New York — (U.P.) — With a holocaust of hits, the blazing Yankees showed today what they thought of the Senators and their "tall grass" ball park after a 22-1 near-record victory they could have won in a corn field.

Their 28 hits were only two short of an American league record mark of 30 set by the 1923 Yankees, and had not rookie reliever Steve Kraly yielded a run to Washington in the eighth, they would have had a modern mark for a shutout margin. The record of 21-0 was set by the 1901 Tigers and equaled by the 1939 Yankees.

Casey Stengel, commenting caustically that the rash of low hit games in Washington was because of the high outfield grass which kept balls from bouncing any distance, suddenly was aware that his Yankees did not care what was out there.

Sox Blow Up

The White Sox, painfully aware of what was happening, blew up in Cleveland and lost, 7-4, to go seven games behind again as Gene Bearden threw balls at umpire Paparella and his glove into the stands and faced a stiff fine and suspension after Bob Avila was ruled safe at home on a close play in the seventh.

At St. Louis, Ray Boone of the Tigers hit his fourth grand slam homer of the year to tie an American league mark in a 7-3 victory over the Browns. It was his 19th round tripper of the campaign.

The Red Sox made it three straight over the Athletics, winning 3-2 as Billy Goodman and Hoot Evers drove in the decisive runs in the 10th inning.

The Dodgers spotted the Giants a 5-0 lead then won 6-5 as Duke Snider sparked a five-run rally with his second grand

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The Los Angeles Angels, still boiling from their recent riot with Hollywood, were the prime reason today why their crosstown enemies enjoyed a nine game lead in the Pacific Coast League scramble.

Even though they knew they were doing the hated Hollywoods a favor, Stan Hack's Cherubs belted fading Seattle twice in a doubleheader last night to drop the Suds another full game behind the Twinks, who barely eked out a split with Sacramento.

And not to be selfish or anything the Hackers also tightened their grip on third place in the league standings.

Angels Tighten Third

Los Angeles has come from behind to win more games than any other club in the loop this year and last night's heart-stoppers were no exception. In the first game they spotted the Suds a 4-0 lead then rallied to tie it up 4-4 after the first four innings. Singles by Les Peden and Murray Franklin then snapped the tie in the fifth and cost relief pitcher Tom Lovrich the game. The final score was 5-4.

The Angels then trudged into home half of the nightcap's ninth inning trailing 8-3 and erupted for six runs to stun the Rainiers, 9-8. A pinch double by Dixie Upright was the blow that plummeted Al Widmar to his 12th loss.

Kenny Gables handcuffed the Twinks with a three-hitter in the seven-inning lid-lifter to assure the Sacs a 2-0 victory. Bob Dillinger doubled in one of the runs

slam homer in three games.

Second place Milwaukee picked up a half-game and trails now by seven games by sweeping a double bill with the Cardinals 8-2 and 5-3. Ed Mathews set the opening game pace by driving in two runs with a pair of doubles while the Braves won the second game with two runs in the eighth on a double by Jim Pendleton and a scoring fly by pinch-hitter Bob Thorpe.

Robin Roberts became the first major league pitcher to win 20 games, scattering 12 hits, striking out nine and driving in three runs as he delivered a key triple in Philadelphia's 8-4 victory over Pittsburgh. Roberts won his 20th game in 1952 on Aug. 19.

The Cubs topped Cincinnati, 3-1 on the nine-hit pitching of Bob Rush, who struck out 10 batters, after losing the opener 10-6 when Andy Seminick hit a grand-slam homer in the ninth inning.

Bevos Trip Oaks, 6-4; Win Series

Portland — (U.P.) — The Portland Beavers batted Jim Atkins for 13 hits last night to drop Oakland, 6-4, and cinch the four-game PCL series.

Lyman Linde started the Beavers on the way to their third straight win over the Oaks, but needed the help of Red Adams in the eighth. It was Linde's 10th win against nine losses, while Atkins came out with a 6-12 record.

A homer in the second frame by Bob Marquis and another in the fourth by Aaron Robinson got the Beavers off to an early start. Fletcher Robbe added another run in the third by doubling in Hank Arft.

Robbe batted in his second run in the fifth when Frankie Austin scored on his single. In the seventh, Arft singled, Robbe doubled and Atkins gave Robinson an intentional walk to load the bases and set up Portland's final two runs. Herm Reich looped a single to center field to score Arft and Eddie Basinski filed out, allowing Robbe to score.

Oakland made a strong scoring threat in the eighth before Linde left the mound. With two out, Davis got a double and Art Cuitti a single to score two runs. That ended Linde and Adams struck out Johnny Bero to retire the side.

NFL '53 Games Announced By Commissioner Bert Bell

Philadelphia — (U.P.) — Commissioner Bert Bell today announced a 72-game schedule for the 1953 National Football League season and predicted a new attendance record for the loop's 34th year of operation.

The doctory commissioner, enthusiastic about the season's prospects and the expanded television program which will bring the game to added millions of fans on Saturday nights, said ticket sales were up in all league cities.

The new N.F.L. schedule includes eight Saturday night games, two Saturday afternoon games, one Friday night contest and the Thanksgiving day Green Bay at Detroit game. The '53 schedule opens with six games on Sept. 27 and ends Dec. 13. The championship playoff is scheduled for Dec. 27 on the home field of the Western Conference champion.

According to present plans, 20 regular season games and the championship playoff will be televised coast-to-coast. The TV schedule includes seven Saturday night games, two Saturday afternoon contests from Los Angeles in December, and 11 Sunday afternoon games. These telecasts will be blacked out in the vicinity of the home team.

"Keep an eye on Green Bay. They have a great ball club," Bell said.

New York — (U.P.) — Hein Ten Hoff, a huge heavyweight out of Germany, is hoping today that boxing history will repeat itself up to a certain point.

Twenty-five years ago, another German heavyweight champion of the world, that was Max Schmeling.

And already there is a parallel between these two imported fighters.

Parallels Schmeling

Each had his trouble getting started toward the top. The scowling, beetle-browed "Moxie" came to this country in 1928 and it was almost six months before he could get a bout of any calibre.

In desperation, his manager Arthur Bulow, began to give anybody and everybody who might help him get a good match a "piece" of his fighter.

The difficulty was that he gave away too many "pieces." It figured out eventually that he had sold 111 per cent, a situation similar to that of madcap Maxie Baer.

A solution was worked out when the late Joe Jacobs and Billy McCarney bought out everybody with an interest, pulled the strings to get Schmeling started and eventually "acted" their way to the title by claiming a winning foul in the championship bout with Jack Sharkey.

Getting Started

Ten Hoff hasn't been paroled in such quantities, but after a period of frustration, his manager Fritz Kirsch, has accepted local entanglements and Hein is moving forward in the heavyweight picture.

After two nondescript bouts, in Las Vegas and Salt Lake City, he finally gained a foothold in the New York area and scored a swift kayo over one Big Bill Wilson.

Now, also in Schmeling's footsteps he'll campaign on the New Jersey doorstep, fighting Albany's Jimmy Rouse in Newark on Aug. 24.

Again, as in Schmeling's case it could be Ten Hoff's passport to the big time.



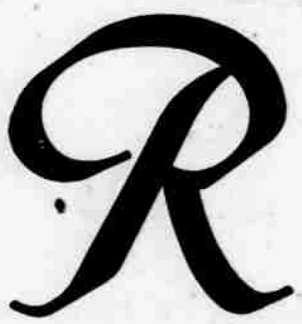
