Hurricane Moving Off Georgia Coast

A hurricane moved northward 300 miles off the Georgia-South Carolina coast today and small craft began putting into safe harbors.

Elsewhere, a windstorm inflicted heavy damage at Clarksville, Ark.

The Atlantic hurricane, nicknamed Barbara, was powered by winds up to 100 miles an hour.

At Cape Hatteras, N.C., the wind rose to 22 miles per hour and rain began falling.

Air Force installations along the coast planned to move planes inward in anticipation of a blow.

Violent winds, described by some observers at the College of Ozarks as a tornado, raked Clarksville, damaging about 100 homes, uprooting trees and smashing store windows.

Furnace 'Racket' Warning Issued

A warning against the "furnace repair racket" was issued today by Don McNeill, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

The National Better Business bureau, with which the chamber is affiliated, reports that although the great majority of firms engaged in servicing and selling furnaces deal fairly with the public, a minority in this business continue to use certain dishonest tricks to exploit the gullible, McNeill said.

He added that the most persistent racket in furnace repair is an attempt to sell a new furnace unfairly and without justification when the agreed-upon or re-setting leads to the "discovery" that the old furnace cannot be repaired.

The majority of firms in the furnace and furnace repair field are reputable and give the public reliable cleaning and repair service and do not frighten the public into buying new furnaces by falsely condemning old ones as unsafe, McNeill said. He advised that to avoid the few who damage the industry as a whole by using questionable tactics, homeowners deal only with firms known to be reliable.

Wall Street

New York—(U.P.)—Stocks receded from their highs late in the session today, after moving up sharply. Trading was moderately active.

The mild selling near the close was attributed to profit taking. Near the close, gains were limited mostly to the fractional zone with the exception of few specialties which showed much wider improvement. Sales in the first four hours of dealings were the highest in a week.
