## Indian Detained On Open Charge As Murder Suspect

Madras—(U.P.)—A 24-year-old Warm Springs Indian was held by Jefferson county authorities today on an open charge in connection with the death of Jeff Walsey, 52, another Indian, whose semi-nude body was found dumped by a roadside Monday.

### Arrest Follows Probe

Reginald Winishut was arrested after a preliminary investigation by officers of the Warm Springs agency, Jefferson county sheriff's deputies, the FBI and state police.

Walsey's body was found 26 miles northwest of Madras by a highway inspection team that included members of the State Highway Commission.

Winishut, a serviceman attached to an engineer unit at Ft. Lewis, Wash., led police to a blood-soaked piece of ground on Agency Plains three miles north of here and told them that a struggle had taken place there. He did not give officers further details, saying his memory had blacked out.

### Blow on Head

Wasco county coroner's office reported that Walsey's death was caused by a blow on the head. Police learned that Winishut was AWOL from his unit as of Tuesday. They said he had been seen in Prineville with Walsey last Thursday night and Friday morning with two teen-age Indians.

### ARGUMENT SETTLED

Lawrenceville, Ill. — (U.P.) — County Judge Richard Simpson easily settled the argument between J. T. Nicholas, 44, Lawrenceville, and Henry Clay Clark, 46, Metropolis, after they were brought before him and accused each other of driving the car whose erratic movement caused police to bring them in. He fined Nicholas and Clark \$100 and costs each.

## Safeway Claims Union Conspiring To Force Food Costs Higher

Portland — (U.P.) — Safeway Stores, Inc., charged an AFL Meat Cutters union, five union members and seven market operators in the Seaside area with violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act in a suit on file today in Federal District Court here.

Named in the suit were the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workers of North America; Union Local No. 143; Amos Buck, Herman F. Fahlbusch, Edward Wilson, Tony Wallace and Joseph Y. Henderson, Seaside union officials, and J. A. Weber, Wenzel G. Luthie, Ray D. Cameron, Robert R. Staley, Wayne G. Smith, Vernon Vincent and Carl R. Hertig, Seaside market operators.

### Higher Costs Cited

The suit charges the defendants seek to force costs on Safeway stores in Seaside higher than those incurred in operations of the independent markets operating in competition to Safeway.

A union picket line was placed around the Seaside Safeway store Aug. 7 to back up demand the chain pay union butchers triple time for holidays, double time for Sundays and time and a half for work after 6 p.m. Safeway, in its complaint, charges the union and independent market operators conspired to force the higher operating costs and consumer goods prices onto Safeway without increasing costs and price at the independent markets. Safeway claims this is in restraint of interstate commerce.

## Back Stairs: Ike Not Race Fan

Denver — (U.P.) — Backstairs at the summer White House:

Mrs. John S. Doud, mother of the President's wife, likes dog racing. She frequently visits the local track when the fleet Greyhounds thrill the pari-mutuel bettors on summer nights.

The President is no racing fan, however, and prefers to stay at Mrs. Doud's home evenings and chat or play bridge with old friends.

### Neighbors Alarmed

Before Mrs. Doud came West ahead of the President and Mrs. Eisenhower, her neighbors on Lafayette st. were alarmed one night to see flashlights playing ominously around the interior of the unoccupied house.

The neighbors spread the alarm, even called the newspapers. Breathless reporters and photographers who arrived minutes later discovered that the lights were being employed quite properly by Secret Service agents preparing for the President's visit.

### Neighbors Excited

The neighbors still can't get over seeing strange young men pacing in front of the Doud home as the Secret Service maintains a guard, as discreetly as possible, while the President is in residence there.

But old hands at this business predict the neighbors will become accustomed to the security precautions around the President and pay no more attention to it than did the neighbors of former President Truman in Independence, Mo.

The Secret Service makes a sincere effort to be as unobtrusive as possible in protecting the President in the quiet residential neighborhood in which Mrs. Doud lives.

Two days after the President came out here, the rope and wooden barriers erected by Denver police at either end of Mrs. Doud's block were quietly taken down. A few curious continue to drive by the house or stroll past, but there is no concentration of people like that on hand when the President first arrived.

## Dick Haymes Plans Citizenship Fight

Las Vegas — (U.P.) — Crooner Dick Haymes, facing deportation for following Rita Hayworth to Hawaii, said today he plans to fight for American citizenship.

"I'm trying to work it out now," said the singer, who is appearing at a Las Vegas night club. "My ultimate is citizenship. I didn't get it before because I goofed."

He said that Rita "is 100 percent behind me all the way," but wouldn't say if that meant their future marriage.

"I think it would be bad taste at this time to say anything about Rita and me," he said, pointing out that his estranged wife, Nora Eddington Flynn Haymes, "hasn't filed her divorce suit yet."

He said he was confident he will not be deported.

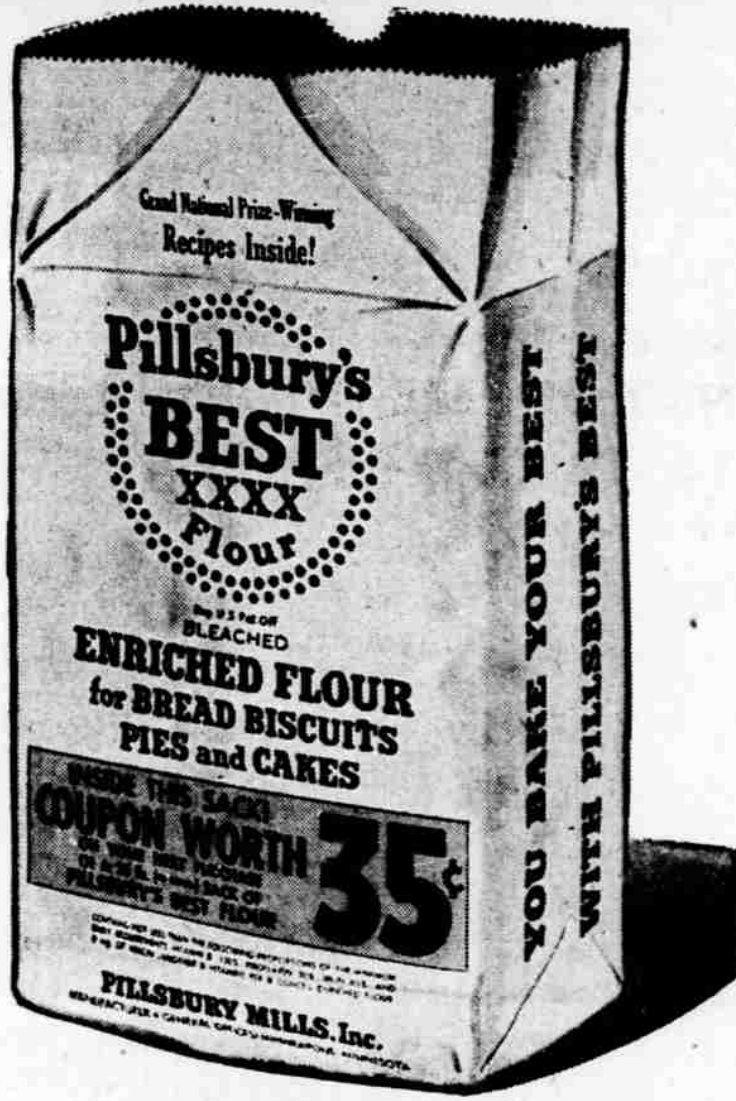
