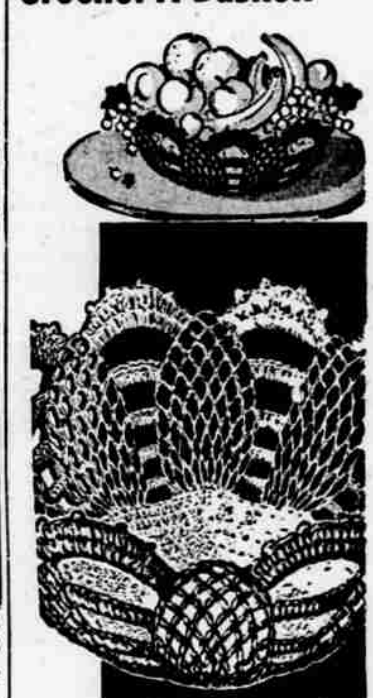
Picnic Planned By Talent Group

Industrial Safety Conference Stated

Salem —(U.P.)— The annual governor's industrial safety conference will be held in Portland Nov. 19-20, the State Industrial Accident Commission said here today.

This year's conference will include 10 separate industry sections groups: Logging, log loading, hauling and dumping, sawmilling, plywood, metals, automotive and repair, building construction, electrical utilities and food processing.

Gov. Paul Patterson will preside at the opening of the conference. Industrial accident commissioners Paul E. Gurske, T. Morris Dunne and L. O. Larsen will be co-chairmen of the meeting.

Hells Canyon Decision On Reports Favored

Portland —(U.P.)— Rep. Sam Coon, (R-Ore.), thinks the controversial Hells Canyon issue should be decided on the basis of engineering reports.

Here for a week end gathering of GOP leaders, Coon said "The Idaho Power company's plan should be approved only if the facts . . . show it to be the most advantageous from an engineering standpoint."

Idaho Power has applied for Federal Power Commission authority to build three dams on the Snake, while public power advocates favor one high dam at Hells Canyon. The Commission last Friday recessed hearings on the issue for six weeks.

Valuable Grass Seed Destroyed by Flames

Salem —(U.P.)— A grass fire swept over 50 acres of farmland east of Salem late yesterday and destroyed valuable grass seed.

A stiff wind fanned the flames which burned over fescue grass on the Emil Hintz and Howard Mader farms before they were brought under control.

Most of the fields had been harvested, but the flames destroyed a ton of harvested fescue seed on each farm. The seed was valued at 43 cents a pound.

The flames were fought by the Four Corner fire department volunteers, aided with equipment from the Aumsville and Sublimity fire departments.

Portland —(U.P.)— James E. Keys, Salem, was named executive director of the National Society of Public Accountants at a weekend meeting here on the new board of governors.

Keys will direct the business affairs of the public accountants' organization from Washington, D.C.

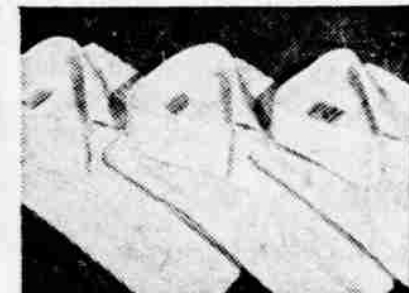
