

Marr Raps Langlie's Stand on Issue of Hells Canyon Dam

Spokane — (U.P.) — James T. Marr, secretary of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, criticized Gov. Arthur B. Langlie's stand on the controversial Hells Canyon issue here yesterday, executive apparently based his decision to oppose a high Federal dam there "on erroneous information."

Marr told the Pacific Northwest Council of Lumber and Sawmill workers that Langlie had said in a speech at Yakima, Wash., several weeks ago that "another peculiar characteristic about the Snake river is that its high water flow is in the winter months."

Peculiar Characteristics

Marr, who also is president of the National Hells Canyon Association, said Langlie "used these 'peculiar' river flow characteristics in an attempt to show that the Snake does not have enough water to fill the great Hells Canyon reservoir."

However, Marr said, "the high flow of the Snake comes in March, April, May and June — not in the winter months as the governor was apparently advised by his mysterious engineering expert." He said if the river flowed the way the governor's engineering expert said, there probably would not be enough water to operate Hells Canyon dam. But, he added, "even during the driest year on record, enough water wasted through Hells Canyon to more than fill the Hells Canyon reservoir twice."

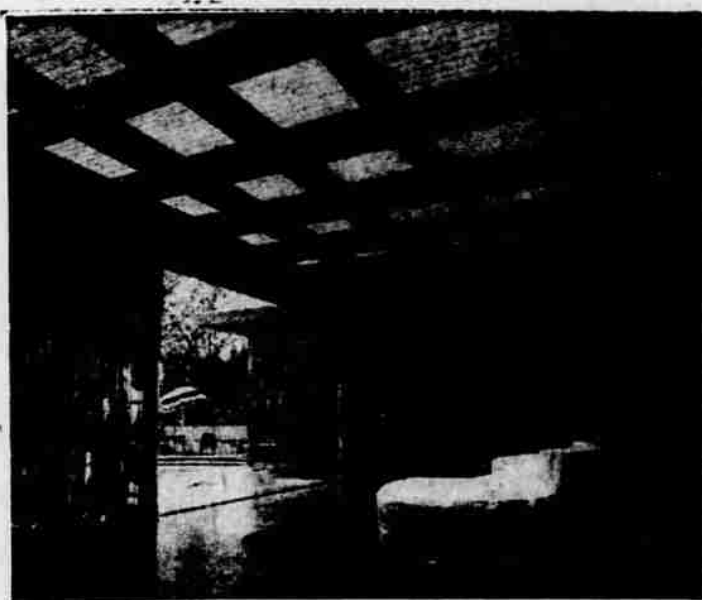
Conclusion Doubted

Marr said, "The governor said that his opposition was based on information supplied to him by an engineer 'who was hired to devote his full time to find out what the answers were for the people of the state of Washington, and paid by the people of the state of Washington.'"

"The fact that his basic premise regarding Snake river flow is erroneous casts doubts on his conclusion."

PO Building Plans Talked at Ashland

Ashland — A post office inspector from Seattle was here this week to discuss plans for construction of Ashland's new post office, according to Postmaster Parker Hess.

Inspector E. A. Wahlstrom met with Dom Provost, who plans to begin construction of the new building early in September, and with local postal authorities regarding the structure and various other phases of the project.

The building is to be erected at the corner of Second and C streets. The one-story structure will contain approximately 4,700 square feet of floor space. It is to be ready for occupancy March 1, 1954.

Hess denied rumors that there will be no new post office building constructed. He stated that there is a contract in effect that is binding on both the United States government and on Provost.

Douglas Fir Mill Production Declines

Portland — (U.P.) — Average weekly production in Douglas fir sawmills was down to 166,000,000 feet in July compared to 205,000,000 feet in June, Harris Smith, secretary of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association, said today.

Smith said several strikes and Fourth of July shutdowns contributed to the decline.

Weekly average of orders accepted dropped 20,000,000 feet in July and July weekly shipments of 167,000,000 feet were under the 207,000,000 feet shipped each week in June, Smith said. Unfilled order files and lumber inventories were about the same at the end of July as they were four weeks earlier, he added.
