.

Jack Hurley, Matthews' talkative manager, predicted a title shot for the winner. Hurley said: "This fight should produce a logical challenger for Marciano. The champion is running out of challengers and the winner of this bout should be in line for a title shot."

Cockell, a squat, bullish fighter who will be making his American debut, is expected to enter the ring at 205 pounds against 182 for Matthews.

Hog Prices Increase On Midwest Market

Chicago — (U.P.) — Hog prices rose sharply at most Midwest markets today to end an 11-day decline.

A smaller supply shipped to the major livestock centers sent prices upward 50 cents to \$1 per hundred pounds.

Top prices ranged from \$23.50 to \$24.50.

Despite today's trend, housewives could look forward to lower pork prices soon at neighborhood butcher shops, industry spokesmen said.

Livestock traders attributed the recent decline to early marketing of last spring's pig crop.

Asked what ways he had that the Communies did not like, Campbell said, "I had a MacArthur hat which they became very annoyed about." He exhibited his blue prison hat with a piece of cardboard inserted in the visor so that the bill stood up stiffly.
