

Eisenhower Sets Up Committee To Police Employment Practice

Denver—(U.P.)—President Eisenhower today set up a new government-public committee to police discriminatory employment practices by industries and businesses holding federal contracts.

By executive order, the chief executive established a 14 member Government Contract Committee to replace the Committee on Government Contract Compliance established in 1951 by former President Truman.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said the new unit would have broader powers than its predecessor, and also would have public members. The old organization consisted only of department and agency representatives.

Negroes on Committee

Asked how the new committee would get its broader powers which were not reflected in the language of the order, Hagerty said he thought the increased powers would lodge primarily

in the eight public members. These members, he said, will include Negroes and "will be given by the President and the administration considerable operation and broad powers within each department by the President's direction."

To Name Eight Members

Hagerty said the President would name eight public members shortly. He said they would be "top notch men." Establishment of the new committee will not alter present executive orders requiring all government contracting agencies to include in each contract an anti-discrimination clause.

These clauses obligate the contractor not to discriminate against any employee or job applicant because of race, creed or national origin.

Signs 55 Bills

The President conferred early today in his temporary White House offices at Lowry Air Force Base with Harry Darby, former Kansas senator and now GOP national committeeman from his state.

Mr. Eisenhower left immediately after the meeting after signing 55 bills, most of them private relief measures. He planned to go to Cherry Hills Country Club for golf.

Launching Facilities Due at McNary Dam

Walla Walla—(U.P.)—The Army Corp of Engineers today announced plans for construction of boat launching facilities in the McNary dam reservoir recreation area.

District Engineer Col. F. S. Tandy said work on the launching facilities probably will start this fall.

The engineers have issued a call for bids for construction of two boat launching facilities at the reservoir and construction of access roads.

Klamath Mill, Union Agree on Wage Increase

Klamath Falls—(U.P.)—Agreement calling for a five-cent per hour increase retroactive to April 1 was reached last night between the local union of the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) and Klamath Basin Pine Mills, Inc.

About 250 are affected.

Oregon Farmers Vote Tomorrow On Wheat Quotas

Tomorrow is election day for some 11,075 Oregon wheat farmers in 107 communities in 34 counties.

Balloting will be part of a nationwide poll among wheat growers to determine their choice between rigid acreage controls with high price supports, or no quotas with sharply reduced subsidies.

New Quotas Lower

If production quotas are approved by a two-thirds majority, the federal government will continue to support wheat prices at 90 per cent of parity or about \$2.45, Portland. But the new quotas for next year's plantings in Oregon are 26 per cent, or about 400,000 acres, lower than this year. Production in excess of quotas would be penalized by about \$1.20 a bushel.

Would Cut Subsidies

If the farmers reject government control of their acreage, subsidies will be cut to 50 per cent of parity of to about \$1.45 a bushel.

The election was called by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson when bumper crops gave the nation a stockpile of nearly two billion bushels of wheat. Domestic demand for wheat in the United States seldom exceeds 700,000,000 bushels.

Ike Proves Self as Expert With Skillet As Well As Top Hand With Fishing Rod

Pine, Colo.—(U.P.)—President Eisenhower is not only a master mountain trout fisherman, but a top hand with the skillet.

I watched the President cook and fish here yesterday and came away impressed more by his streamside cooking ability than his deftness with a fly rod.

Not that he isn't an expert angler. I was just impressed by the close up of the nation's chief executive scurrying through the underbrush to pick up firewood, quickly building a rough stove of stones taken from the Platte river, then frying trout in heavy skillets and serving them on paper plates with undisguised pride.

Catches Good Fish

Mr. Eisenhower drove here from Denver yesterday to the cattle ranch of an old friend, Bal Swan. Bal wasn't around but the chief executive had an able fishing companion in Axel Nielsen, head of the Denver Chamber of Commerce.

They fished for about two hours in the stream running through the ranch. The President landed a handsome string of rainbow, brook and brown trout.

He, Nielsen and Col. Robert L. Schultz, the President's military aide, finally sat by the bank when the day grew hot and cleaned their fish.

Bacon Sizzles

The President returned to the ranch buildings, shucked his heavy wading boots and proclaimed:

"Come on everybody, let's go down stream a bit and I'll cook you some of the best fish you ever ate."

The President peeled the greasy wrapper from a pound of bacon, sliced it with his pocket knife, and started the bacon sizzling in one of the skillets.

Then he melted butter in the other skillet and eventually mixed bacon grease with butter in each pan.

Oregon was due for another scorching today and the weather bureau held out little hope of relief from soaring temperatures during the next 24 hours.

Fire danger was expected to remain at high levels in most Oregon forest areas, with the exception of the coastal strip.

All reporting stations in Oregon except Portland and the coast had readings above 90 degrees yesterday. Medford had the hottest with 100. Portland had 87 while Newport had 64.

Forecasters predicted temperatures from 78 to 98 through Friday in the interior and 62 to 72 on the coast. A few southeastern mountain areas may get thundershowers. Lakeview had .01 of an inch of rain in the 24 hours ended this morning.

Must Pay Taxes For Log Permits

New legislation enacted at the recent session of the Oregon legislature requires that all taxes due on timber be paid before a logging operation permit can be issued by the state forest, according to Ted Maul, district warden for the state board of forestry.

Maul recommends that those applying for a 10-day temporary logging permit at the Medford office of the state forester first secure some means of showing that timber taxes have been paid.

He stated that steps which an operator should take to facilitate issuance of permits at the local office include:

1. Know the legal subdivision on which the operator intends to work.

2. Know the name and address of the landowner involved.

3. Have proof that taxes have been paid on the particular piece of property. Proof which will be accepted by the office includes tax receipts and tax collector's certification of taxes paid.

The state forester must close down any operation which exists on lands on which the timber and severance taxes have not been paid. The closure will remain in effect until proof is presented of such payment of taxes and penalties.

Freedom Medals Due Two Portland Men

Salem—(U.P.)—Gov. Paul Patterson today presents George Washington honor medals of the Freedom Foundation to two Portland men for outstanding service in the civil defense program.

Chosen to receive the awards were Dr. Russell H. Kaufman, chief of the physicians' section of the Oregon civil defense emergency medical service, and O. R. Blair, director of the Oregon civil defense transportation service. Awards are based primarily on work done during 1952.

Newspaper, Union Report 'No Progress'

Seattle—(U.P.)—Representatives of the Seattle Times and the striking unit of the American Newspaper Guild (CIO) met with federal conciliators yesterday and reported "no progress" in the strike which caused suspension of publication July 16.

Federal Mediator Barney Towner said no further meeting between management and the Guild were scheduled at present. However, both parties are working to set a basis for a new meeting, he said.

Some 250 Guild members in the editorial, advertising and circulation departments of the newspaper are involved in the strike for an increase in wages.

Job's Daughters Start Arriving in Portland

Portland—(U.P.)—Vanguard of an estimated 1,000 delegates and visitors to the supreme guardian council session of the International Order of Job's Daughters were arriving here today.

Formal opening of the session was set for today in the Shrine ballroom of the Masonic Temple. Eighteen drill teams from the United States and Canada will compete tonight at the Portland armory.

Delegates include 110 adult voting leaders of the Masonic girls' organization, 604 girl members, and 252 adult visitors. The session will end Saturday night.
